SINGLE PROWLER POLICES COUNTY AFTER MIDNIGHT

Harold Bird, Republican candidate for sheriff told a large gathering of the Parkland Business club last Wednesday that, in his opinion, the lack of police protection in this area can be corrected.

He said that each area in the county should have a deputy who is acquainted with that area so that proper protection can be given by a local man familiar with the goings and doings of that area.

According to Sheriff Lee Croft, another speaker, there are 31 members on his force at present. Of that total, all but 13 are tied up with administrative duties. These 13 are assigned to prowler cars that operate as follows:

Two operate until midnight, after which only one prowler car covers the entire county—all the way from Buckley to way over on the peninsula.

Supplementary Law Enforcement . . . PARKLAND PATROL PLANS BEGUN

Plans are under way for a Parkland Patrol in this area headed by C. G. (Doc) Brown and Ben Shanbrow it was announced to The Times this week by Brown who heads the organization. The patrol is expected to give an added measure of protection to this area, which is practically without any at the present time.

A building has been donated for the enterprise by Seamon Contractors. Patrol headquarters will be located on the corner of the Parkland Theater parking lot, the space being donated by Mr. Willard, owner of the Theater. Doc Brown has informed The Times that 24-hour service will be maintained by the new organization. Radio equipped patrol cars will cover the area keeping in tune with the office of county sheriff, who endorses the move to the extent that they will cooperate and forward radio messages. With this service in action, calls can be answered within three to five minutes after being placed.

A radio costing some \$500 was purchased and is now being installed.

The big "catch" of this enterprise is the fact that it needs money to operate. The Sheriff says he doesn't have money to help, nor does the county commissioners, they say. The Parkland Patrol hopes to get part of their needed expenses through regular subscribers to their services, both businesses and residents, who want the extra protection.

Was Narrows Office Bldg.; Dedication Set for Dec. 14th

Parkland's community library will be ready for dedication by Dec. 14, it was announced this week by President Roy Kreger of the Community club.

Lacking funds for a \$6,500 library, the building committee this week made a quick \$1,670 purchase of a Quonset hut.

The purchase is the former main office building at the Narrows bridge construction site. The hut is "full of windows" on all sides—well lighted. It has all the electrical wiring and plumbing and is celotex on the inside. It's flooring is ¾ inch 4x8 panels and the building measures 25 feet by 50 feet. An oil stove is also included in the \$1,670 purchase price.

There are three rooms and a bathroom (8 feet by 10 feet) at the present time. The bathroom can be adapted to a book repair room or to a lavatory, Kreger said.

The cost for moving the building to its 119th and Pacific site will be about \$200. The cost for the foundation and the added frontage will be an additional \$500, at least.

The bankroll earmarked for the library now totals only \$2,300. Even with the "good buy" the library fund is financially short, since a septic tank and power and water hookups are also needed.

However, it was hoped that the Parkland Light and Water firm can waive the set \$250 fee for the utilities hookup work, due to the non-profit motive of this community project. With these items taken care of, the building can be ready for public inspection by Dec. 14, Kreger said.

It was also announced that an "Oscar" award will be given the person who comes up with the most "adaptable" plan for the 25-foot frontage. The best "adaptable" design for the building front will be chosen by the library board at the club's Nov. 9 meeting.

President Kreger asked that all plans be left at the Parkland school or turned in at the meeting, before 8 p. m. By 10 o'clock that night, the "Oscar" winner will be announced.

The Parkland library station is now housed in the school. The new site is two lots 130 feet west of Pacific Ave. on the south side of 119th Street, two blocks north of the Parkland school.

Tentative plans for the dedication ceremony, which Kreger hopes will be Dec. 14, calls for a listing of all the businesses and individual donors who contributed funds, material or labor. The campaign for the library fund had its kickoff on April 15.

Kreger invites Parklanders to attend the next community club meeting set for Thursday, Nov. 9. There will be more talk about the library and an important issue on police protection for the area will be brought up for discussion.

Knockin' on Doors

To date we have called on most of the homes in 83 of the 108 precincts in the 29th District. It is interesting to note how the majority of people appreciate this personal, house to house type of campaign. In the three months that we have been campaigning we have talked to over 10,000 voters. I have made a point to record many of their ideas and desires.

I find that most voters are still confused as to the real differences between initiative 172, 176 and 178. Most of the people with whom I have visited are in favor of a liberal program of assistance to our Senior Citizens but are less enthusiastic in their approach to general welfare and aid to dependent children. With few exceptions, the voters believe that something should be done to eliminate milking and abuses which dissipate tax monies earmarked for widows, orphans and senior citizens. By and large the Senior Citizens resent having the benefits they receive classified as welfare and believe that legislation providing for their assistance should be treated separately from general welfare.

The schools through the medium of the P. T. A. have done an excellent job of arousing interest and ex-

plaining Referendum 7, 8 and 9 as well as Constitutional Amendment H. J. R. 10.

Referendum Bill No. 7, authorizes a 40 million dollar bond issue for the construction of public school plant facilities.

Referendum Bill No. 8, authorizes a 20 million dollar bond issue for the construction of building at the state's charitable, educational and penal institutions.

Referendum Bill No. 9 authorizes a 20 million dollar bond issue for the construction of needed buildings at the state institutions of higher learning.

Constitutional Amendment H. J. R. 10, permits any school district, if the voters specifically authorize it under present voting regulations, to become indebted up to 5 per cent of assessed valuation, in addition to the present 5 per cent, for capital outlays.

The overwhelming majority of the people with whom I have talked are in favor of the much needed assistance to our schools. They realize the importance of a good education for our younger generation.

Quite naturally most citizens are opposed to any increase in taxes on the State level. They realize full well that at the present moment we are paying over forty per cent of our income back to the government in the form of taxes. However, if as a last resort the legislature should find it necessary to levy new taxes, the majority of the people I have visited
