Come Saturday, April 26, residents of the Parkland area will go to Parkland school to cast a ballot for or against a special 20-mill levy to provide more funds for better fire protection.

In the short time that Pierce County Fire Protection District No. 6 has been in existence its unestimable value to the community has been demonstrated many times. Thousands of dollars worth of property have been saved and an insurance rate reduction has been granted.

The fire commissioners have been confronted with the need for more equipment and under the current four mill levy they can get only enough funds to pay off the indebtedness on the new truck and fire house.

Voters should bear in mind that this special levy can only be in effect for one year and most home owners have already received insurance reductions enough to more than offset the increased taxes. The Parkland area has enjoyed almost as efficient fire protection as the city of Tacoma and the manpower has all been on a volunteer basis.

There is every indication from the home folks that they are very much in favor of the increased levy. However, under a new state law at least 600 voters must cast a ballot to carry the issue. It is important that all eligible voters keep this date in mind and take a few minutes time to go to the polling place on Saturday, April 26.
