"... a monument which shall speak the gratitude, not of States, or of cities, or of governments, or of official bodies; but of the people, the whole people, of the nation—a National Monument, erected by the citizens of the United States of America." These were the words of Robert C. Winthrop, speaker of the House of Representatives, on laying the cornerstone of the Washington Monument in July, 1848.

We visited this monument which was started with funds raised by popular subscription, but which the government was forced to complete, and found it a very worthwhile point of interest. We stood in line with the rest of the many tourists, and when our turn came, rode the elevator to the top of this 555-foot tower.

From the observation platform, we were able to see for many miles in all directions. It is an ideal place for a sightseer to start, as nearly all of the public buildings and monuments the average tourist wants to visit can be seen from there, and their location with respect to each other, which helps in planning sightseeing trips.

The boys and I decided to walk down the 898 steps, with Betty and Joanne again taking the elevator. We enjoyed ourselves going down because we read the inscriptions on each of the 188 memorial stones which were presented by states, cities, foreign nations, organizations and individuals.

Some facts about the construction, if feel are rather interesting: 1—The Washington Monument is still the world's tallest piece of masonry, not dependent on a steel frame; 2—although the monument contains 81,120 tons of stone, the shaft has settled only 1 1/2 inches since construction; 3—In a 30-mile gale, the monument sways only about 1/250th of an inch, and, 4—The thickness of the walls varies from 15 feet at the base, to 18 inches at the top. **"Knothole Driving" Is Cause of Many Fatal Accidents on Highways**

"Knothole driving" was named this week as an important factor in many fatal automobile accidents last year.

State Patrol Chief James A. Pryde defined "knothole driving" as "the unskilled art of trying to drive with a windshield laden with ice, sleet or snow to such an extent that the driver's vision is restricted to a clear patch of glass the size of his fist."

This is just one of the several features of winter driving that help make December the costliest month of the year in terms of traffic fatalities.

"Hampered visibility," Chief Pryde said, "cannot be overestimated as a factor in December's high traffic fatality record. To some extent limited visibility is beyond the driver's control—the short days and long nights, and falling rain, sleet or snow are factors over which he has no influence."

Proper maintenance of the car heater, defroster, windshield wipers and headlights does much to cancel out the dangers of winter driving.

"You have to see danger to avoid it! It's as simple as that," Chief Pryde declared.

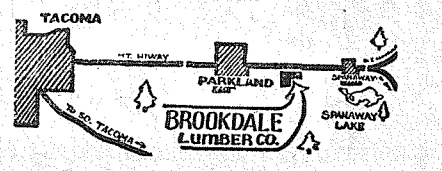

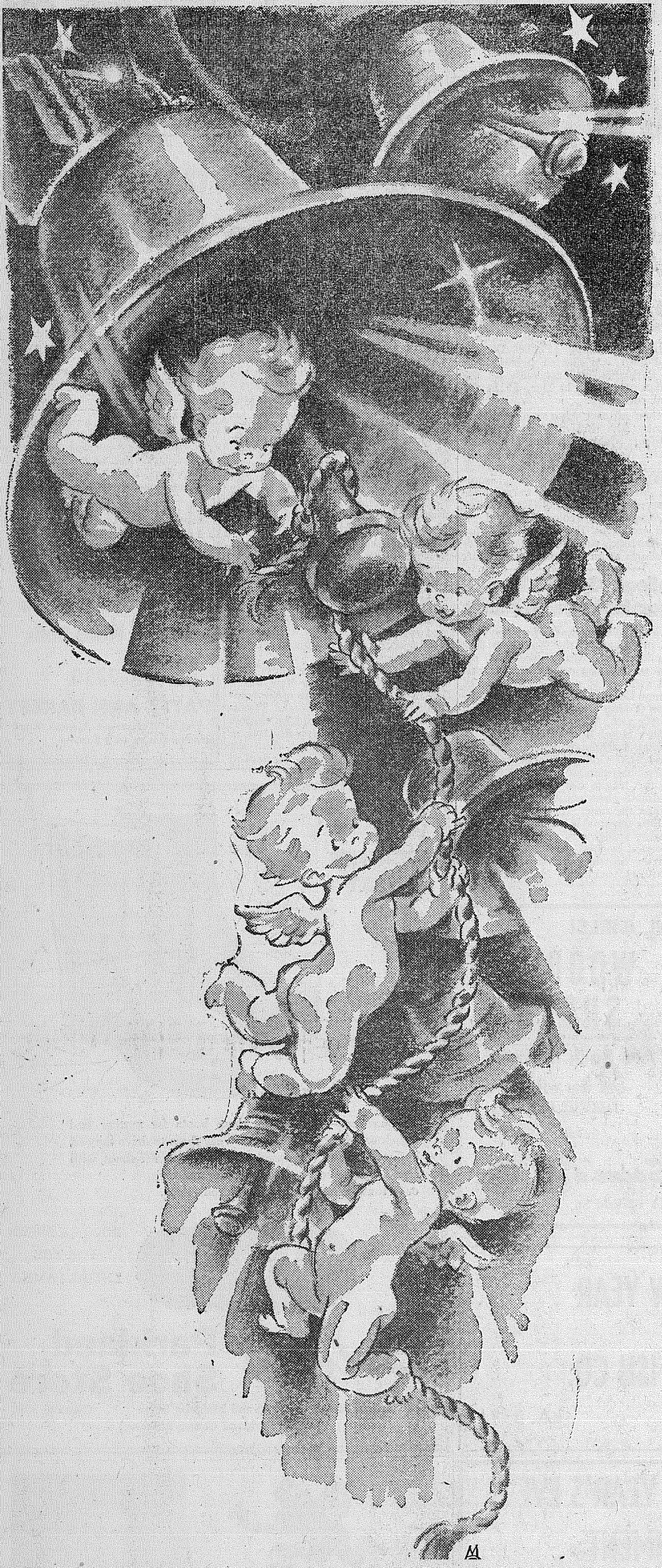

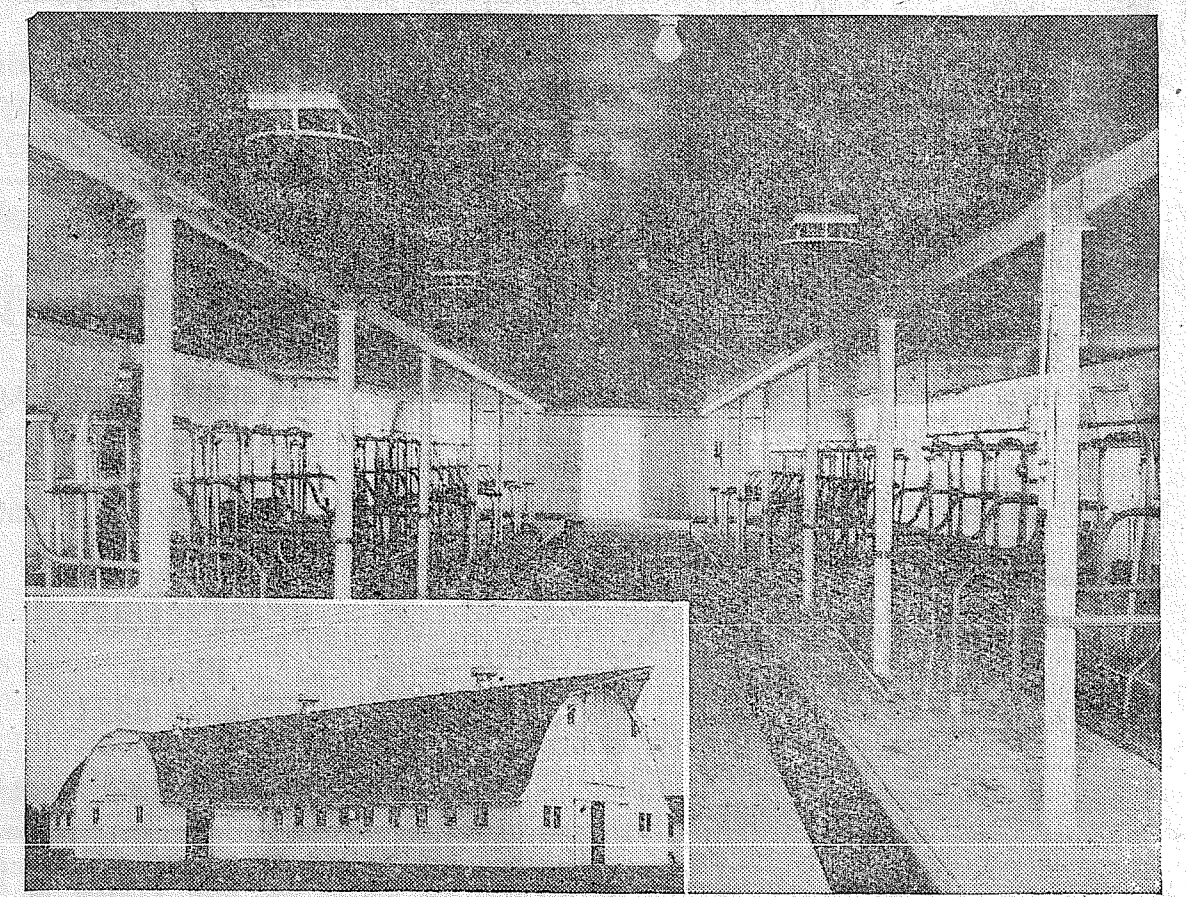

*Dairy Barn of Tomorrow Is Here Today*



**COMFORT, cleanliness and convenience** mark the ultra-modern dairy barn recently built to house 48 cattle on the Noble-McKinney Spring Run Farm in Lake County, Indiana. The most modern materials and equipment are used throughout. Insulation and ventilation assure year-around comfort for cattle and workers, while automatic cleaning is accomplished through endless-chain conveyors in the gutters. Sidewalls and ceiling of the roomy stable interior are lined with insulating board sheathing, which serves as both a building material and an effective insulation. Aluminum paint on the insulating board acts as a vapor barrier. Power driven fans provide scientific ventilation. Stanchions on either side vary progressively in length to accommodate cattle of different sizes. Inset (lower left) shows the barn exterior, with sidewalls finished in hardboard. Laminated rafters follow the Gothic design of the roof right to the ridge, allowing maximum hay storage space.
