Rabies... and Your Dog

Control of rabies should be a serious consideration for every dog owner. Rabies control is a constant year-round problem but it has a solution that provides protection for your dog.

First of all, it's important to keep in mind that rabies is a virus disease which attacks the brain and spinal cord, in human beings as well as in animals. Second, it is spread, chiefly by the bites of infected animals. The third point, and one of concern to all of us, as well as Public Health officials, is the fact that rabies is 100% fatal as no one who has once shown symptoms of rabies has ever recovered.

> There are two types of rabies, the "furious" and the "dumb" or paralytic. A dog

suffering from the furious type, alternates periods of excitement with periods of repose. As the disease progresses, the dog becomes vicious and bites any person or animal in its way.

A dog suffering from the paralytic type appears only to be sick and shows little or no irritability and someone, not knowing what ails the dog, may treat it or pet it. If this person has any break in the skin, no matter how slight, it is possible that the dog's saliva may come in con-tact with the wound and cause in-

To guard against this danger, all sick dogs should be handled with extreme care, kept under observation and confined in a place by itself until a definite diagnosis can be made by a veterinarian.

The best insurance against rables in your dog is vaccination by your veterinarian. Your dog can be protected for a year with one innoculation, which is the generally-accepted duration of the immuniza-

When you protect your dog from rabies, you are also protecting yourself and your family, because even if your dog is bitten by a rabid animal, there is little likelihood he will develop the disease.

City-wide or state-wide control of

rabies is a problem that is virtually stumping the experts, but the man who cares at all about his dog and his own immediate family, can do his part by having his dog immu-






