PARKLAND WILL GET STOP LIGHT

TRAFFIC LIGHT WILL BE INSTALLED WITHIN NEXT SIXTY DAYS

A manual control stop light will be installed on the Mountain highway near the Parkland school within the next 60 days, according to a letter received by Mel Pederson from E. C. Simpson, assistant director of state highways.

Pederson has been heading a committee of the Parkland Community Club to investigate the possibility of installing either an overpass or an underpass on the Mountain Highway by the school to make the crossing safe for pedestrians, especially school children.

In the letter Simpson said the overpasses and underpasses had been tried out in other districts but were not very successful and that the department was trying to eliminate them.

The light will be installed in conjunction with the project of widening the highway as far as Clover Creek, Simpson said. It will be located at the present school crossing and will be controlled from both the east and west sides of the highway.

PARKLAND BUSINESS CLUB STUDIES BANK POSSIBILITIES

That Parkland and vicinity will get some kind of banking facilities was determined upon by the Parkland Business Club's banking committee at a special meeting held Sunday night.

Members of the committee are this week contacting all banking concerns which could possibly establish a branch in this area. If no results are forthcoming from this source a meeting will be sought with Walter A. Johnson, state supervisor of banking, at his office in Olympia. Johnson will be asked to give the committee full details for setting up an independent state bank.

Herschel Mobley, chairman of the committee, said Monday that since the Business Club's meeting with Johnson last week, many persons have expressed a desire to see a state bank in this area. "And they are willing to back it up with cash," Mobley stated.

Preliminary surveys made by the bank committee tend to prove that all the requirements necessary to establishing a sound bank in this area can be met, members of the committee averred.

Parkland War Memorial Drive Begins April 19

\$3,000 Goal Set in Button Drive, Heavy Gift Fund; Project To Be Completed For Summer Recreational Program

"Button, button, who hasn't got a button?" This might very well be the slogan of the civic organizations and veterans' organizations who have taken it upon themselves to sell buttons to raise funds for the completion of the Parkland War Memorial.

The buttons have a gold background with "Parkland War Memorial" printed on them in black. Those colors were chosen as they are the school colors of both Pacific Lutheran College and the Parkland school.

Drive Opens April 19

While many of the buttons have already been sold, the drive does not officially open until April 19. The goal set is \$3,000, with each button costing one dollar.

The war memorial, which was started in 1946, was to consist of two double concrete tennis courts, an ornamental drinking fountain and an appropriate plaque honoring the men from Parkland who died in World War II.

Over \$4,000 was raised in the drive at that time and was used for the concrete tennis courts which are located behind the Parkland school.

Because the cost of the materials was raised considerably and because the materials were hard to get, the memorial was never completed.

Fence Ordered

The fence for the tennis court has already been ordered and is expected to be installed within 30 days, according to Herb Socolofsky, chairman of the war memorial committee. The club intends to have the entire project completed in time for the summer recreational program at the Parkland school.

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Spiritual Emphasis Week at College

Dr. S. C. Eastvold, President of Pacific Lutheran College, conducted the annual spring Spiritual Emphasis Week at the college, which began Monday morning, April 5, and included Friday, April 9. The talk given to the students each morning was based on the story of the Prodigal Son in Luke 15:11-32.

Using as his theme "The Boy Who Went Away and Came Home Again," Dr. Eastvold divided his message during the mornings as follows:

Monday: Dr. Eastvold gave his first address on the theme, "A Typical Sinner," which led eventually up to the theme "A Model Penitent." Dr. Eastvold stated it as one of his aims and objectives in the series of talks to encourage the Christians and to try to reach those in the student body and on the campus who have strayed away in prodigal paths.

Dr. Eastvold said, "progress of the Prodigal may be traced from apostasy to profligacy to penalty. He was thoughtless, easily deceived, innocent, and unsuspecting. Much of liberty is just another name for license. Apostasy of heart leads to apostasy of life. All sinners are spendthrifts. The course of sin is usually brief. Alienation from God leads to poverty, misery, and suffering. The germ of prodigality is self-will. The Prodigal resented the father's authority; he wanted to be his own master. The fall of the Prodigal was dated to the moment he claimed freedom from God. The essence of sin lies in self-will. Who is innocent?"

"Christ depicts the typical sinner as a waster. He begins by asking for his goods, he gets it, he carries it off and wastes it. Prodigality is branded as the lowest form of sin. There is nothing baser than to resolve to exalt self, whatever the cost, heedless of others, heedless of the voice of conscience and of the sentence of condemnation. All vital religion begins with the breaking down of the stubborn will and subjection to the wise and holy will of God. Let us look upon the Prodigal with sympathy and with terror. Sin is madness. No shrewd man is wicked, and no wicked man is shrewd. When man comes to himself, he turns to God."

Tuesday: On Tuesday, Dr. Eastvold centered his thoughts around the theme, "The Turning Point." In this address, he stated as quoted here in brief: "Here was action for 'He arose.' He was already in a state of thoughtfulness. He passed beyond dreamings of thought into acting and doing. He passed beyond mere regret and thence to repentance, and then pressed beyond mere resolving to immediate action to go back to his father's house. He arose and came to his father. It would be no use to arise if he did not go to his father. He did not sit down and cry; he arose and went with little hope, little faith, and much fear. Too many people want the best robes without begging from the father. Pride must go or the soul will perish. Pride is a sinking vessel not worth the pumping. Get into the lifeboat of Grace. The Lord will not hear while you are deaf to Him. You will pray best with your head on the Father's bosom—not before."

"Even your prayers will ruin you if you substitute them for going to God. It would be unthinkable if the Prodigal should say, 'I will sit here and pray.' In that action, returning to the Father in faith, there was an entire yielding up of himself. Independence of self-will was gone—now he was willing to be a servant. He had had enough of being his own master. He longs for a child's true place which is dependence and loving submission. He yields his cherished freedom and boasted independence. He gives up all idea of self-justification. He says, 'I have sinned,' while before he said, 'I have a right to do as I please.'"

"There is not a syllable of self-praise. To deny sin is worse than sinning. That soul is not far from God which ceases to argue and submits. The Prodigal had little faith, but he had enough to start for home. Faith binds the justice of God and constrains His grace. He left the chambers of vice, the tables of riot, the degrading works of self-support, the feeding of the swine, with all pride gone, with no glory in self, and went home to the father's house."

Wednesday: On Wednesday, Dr. Eastvold centered his thoughts around the theme, "The Prodigal's Return."

"The Prodigal started for home when he knew he was wrong, when he knew he was lost. He was afar off in his own apprehensions. He sees the past, its trampled blood, its broken sabbaths, the neglected Bible, the rejected mercy, the sins of youth, and starts for home. The sinner cannot indulge in lust and wear the royal robes. He cannot drink the blood of God and the cup of Babel at the same time. He started on a long journey back, footsore, seeing home miles away, troubled emotions, remembering the kindnesses of his father. He remembered the day he left home."

"All his fears of what the father would do were dispelled when he came back. The father saw him. In like manner, the Father sees every returning Prodigal today. He sees the tears. He hears the prayers. He follows the sinner into the secret chamber. He sees not with the usual gaze but with intense interest. Never a physician rejoiced more in a patient breathing than does the Father hearing the sighs of the penitent cry for grace. The father had a long-range eye, a telescopic love. He was not angry but sorrowed to see his son in such a degraded fashion. He was welcomed home."

Friday: The series of spiritual emphasis messages was concluded on Friday morning when Dr. Eastvold used as his theme, "A Hearty Welcome Home."

"A bushful of resolutions has no meaning beside the simple action of arising to return to the Father. When the sinner moves an inch, the Father moves miles. The eye of mercy is quicker than the eye of repentance. The prodigal travels slowly with heavy heart, with sobs and sighs, half afraid of what will happen when the father sees him. But the father ran. Slow are the steps of repentance, swift are the feet of forgiveness. God is slow to anger but quick to bless."

The father, being a type of God, fell on the neck of the sinner. A wonderful picture to think that deity will thus condescend to embrace the sinner. The father saw what the son had been, but he also saw what he soon would be when he would be at the table banqueting as a child again.

"The father's kiss was not like the kiss of Judas. He does not betray those whom he embraces. The kiss of the father meant that his sins were all gone. They would never be mentioned again. The son would never need to be treated as though he were unworthy. The kiss of the father stopped the son's confession. The wretched boy was made to understand, 'You are my son.' All his privileges were restored, with robe, ring, shoes, and bread. Though the odor of the smelling swine was still upon his garments and people would turn up their noses to think that such a boy would come back home, the father grasped him to his bosom and caressed him again and again. The lost was found, the dead was alive. How wonderful that a poor returning sinner can make the heart of God glad. The wasted years were buried under the blood. The present and the future were assured for God will hold no good thing from those who walk uprightly. Every promise in the Bible is given to the penitent who returns. The son had assurance beyond all doubt."

"The kiss of the father was bestowed in private and then in public before the family before they participated in the feast. His welcome home did not depend upon the grumbling, complaining, selfish, self-centered, self-willed brother. In like manner, the only and important thing for the prodigal soul is to know he has the smiling approval of our Heavenly Father."

The Spiritual Emphasis Week messages were enthusiastically received by students and faculty alike. The attendance on Friday was
