LOCAL FURRIER HAS WIDE FAME

In 1912 Raised Rabbits For Food, Changed To Selling Pelts

That old adage which states that "If you build a better mousetrap the world will beat a path to your door" has literally come true in the case of Miss Agnes Brenner who operates the Larchmont Furriers on Golden Given Road just two blocks north of the Airport highway. With the manufacture of exceptionally fine fur wearing apparel Larchmont Furriers has gained a national reputation in this field and at its peak season twenty employees are busy while no less than ten are working there throughout the year.

Back in the year 1912 Miss Brenner's folks purchased ten acres of land at the present site and decided to go into the rabbit raising business and they purchased three animals as a starter. At first the rabbits were raised for meat but as the business grew the Brenners found they could do better selling the pelts in the East and thus started getting into the fur business. The first venture into making fur coats was the manufacture of rabbit fur apparel for children.

Business Grows
As this business grew and the demand for their fine quality coats increased other furs were purchased and a more varied line of coats was marketed until now all of the finest furs the market affords are styled into coats and scarfs and sold throughout the United States. A recent sale of an ermine coat to a woman from Kansas City indicates the scope of this local company's far-flung trade. There are only two other fur companies in the country that have sales offices and factories several miles outside city shopping centers.

Miss Brenner has grown up with Larchmont Furriers and now has full ownership. The first work done in the family home but ten years ago, a fine modern shop was erected which provides ample working space and a fur storage vault with room enough for 8,500 coats. A new showroom and three more fitting rooms will be added to this structure in the near future.

More Land Bought
Another ten acres of land has been added to the original tract and it is planned to build a number of homes there as soon as materials are available.

Another sideline which has grown into quite a business is the cutting and shipping of several hundred pounds of holly each Christmas season from the 900 trees Miss Brenner set a few years ago.

South End folks are welcome to stop in at Larchmont Furriers and see this plant that has been chopped out of the woods and has reaped a reward from hard work and perseverance.

WATER SYSTEM PLANS ADVANCE

COMPANY VOTES FULL AUTHORITY TO BOARD TO COMPLETE PROJECT

Special meeting of the South East Tacoma Mutual Water Co. was held Monday, July 15, at 8 p.m. in the Midland Improvement Club hall.

With a vote of 4 opposing and 52 for, the board of trustees will have full authority to complete the water system project with machinery for the producing and storing of water and drilling of another well as an auxiliary.

The members also voted that a competent engineer or engineering company be hired to advise the board on the project.

Completion of this project, hoped to be an independent water company for stockholders in the S. E. T. M. W. Co., was assured success if everything goes as smoothly as the first well drilled on East 98th and Washington streets, according to a report by Secretary Clay Roley.

Total depth of the well is 408 feet while Midland is 427 feet above sea level. The test pump produced 220 gallons of water per minute for two consecutive hours. Width of the completed well is 10 inches. The water has proved soft after tests with soap, and the City Health Department gave a favorable report on a sample. Entire cost of the well as of Monday was approximately \$6,000.

President Carl Taylor, who conducted the meeting, introduced Max Laughlin from R. M. Wade and Co., which handles industrial pumps. Mr. Laughlin offered some advice on well machinery to the board.

Tonight (Thursday) the board of trustees and a five-man committee will meet to decide the next step.

The board of trustees has as members Carl Taylor, president; A. P. Easton, Arthur Looney, E. Clemons and Clay Roley.

The five-man committee consists of Frank Baskett, I. M. Gaylord, Bert Vaughan, Clarence Johnson and Ralph Keys, who was just recently elected to the committee to fill the vacancy. Mr. Roley left when he took the office of secretary to finish the unexpired term of Mrs. John Cook who retired.

City vs. the Country

How Chicagoans are flocking to the beaches to get relief from the heat is being shown in a current movie news short. Radio commentators also refer to the humid summer heat in New York City and Washington, D. C. Perhaps the Pacific Northwest isn't a bad place to live—not to feel for days as if you were walking through a steam room, not to feel trapped by heavy solid buildings, heat, crowds of people.

This is a country to grow in, that has no less promise than when the first settlers arrived. With the rest of the world overcrowded, too much lived in, our green and fertile state is a rich and luxurious place. Yes, it is a luxury to wander over dirt roads, through green fields. One of the promises of heaven mentioned in the Bible is our opportunity to "lie down in green pastures."

Cities, Robinson Jeffers claims in his poem, "Shine Perishing Republic," are the centers of corruption. And "corruption never has been compulsory." There are always the mountains, he says. Perhaps confirming his condemnation is the theory of a doctor reported two years ago in Time magazine. He published a book of figures to support his contention that geographically, the closer toward the center of a city you approached, the more of the mentally disturbed people could you find, neurotics and even psychotics.

However sound or unsound his theory may be, with its implications about city life, probably most people have said that they would visit rather than live in our big cities.

About the advantages of city life, another poet has this to say. They are the incubators for artists, the meeting places for many minds. People go to them to learn, not to live.

For a wholesome, happy life, there is probably no better place to live than right here.
