

An official letter from Governor Langlie and the crown of Queen Carmen will be carried from the Governor-s office in Olympia to Queen Carmen Robinson in Parkland to be pre sented at the opening of the Corona

tion program.

This will be the first time in the history of the state that a pony express letter has ever been delivered as an official letter over this territory The letter from Governor Langlie will be delivered to the Olympia postmaster who will cancel it in the customar manner and hand it to the first pony express rider who will dash off to the city limits with it where it will really get under way in a cloud of dust as the first rider takes off down the highway toward Parkland. Several miles further down the highway another fresh rider and horse will pick up the tempo and off again in still more dust. It is expected that the letter will reach Parkland in record time . . . probably day or two ahead of the regular mail schedule in fact.

When the letter reaches Parkland it be received by Jack Quill, the Parkland postmaster, who will process it in the regular manner where it will again be handed to the last rider who will actually drive right up on the stage with it thus completing the first Pony Express letter from the Goverthe state to the Parkland Roundup Oueen.

Of particular interest to the public will be the fact that the letter will bear the new official stamp of the state of Washington, that of the Grand Coulee dam. Queen Carmen will retain the letter for her personal use. It should prove of considerable value in the years to come. Several bids have already been received from stamp collectors and other people who collect such things. I hope Carmen sees fit to retain the letter herself.

Originator of this unique idea was Jack Brown of the Times-Journal. The letter was originally to have been carried by another organization, but since that organization was unable to carry through at the last minute the Parkland Riding Club through Jack Brown took over . . . and the mail will go through. Jack has done a fine job in and deserves a good deal of credit for keeping the project going. Riders of the Parkland Riding Club participating in the Pony Express are Jack Brown, Mac Robinson (father of the Queen), Wes McKewen, B. F. Fluty and Del Cheny.
