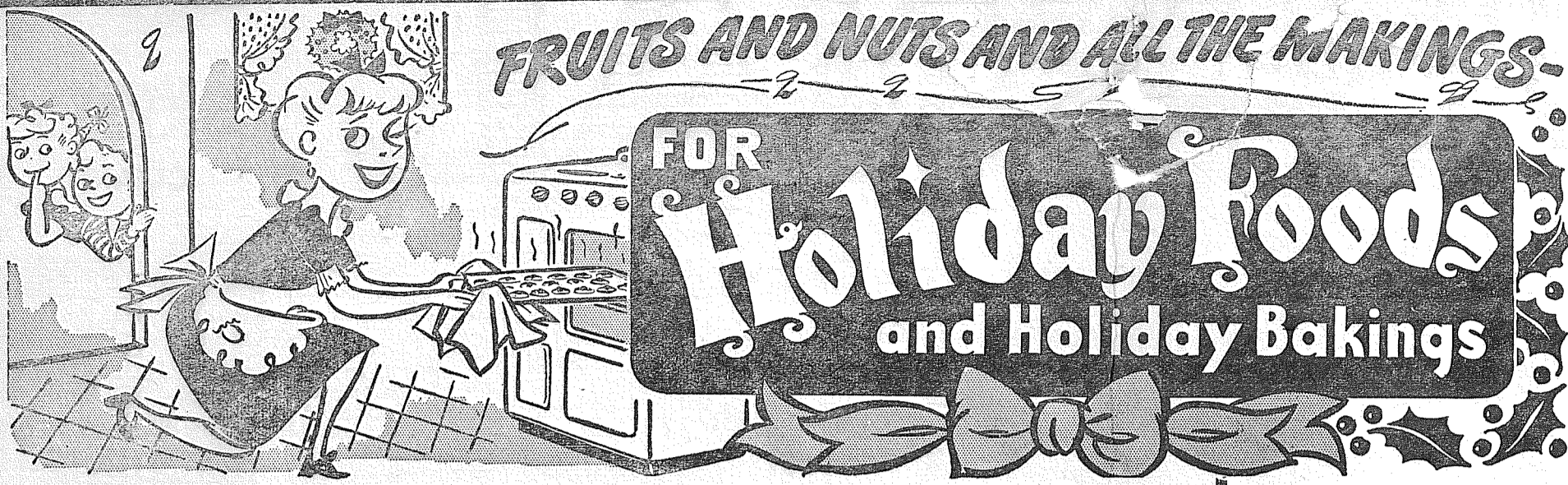

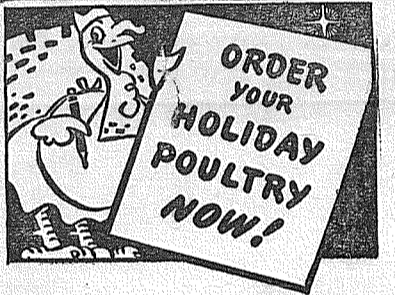

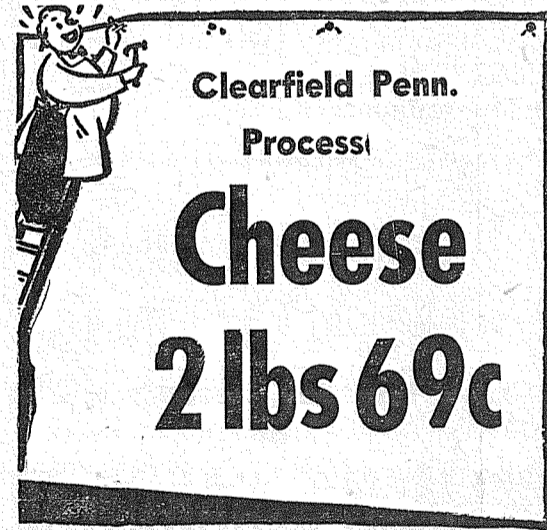

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**

**Barbecued Ham Balls**  
3/4 lb. lean, ground smoked ham  
3 tablespoons corn meal  
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
few grains pepper  
1/2 cup Fat Milk  
4 teaspoons flour  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
1 tablespoon fat  
1/2 cup water  
1/2 cup catsup  
4 teaspoons vinegar  
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce  
1 tablespoon sugar  
3 tablespoons finely cut onion  
Mix ham with corn meal, mustard, pepper and milk. Shape into 8 balls. Roll, one at a time, in mixture of flour and paprika. Brown on all sides in hot fat. Drain off all fat. Mix rest of ingredients and pour over ham balls. Cook over low heat 30 min., turning balls now and then in the sauce. Makes 4 servings.

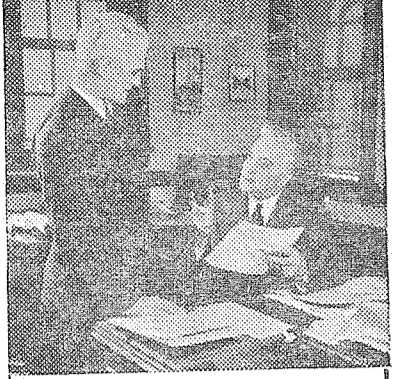
