Reuben Reports on State Institutions

(Our State Representative, Reuben A. Knoblauch, Chairman of the Legislative Interim Committee on State Institutions, brings to the people of the 25th District, another of his reports on his tour of the State Institutions.)

Located in full view of beautiful Mt. Rainier is the Rainier State School at Buckley, the scene of Saturday's full day inspection by two legislative committees. My committee was joined by a legislative council subcommittee on Juvenile Delinquency, headed by Sen. Al Rosellini, of Seattle, together with leading officials of the State Mental Hygiene Society and

At the present time there are 1,231 mentally deficient children at the Buckley School, ranging from babies a few days old, to some who are 50, to mentally they are little children. In some of the dormitories and wards the beds are so close together that you can hardly stand between them. It is obvious that such overcrowding makes feeding, personalized care and other problems extremely difficult. But most of all, there is always the danger of a serious disease being spread as a result of this situation. To make matters worse there is a waiting list of 440 at the present time, which means that most parents must wait two or three years to get their children admitted. This may not seem serious to some of you, but to a parent close to this matter, it's a terrific problem. Again, I hesitate in telling you of the condition of some of these children. If you have any heart at all you surely must feel that society must take care of these children in the best possible manner. Many of the parents have spent their entire life's savings trying to bring their child back to normalcy, and when the situation becomes desperate and hopeless, finally come to the Rainier State School for help. To bring it more closer to home, let's just exchange places with these parents and see what our feelings would be. There's just no doubt in my mind as to your answer.

State Benevolent League. Also, several members of the legislature, including Rep. Kenneth Simmons, spent the day with us.

The Rainier State School was built in 1937, and according to those familiar with the treatment of the mentally deficient, is the second most beautiful institution in the nation. For those of you that have not seen this school, it would well be worth a drive to Buckley. The investigation was covered very thoroughly by the press, I did want to add a few of my own comments, and at the same time try to further impress you on the need for the passage of the bond issue in November. When I finish this story I hope that you'll find yourself in agreement with me.

Prior to our inspection, the outgoing superintendent, Dr. Rudolph Depner (resigned effective Oct. 1st) gave us a very frank talk on the situation which caused him to resign. He dealt at length on the necessity for a merit system in our institutions, so that both administrative officials and other employees would not have to worry about being fired every time that a new political administration came into power. We were surprised to learn that Washington is one of the few states that doesn't have a merit system. The doctor was critical over the low salaries paid to the employees at Buckley, stating that some of them received only \$150 a month. In the past few weeks over 40 employees had quit and accepted employment in other fields that would pay them much better wages. I am convinced that if each of you could have gone thru the school with us and had seen the type of patients that are cared for, you'd wonder how they could get help at all. I would hesitate in even trying to describe this situation further. To care for the more than 1,200 patients, there is only ONE resident doctor at the school, and another that comes in to help on certain days.

At the present time there are 1,231 mentally deficient children at the Buckley School, ranging from babies a few days old, to some who are 50, to mentally they are little children. In some of the dormitories and wards the beds are so close together that you can hardly stand between them. It is obvious that such overcrowding makes feeding, personalized care and other problems extremely difficult. But most of all, there is always the danger of a serious disease being spread as a result of this situation. To make matters worse there is a waiting list of 440 at the present time, which means that most parents must wait two or three years to get their children admitted. This may not seem serious to some of you, but to a parent close to this matter, it's a terrific problem. Again, I hesitate in telling you of the condition of some of these children. If you have any heart at all you surely must feel that society must take care of these children in the best possible manner. Many of the parents have spent their entire life's savings trying to bring their child back to normalcy, and when the situation becomes desperate and hopeless, finally come to the Rainier State School for help. To bring it more closer to home, let's just exchange places with these parents and see what our feelings would be. There's just no doubt in my mind as to your answer.

After our morning inspection and noon dinner, we again re-

tired to the administration building for further discussion. Harold Van Eaton, Director of State Institutions, told our large group that if the \$20,000,000 bond issue is passed in November, the Rainier State School would receive "top" priority. He said that we MUST take care of the waiting list and get those new dormitories built as soon as possible. Even if the bond issue passes, it will be at least two years before some of this work can be done. I am happy that political leaders of both parties, along with Gov. Langlie and other respected organizations, have endorsed the passage of this most important measure. I have been told by some people that I am making a mistake in plugging for this bond issue, but I am convinced that the need is here and that the situation is desperate. Mine is a passion of trust and public service and I am not afraid to speak my piece when I feel that I am right and that the people are looking to me for advice and help. I have spent four years on this particular committee and by this time should have some knowledge of the building shortage in all of our state institutions. I am taking an active part in behalf of the passage of this bond issue and am convinced that the people in my district will join with me in this fight.

On Saturday, October 7th, your two committees will inspect the Chehalis State School for Boys and the Girls School at Grand Mound, and on the following day will visit the Deaf and Blind School at Vancouver. The I have been to Chehalis and Grand Mound on prior inspections, this will be my first trip to the Vancouver institutions.

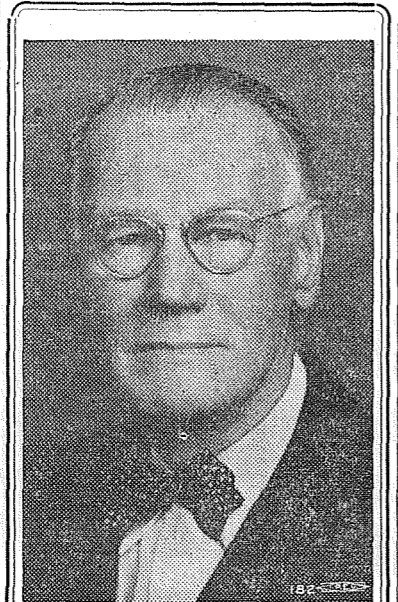

With the primary election out of the way and party standard bearers picked the political battle will be getting into high gear with the tumult and the shouting continuing until November. The major skirmish, of course, will be between Republican nominee Walter Williams and veteran Democratic Senator Warren G. Magnuson.

Magnuson showed his usual strength in the primaries, despite the fact that many Democratic voters cast their ballot for the Republican they would like in the finals rather than for Magnuson, who had no opposition.

The lack of opposition at the head of the ticket also kept many Democrats away from the polls. For example, one active Demo visited the polls at 7 p. m. one hour before closing time, and found an unusually light vote. He rounded up several carloads of fellow party members in the remaining hour and took them to vote.

Most of them hadn't bothered to go to the polls because Magnuson had no opposition. Ten per cent of the total vote in this precinct was brought out by one man in an automobile between the hours of 7 and 8 p. m. on election night.

We are pleased to report that Judge Charles Wright was retained on the Thurston-Mason County Superior Court bench by a decisive majority. Judge Wright will continue to make his legal decisions on the basis of facts as he sees them.

An expensive campaign was waged by Judge Wright's opponent, with several minor politicians attesting in paid advertisements to the "non-partisan" nature of this opposition candidate, who is attorney for the State Republican Central Committee.

It is our prediction that Judge Wright's opponent will become a judge anyway. A vacancy will probably turn up on the Thurston-Mason bench in the near future and the Governor has shown no reluctance to appoint individuals to public jobs after the public has turned them down at the polls.

Gordon Quarnstrom, Longview Democrat, will be squared off against Congressman Russell Mack in the third district congressional fight, and it appears that Mack will have a fight on his hands. The young newspaperman displayed the campaign techniques of a veteran politician, although this is his first bid for a major political office.

He has an aggressive and loyal organization working for him and is expected to swing energetically at Mack's lack of a positive record of accomplishment in Washington. This one is likely to develop into a very interesting slug-fest before it's over.

Although Governor Langlie is auctioning off Governor Wallgren's old, beat-up 1947 Cadillac and has a brand new Cadillac whose upholstery has never been defiled by Democratic derriers, his motoring troubles continue.

Another wreck and an out-of-gas episode are the latest additions to his tale of mechanized woe. The Governor has been in more accidents since he took office last year than many motorists suffer in a life-time, although none of them are ever his fault.
