COMMUNITY SPIRIT

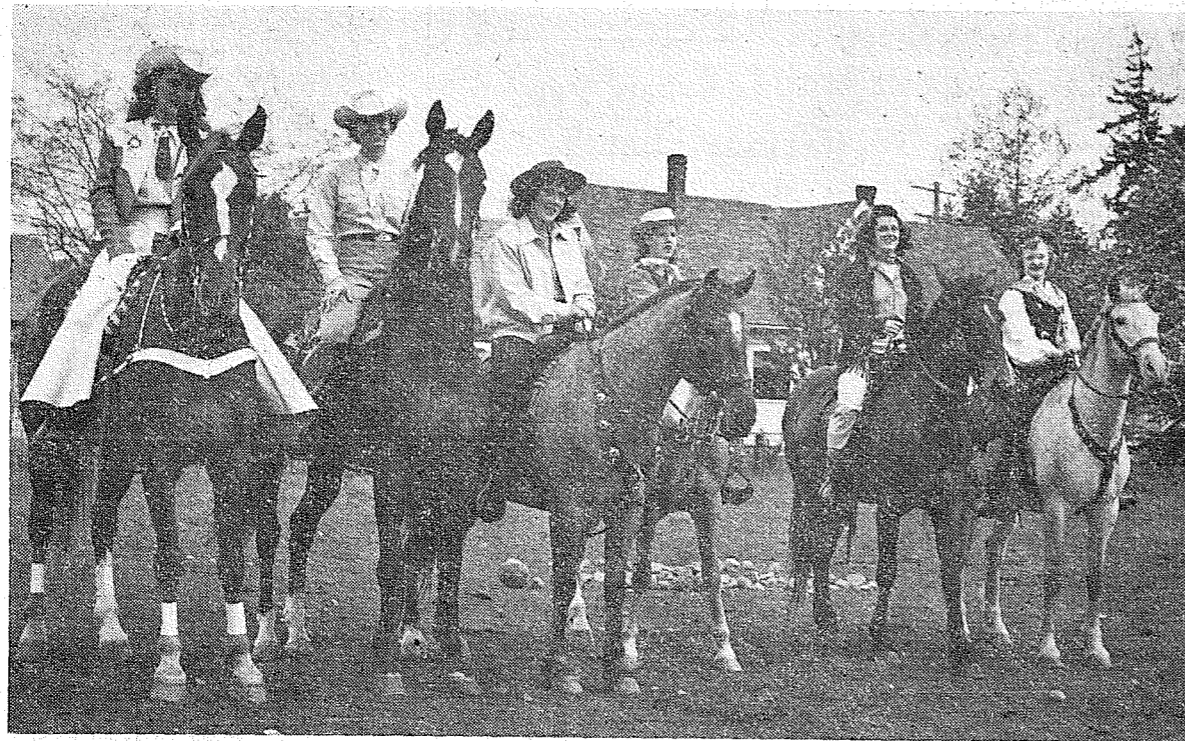
There was a long period in our history when the population trend was from farm to city. Remember the old song, "How You Goin' to Keep Them Down on the Farm?"

Cattle Show

One of the finest cattle shows ever held will take place Saturday during the Parkland Roundup, announces Tom Law, president of the Pierce County Jersey Cattle club and co-sponsor of the Parkland Roundup. Nearly a hundred of the finest Jersey cattle of Pierce and Kitsap counties will parade in front of the judges and spectators of the show on Saturday.

Official Judge Scott Hodgson, of Washington State college, will carry the decisions, assisted by Claude Doran, county agent, who will make announcements of classes and winners over the P.A. system.

Jersey Princess Mary Ann Mantik will preside, presenting ribbons and trophies.

For those who are unaware of the job of judging these winners, we point out that there are 6 classes of bulls, 7 classes of females, 3 classes of groups. Junior-Senior and Grand Championships, both bull and cow, must be selected. This is very brief, but it is quite interesting to note the care and precision needed in selecting these champions.

A Jersey beauty contest will be conducted with 12 heifers carrying cards of local business sponsors, entrants to be paraded before the reviewing stand, winners to be selected by public applause.

Such names as Miss 2x4, Miss Panty-waist, Miss Buttons and Bows, etc., are some of the typical entrants. Fun is promised in the selection of this portion of the show.

Entering Parkland on Wheeler St. (Park Ave.) as usual, the buses will continue to 122nd St., one block south of Garfield St., before turning east to Pacific; the return trip on the same route. The detour will be followed from 10 a.m. Saturday, June 2, to 1 a.m. the following morning.

ROUND UP SATURDAY

Round Up Parade Starts At Noon

The big Parkland Roundup parade will get under way about 12 o'clock on Saturday. Hundreds of entrants are already entered with a last week rush of entries expected from now until Saturday morning when the big parade will form at Pochel's, 140th and Pacific Avenue. All rider entrants, etc., are asked to be on hand early so the parade master can get everything lined up in order before 12 when the procession is due to get underway.

Parking Facilities

Parking facilities for all trailers, trucks, etc., for horse entries in the parade will be available on the Parkland school grounds. Special riders will direct you if you just ask or stop at the Parkland Fuel Oil Service on Pacific Avenue, and you will be properly directed to the parking area.

It is asked by Roy Smith, parade master, that all entrants be ready to roll promptly at 12. It is best to leave your trailer at the designated area then ride down to the starting place of the parade at 140th and Pacific. Thus when the parade is over you will be near your trailer and your horse will be better cared for.

Bands and Foot Entrants

Most of the marching units will not parade the entire distance, so if those entrants will meet at the Parkland school they will be properly instructed from there. Be there early so we can get everything lined up in advance. The cattle will also meet at the Parkland school on Pacific Avenue. All the kiddies riding in the Kiddy contest sponsored by the National Bank of Washington will also meet between the school and the Methodist church.

Hundreds of Horses Entered

Literally hundreds of horses and riders in all types of costume will be on hand to lend color and atmosphere to the occasion. Many will be on horseback while others will appear in buggy, some have entered carts and other vehicles which should provide quite a spectacle to the thousands of spectators expected to view the gathering.

Route of Parade

The parade will start at Pochel's, located at 140th and Pacific Avenue, traveling Northward toward Tacoma just past the National Bank of Washington corner at Airport and Pacific, where the direction will be reversed southward down Pacific Ave. again. At Garfield street the entire parade will sweep down the home-stretch toward the carnival grounds and reviewing stand located there.

Most of the horse-drawn and motor vehicles and horses with riders will start at the beginning and ride throughout the entire route. The cattle from the Jersey Show will form at the Parkland school and will travel only the short distance down Garfield Street as will some of the younger children with tiny ponies and marching units since the distance will be too great for them otherwise. If there is any doubt where you are to form please contact a member of the committee at the Times-Journal or at Young's Gift Shop.

Roy Smith of Puyallup, well known for his ability to handle shows of this nature, will be our cowboy Parade Master. It will be his big job to handle all the routing and smooth running of the parade. He will be ably assisted by quite a few of the local horsemen in this area.

Kids and their horses are especially wanted to enter their portion of the show. We hope to have every possible entry in this classification. Prizes are being offered for the best dressed, most original, etc. It will be the fun of the year for the kids.

- 12:00—The big parade starts at 140th and Pacific, heading North to the bank corner at Airport and Pacific, then back again along Pacific to Garfield street, where the reviewing stand and judges will be located.
- 1:00—Parade enters Garfield street toward the carnival grounds. Judging of junior horsemen and tots on horseback and afoot. Prizes to be awarded by National Bank of Washington (four pair cowboy boots).
- 1:30—Judging continues of most authentic cowboy and cowgirl, 15 and under (2 prizes); Tots 10 and under judging (2 prizes).
- 2:00—Jersey Heifer judging with winners announced at the judging stand.
- 2:30—Big afternoon show starts on Garfield street with Senator Don Eastwood as master of ceremonies. Governor Langlie to address crowd. Several afternoon horsemanship acts; Lariettes; Junior Drill Team; Trick Horse; Talent Show and other acts.
- 5:30—Time to eat. There will be concessions on the grounds. Restaurants will have specials for the day. Treat the kids to a pony ride.
- 6:00—Parkland school doors open for the Crosley Community Carnival.
- 6:30—Evening horse show starts... riding, tricks, roping, pole bending. Fun for all.
- 7:00—Crosley Community Carnival starts at Parkland school. Door prizes, fun, gifts, music... lots of entertainment.

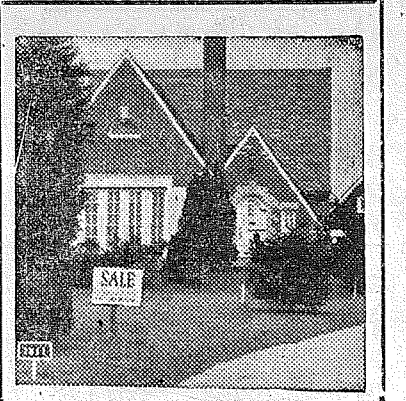
Fern Hill WSCS To Sponsor Show

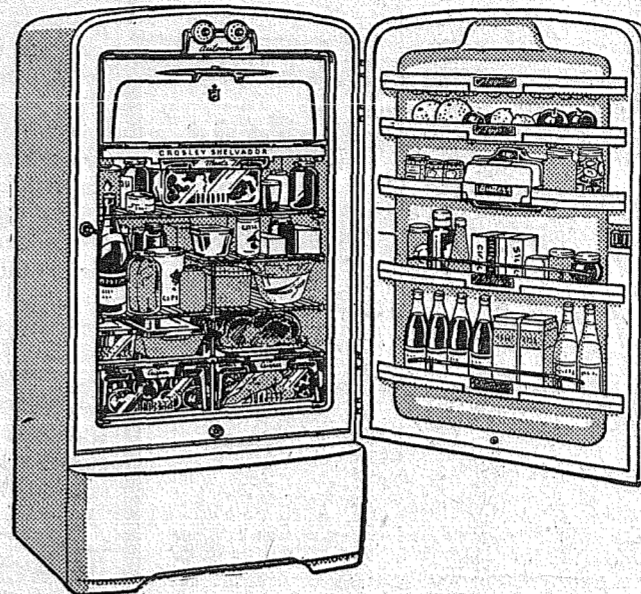
