S. E. TACOMA ON SCHEDULE

DRILLING OPERATIONS ON LAST WELL RAPIDLY NEARING COMPLETION

The Southeast Tacoma Mutual Water Project is progressing on schedule, according to Carl Taylor, manager. The No. 1 well at 98th and Jackson streets is fully completed as far as drilling is concerned. A special screen is now on order which will be placed at the bottom of the well. This screen's purpose is to nullify the possibility of ever pumping sandy water.

Drilling is still in progress at the No. 2 well site. The shaft is now down 412 feet. Two good water strata have been reached, but the driller, Pete Sylte Co., is attempting to reach one more before ceasing operations. One water strata was located at 200 feet and another at 394 feet. A third one will add sufficient water, it is expected, to care for the future population expansion anticipated in the Midland area.

Tower Next

According to word received from the Pittsburgh-Des Moines Steel company, the tower will be delivered in June or July. It will arrive in a prefabricated state and assembly at the 98th and Jackson property will follow immediately. This company is the same organization that held the contract for the Parkland water tower.

Carl Taylor, manager of the Southeast Tacoma Mutual, estimated that the company will be on its own by the last part of this summer. Taylor also announced that the mutual is now mailing quarterly statements for the first time in its history. This action is for the convenience of the members as well as the office.

BUSINESS CLUB SEEKS BANK

Having carried the City-County airport issue as far as possible at present, the Parkland Business Club is turning its efforts to a new South End need. After considerable discussion all members were emphatic in their desire to procure banking facilities for this area. More than 500 businesses would welcome and take advantage of such service. The club went on record as favoring an investigation into the possibilities of securing a suitable financial institution.

New Road Planned

Under the direction of the Woodworth Construction company, extensive remodeling is going on about the campus. A new black-top road will enter from the east side of the campus and swing around in front of the new science building and across the campus toward the west, meeting the intersection where the future girls' dormitory and new chapel will be built. This road will then emerge from the campus on the north side. Black-top roads will also be built to the Old Main and to the library as service roads.

New concrete sidewalks will be constructed between the Old Main building and the new Student Union building on the south, and between the new science hall and the new library. These sidewalks will be connected with concrete pathways also.

A black-top road will also be constructed between the main campus on the hill, down across Clover creek, and over to the new gymnasium. This will be lighted for evening use and will be beautified with shrubbery on either side.

Will Beautify Campus

For almost three weeks a controversy over the location of the airport raged throughout Tacoma and environs and not hardly a day went by without the South End getting mentioned in the metropolitan Tacoma papers as well as the community journals. Not only that but the South End still has a good chance to get that airport located at the site east of Spanaway now known as Forest Grove Airport.

However, whether the airport is secured or not, the South End is the victor because of the many columns of reading matter which appeared in newspapers regarding the situation. We still want the field and we have all the things that go to make up a super airport, so keep plugging, folks. We're big enough to get it, that's for sure!

Victory Not Always Sweet

The fruits of victory are not always sweet. That is something the Republicans in congress and in our own state legislature are finding out. And they are learning it the hard way.

On the national scene, there is anything but harmony in the ranks of the GOP. The Republicans rode to victory on promises of economy in government, tax reduction, and the like. Now those who insist that the party uphold its promises are at odds with those who cannot see relief in the immediate future.

A similar situation faces the legislature at Olympia. After many years of bitter criticism leveled at the Democratic regime, particularly accusing the Democrats of going on spending binges, the Republicans are in the saddle. They don't have the governorship, it's true, but they control the legislature and that is the body which decides how much money is to be spent and how it is to be raised.

And what do we find? The Republicans may have decided to trim a bit here and a bit there, but when the final omnibus appropriations measure is introduced it is likely it will call for larger expenditures than ever before.

The Republicans defend themselves, of course, both in congress and in the legislature by claiming the people still have to pay for Democratic commitments.

It isn't that easily explained. In the state of Washington, for instance, the demands upon each subsequent legislature continue to be greater. A great many of the demands are pressing and recognized as being virtually necessary of immediate fulfillment. For example: Teachers' salaries and educational facilities generally are woefully in need of correction; aid to senior citizens must be adjusted to meet present living costs.

Then, too, there is the matter of state bonuses to veterans, which would call for perhaps one hundred million dollars in payments to ex-service men and women.

That is only a portion of the huge problems facing our lawmakers, but it gives an idea of the immensity of the situation.

The moral of this is that one shouldn't make promises he can't fulfill. Certainly the Republicans can't be blamed for the mess the world is in, but they shouldn't blame the Democrats, either.

The GOP is in an embarrassing position, and who wants to bet that the Democrats aren't just as well satisfied that the Republicans are in the saddle now?—Western Railway Review.

Dear Editor:

In regard to your editorial in the February 13, 1947, issue of the Prairie Pointer the Tacoma Real Estate Board wishes to point out various misstatements of fact. It is easy to employ emotional language and to be satirical, ironic or sarcastic, the true test of man as a thinking animal is when he is able to use pure reason and not emotion in discussing his problems; therefore, we shall attempt to adhere to the FACTS. We might further state that we are not beating the drum for any politician, but where an obvious injustice has been done we would like to see it corrected.

First, the Seattle Post-Intelligencer has always widely publicized the newly elected officials, thus their series of stories on Harry Cain were a customary procedure and not a special build-up of any kind.

Second, the \$35 a day hotel suite was taken by necessity and not by choice, Washington, D. C., having the most acute housing shortage in the country.

Third, the linking of Senator Taft and Senator Cain in their opposition to Dillon F. Meyer is really laughable, as even most laymen know that although these two are opposed to Mr. Meyer as head of the Federal Public Housing Authority it is for widely divergent reasons. Senator Taft is one of the most ardent "public housers" in the senate as a perusal of the Taft-sponsored Wagner-Ellender-Taft Bill will readily disclose, while Senator Cain is opposed to any more government participation and bungling in the housing field.

Fourth, the idea that the peoples money went into the various housing projects therefore they should get it back in the form of low rents is poor reasoning. Why should a few people benefit from these low rent projects at the expense of the rest of the taxpayers?

The present projects under the Lanham Act are rented at a nominal figure and the tenants and everyone concerned are quite satisfied. We shall not attempt to enumerate the vast number of logical reasons why we are opposed to making Lincoln Heights, for instance, a low rent housing project. However, the reason all of this controversy concerning low rent projects arose was due to certain highly placed federal employees in the FPHA who could see the end of their jobs in sight and are desperately trying to promote some sort of a proposition that would prolong their tenure of office.

Yes, the WPA "shovel leasers" of old are still with us only now they have a college education, wear a white collar and get \$8,000 per year which is one of the reasons those deductions on that weekly pay check are so large.
