PARKLAND MUSIC INSTRUCTOR IN PHILHARMONIC

H. G. Moen, instructor in music at Parkland school, will be a member of Tacoma Philharmonic orchestra for the series of concerts in April and May. Mr. Moen will be in the violin section of the full 75-piece orchestra under the baton of Eugene Linden. The concert series marks a milestone in the cultural life of the Northwest, the beginnings of an annual music festival. Mr. Linden recently spent a year in Salzburg, Austria, where the annual festival attracts the great artists of all nations, and the local project reflects the ideals of the European event, with several famous musicians appearing as guest artists at the several concerts. The Salzburg music festival was not brought to its present world-wide fame in a year, or a hundred years. It is the result of more than 200 years, during which time it has acquired a wealth of tradition making it unique in international music. A special student concert is scheduled for Tuesday afternoon, April 10, in the Temple theater, with Parkland's quota of 30 tickets allotted to junior high school students who will go to Tacoma by bus.
