## P.L.C. GRIDDERS LIMBERING UP

#### SEVENTY MEN TURN OUT FOR FIRST PRACTICE SESSION ON TUESDAY

For most of the students at Pacific Lutheran College, classes don't begin for another two weeks. But for some 70 boys who turned out for the football squad, sessions began Tuesday and will continue daily.

So far, the "classes" have consisted only in issuing uniforms and getting the "feel" of the pigsink, but according to Coach Marv Tommervik, it won't be long before the boys will divide into about half a dozen teams and start scrimmaging work.

The Gladiators face two of their most crucial games of the season on Sept. 20 and 27. The P.L.C.-St. Olaf tilt on the 20th will decide the mythical Lutheran College football championship of America, St. Olaf being the strongest Lutheran team in East. The second game will decide the 1947 Tacoma championship when the Lutes play College of Puget Sound.

Tommervik, who has rejected many generous offers to play on professional football teams including a recent one from New York, refused to comment on the Gladiators' prospects, but there are indications that P.L.C. will be showing a lot of its prewar gridiron razzle-dazzle this season.

Everyone who does not attend Sunday school elsewhere is invited to make use of this service that is offered to the people that we reach with the two bus routes.


#### ILLNESS AT WHEEL OF CAR CAUSES SERIOUS MISHAP

## Sign or No Sign

The State Highway department has tossed itself a "hot potato" in the road sign situation.

When the Tenino Cut-Off Association was organized and raised funds to erect the neon sign directing traffic over the short route from Tenino to Tacoma, permission of the highway department was obtained. A neat sum of money was expended for this sign and after it was in place proved very effective in switching a large flow of traffic over the short route. That, of course, is the fly in the ointment. Business firms in Olympia soon felt the disadvantage to them and quickly took action.

The highway officials bowed to the heavy pressure from Olympia and ordered the Cut-Off Association's sign either removed or covered, declaring it to be a traffic hazard. The sign is now covered but the matter is definitely not settled. Officials of the cut-off group have met with the highway department heads and an amicable solution is being sought.

There are quite a few signs throughout the state which direct traffic over so-called shortcuts, one of which looms brightly on the Seattle-Tacoma highway pointing to a short route to Mount Rainier through Puyallup. This was erected by joint financing of Puyallup business firms and has proven very effective.

If the Tenino sign creates a traffic hazard then all of these others must cause similar dangers at their locations. The state officials will have to clarify their stand in regard to all of these signs or be accused of discriminating against one small group because of pressure from the larger civic bodies.

## A Note of Appreciation



With respect to government buying for shipments abroad, while these have not been great as compared with the total production of meat in this country, the fact remains that during the second quarter, the government bought about 140 million pounds of beef, grading good and commercial—the grades usually most available to the average housewife. 
