CEASE CHASING FIRE TRUCKS, IS SPANWAY EDICT

If the volunteers see any cars impeding their progress, the license number will be reported to the State Patrol and tickets will be issued.

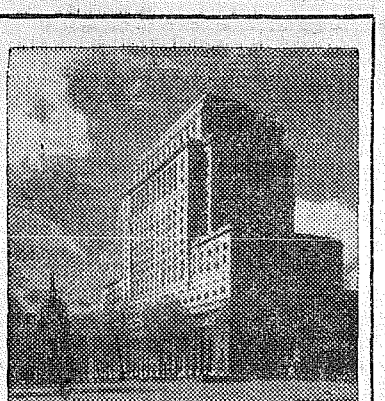

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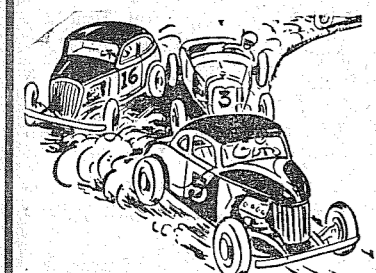

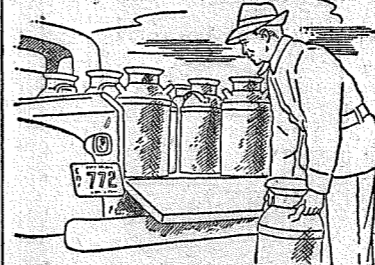

Handy Jim's EXIN-UP TIPS For Farm and Home

Proper Care of Milk Cans

WHEN milk or cream is down-graded or rejected at market, the cause often can be traced to the condition of the dairy farmer's milk cans. Dented, battered old cans are a menace to the farmer's profits and should be discarded promptly.

Damage to the tin inner coating of milk cans many times is the result of bad washing practices on the dairy farm. Even though cans are washed at the dairy they must be washed also on the farm.



Observe these simple precautions for greatest safety: Use cleaning compounds exactly as recommended by the manufacturer. Be absolutely sure that all moisture is removed from cans after cleaning. Cans must be dry before covers are replaced.

Proper care of milk cans usually pays off in the form of larger milk checks. Other common-sense rules to observe in handling milk cans are these:

1. Carry cans to desired location; do not drop, throw or roll them.
2. Leave covers off empty cans when not in use.
3. Avoid scratching the insides of cans with stirring rods. It is vitally important to remove rods after stirring.
4. Do not allow sour contents to remain in cans for long periods.
5. Keep cans moving. Avoid long periods of storage and idleness.
6. Inspect cans regularly. If cans have been damaged so that their safety as sanitary containers is questionable, replace them with new cans.
