

Sewer Controversy To Be Aired

FP Study Prompted New Law

A Franklin Pierce Education Council study of district school bus transportation problems instigated the measure to provide sidewalks for school children that was signed into law by Governor Dan Evans last week.

HB 451, dropped into the legislative hopper by State Representative Ted Bottiger, will provide state matching funds up to 90% for the installation of school walkways if local school districts can show sidewalk construction will eliminate the need for extensive bus schedules.

State law mandates that school districts must provide transportation for students living more than 2 miles from schools or for students walking along roads determined to be hazardous. Roads have been determined hazardous if there is an insufficient amount of shoulder space to provide safe walkways for children.

The new law could provide substantial savings for Franklin Pierce District taxpayers by drastically reducing the amount of millage asked each year for school bus replacement and maintenance. Greatest amount of school bus tax money would be saved in the Elmhurst Elementary School area, where safe walkways would eliminate the need to bus 300 students to school, according to Franklin Pierce Supt. E.E. Hill.

Other parts of the district being studied for possible walkway requests are in the Andrew Christensen and Brookdale Elementary School areas, Dr. Hill disclosed. School buses cost in the neighborhood of \$21,000 each, and previous studies have revealed the district requires two replacements per year. "This is one of the items that has been breaking the district's back financially," Dr. Hill stated.

The Franklin Pierce Education Council, a lay committee of 5 members appointed by the school board, was requested to study school bus routing in an effort to find ways of economizing on the spiraling cost of busing children to school.

During the study, FPED member Mrs. Homer Borders of the Christensen School area originated the idea of installing walkways to cut bus expense. Dr. Hill, seeing merit in the suggestion, contacted Representative Bottiger who wrote the bill with the help of school authorities.

Helping Bottiger push the measure through the avalanche of legislative proposals in Olympia were Representatives Audley Mahaffey, Frank Broulette, and Senators Reuben Knoblauch and John T. McCutcheon.

"This is a classic example of how a group of civic-minded citizens can instigate constructive legislation from the grass roots level," Bottiger said of the bill. "Everyone seemed to work as a team to make this idea materialize into reality."

Co. Improvement Ass'n Organizes Panel Discussion

An attempt to clarify some of the confusion surrounding proposed sanitary and storm sewers will be the object of a public meeting sponsored by the Pierce County Improvement Association to be held 8 p.m. April 25 at Keithley Junior High School auditorium.

Association members are planning to invite a panel representing the South Suburban Sewer District, County Engineer's Office, County Health Department, and possibly the Prosecuting Attorney's Office. Although members of the Board of County Commissioners will not be able to attend the meeting due to previous commitments, it is expected that Keith Jones will represent the board as well

as the engineer's office. The program will include a question and answer period. Members of the panel will speak on their individual agency's interest in the sewer program.

Representatives of the University Place Citizen's Council and the Midland Improvement Club have also been invited.

The Pierce County Improvement Association resulted from local opposition to sewer district plans. Temporary officers are Leo Wilson, president, and George Bitner, secretary - treasurer. The group has not had a membership meeting as yet, but an organizational meeting is expected to be held soon.

Parkland Cleanup Eyes Abandoned Auto Removal

The clean-up committee of the Parkland Development Association outlined plans to crack down on abandoned vehicles during the organization's annual clean-up drive scheduled for May 5-6, according to Ray Manges, committee chairman.

The announcement was made during a recent committee meeting attended by two organizations volunteering help. The Triton Car Club and Citizens Band Radio Club will participate in clean-up activities.

A public notice, quoting parts of the Pierce County Zoning Code, will be printed and distributed prior to clean-up day, Manges reported. The notice will state: "You are hereby notified that the Pierce County Zoning Code prohibits the repairing, dismantling, junking, wrecking and/or storing of automobiles not in operable condition in this area, unless within an enclosed building."

"Violation of the Pierce,

County Zoning Code is a misdemeanor, punishable by fine of not more than \$250, or 90 days confinement in the County Jail," the notice continues. It will be sent to offenders.

The notification idea resulted from a meeting between Vern Voss, who heads the subcommittee on abandoned cars, and Sheriff Jack Berry.

"The Sheriff's Department was enthusiastic in receiving aid in the removal of these automobiles," Voss reported. "Abandoned cars have posed a serious problem to the Sheriff's Department in the past few years."

Voss Brothers Auto Wreckers will also cooperate with the Parkland Development Association in the removal of abandoned vehicles.

Deputies Investigate \$4,000 Summit Burglary
