Editor, Parkland Times:

In regard to the choice of a site for the new Bethel high school, I should like to add my opinion for whatever it may be worth.

I have been in favor of the Bowman site, first because it is located nearest to the center of population of the district, and second, because it is on a paved highway that is open all year around.

However, after hearing that it would cost a fortune to clear away enough trees and underbrush to erect a building, and that there was a large pot hole in the center of the property that is filled with water most of the year, I decided to investigate for myself.

I drove out to the property to really look it over. It is true there are quite a number of trees along the highway. However, about 30 feet in is a clearing large enough for a baseball field. I walked on through more trees, but no underbrush, up a slope to the upper level. On top, instead of finding a pot hole, I found a level clearing large enough for a building of any size.

What more could be desired for a million-dollar school? A beautiful park-like area with the building on the upper level and the athletic field in a natural bowl below.

It's true some trees would have to be moved, but wouldn't the trees pay for their own removal with the present high price of lumber?

Is it necessary to place a school we wish to be proud of on a back road on a piece of property that is bordered on two sides by farms and stumps and on another by the Bonneville power lines? A piece of property void of even one tree or any natural beauty?

The Bowman property is as close

to Elk Plain as the Castle property. Why are the people of Elk Plain so desperately opposed to having the high school where the majority of the people want it? They have nothing to lose, since the school will be in their back yard no matter which site is chosen. Why hide it out in the sticks?

If everyone would walk through the property and see for themselves what it is like, they would know the Bowman site is the one to vote for.

BIBLE SCHOOL TO START MONDAY

Monday, June 19, at 9 a.m., is scheduled for the opening of the Vacation Bible School of Parkland Lutheran Church, at the Concordia Lutheran school, 129th and Mt. Highway.
