## Parish Hall Rites Sun. At Trinity

Years of planning and praying and six months of actual construction will be climaxed this Sunday noon, when members of Parkland Trinity Lutheran senior and junior congregations march from their respective worship services to witness the laying of the cornerstone of the church's new \$100,000 parish house.

Dr. Ernest B. Steen, pastor of the church; Prof. Kelmer N. Roe, junior service pastor; and the Rev. J. U. Xavier, chairman of the board of deacons, will conduct the service. John Richards, the architect; Burt Raymond, chairman of the building committee; Dr. Philip Hauge, member of the planning committee; and Mrs. Stella Jacobs, Sunday School superintendent, will assist in the cornerstone laying.

The building project has been in progress since June, and is moving rapidly toward completion. When the bricklayers finish within a couple weeks, all exterior work will be done. The heating system is already in operation, and sheetrock is being applied on the interior.

It is expected that the large educational plant will be put into use in January even though it will not be completed in all details. When finished, the hall will supply accommodations for the expanding program of the church, including the educational, worship, social and administrative activities.

While the construction of such a large structure, with its 25 classrooms, three offices, social room, chapel and apartment was an expensive undertaking, yet thousands of dollars have been saved by the volunteer labor of young and old in the church.

The growing church and Sunday School will be able to offer accommodations and opportunities which are probably unsurpassed in the Pacific Northwest. That the facilities are critically needed is demonstrated by the fact that the Sunday School's enrollment is now at an all-time high, totalling over 500 children and young people.

This week marked the opening of the 43rd annual Christmas Seal sale in the United States; and the 40th consecutive annual sale in Pierce county. The Tuberculosis League of Pierce County was not organized until 1910 when the first Seal Sale was held locally.

Mrs. Carl Colton and Mrs. Charles Phipps, local chairmen, explained that this year's Christmas Seal has a good deal of traditional ideas behind it. "Take the dove, for instance. The dove has always been associated with the bearing of good tidings. It was a dove which returned to the Ark with a green sprig, informing Noah that the flood was over. It is also an emblem of peace."

A traditional Christmas green, holly was used on the first American Christmas Seal in 1907. Other Seals which had holly in the design were those of 1908, 1909, 1918 and 1925.

Mrs. Colton and Mrs. Phipps continued, "The Druids believed that the sun never set on holly because the leaves were evergreen. Thus, the Druids believed holly was sacred. The custom grew to place holly on doors and windows to keep out evil spirits."

### Describe Job Rehabilitation

Lately the people of the South End have been hearing a lot about the Civilian Vocational Rehabilitation program because both training officers for Pierce county live in Parkland. They are Payson H. Jeynes and Albert C. Johnson. The Tacoma office for the State Board for Vocational Education, Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, is in the Provident Bldg.

This office helps people of working age who have a substantial job handicap to secure training or employment. This service is provided jointly by the Federal and State governments. The objective of the program being to restore and conserve the working usefulness of the handicapped person in the job where he can make the best use of his abilities.

The service is open to all persons with disabilities that are readily seen such as amputees as well as those people with unseen handicaps such as tuberculosis, diabetes, hernia, arthritis, deafness, heart disease, etc.

Civilian Rehabilitation Services may be divided into four parts: Counsel and guidance, which includes complete physical examinations to determine the extent of the disability and limitations; physical restoration, which includes medical, surgical, and psychiatric treatment, hospitalization, drugs, nursing care and artificial appliances; training to develop the skills and abilities.
