Morris Ford Urges "YES" To School Aid Referendums

"For the sake of your children's future, vote 'Yes' on Referendums 7, 8 and 9, and HJR 10 at the November election," voters were urged this week by Morris E. Ford, superintendent of the Franklin Pierce school district.

He pointed out that present trends indicate that the district must prepare to accommodate between 1,200 to 1,500 more students within the next six or seven years.

Ford stated that "there are 574 pupils in the Franklin Pierce school district housed in standard classrooms at the present time. New homes under construction right now should bring another 200 pupils into the school system before the completion of the present school year."

The Franklin Pierce school district had 2,539 pupils as of Oct. 1 of this year, with an assessed taxable valuation of \$3,142,246, or slightly less than \$1,241 of taxable property per pupil enrolled, which will only raise \$7.45 per pupil per year.

The district had 1,879 pupils on Oct. 1 of 1948, and 2,539 on Oct. 1, 1950, or an increase of 35.1 per cent over a two-year period.

The Parkland school had 661 pupils in 1944 and now has reached an enrollment of 1,251, an increase of 89.4 per cent over a 6-year period.

Said Ford: "Approximately 800 high school students are leaving this area to go into Clover Park, Lincoln and Puyallup high schools and, because of this, 4 mills of our school tax is diverted into the non-residence high school fund. This situation also adds materially to our transportation problem."

"I think it only fair to point out that the \$40 million which was specified as the need of the public schools two years ago will now be inadequate

Spanaway volunteer firemen's auxiliary will meet on Monday, Nov. 6.

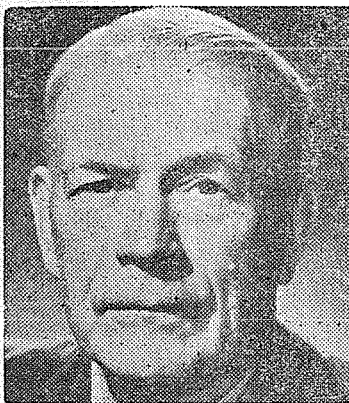

Parkland's Library Building Scheduled Here Wednesday

Parkland's library building will be at its Parkland site by this weekend, it was learned early this week. The Cooney Moving Co. will move the building here for the reported price of \$175. According to Roy Kreger, president of the Community club, the building has already been insured for \$5,000.

The quonset hut, costing \$1,670, was purchased last week. It was the main office building at the Narrows bridge construction site.

Earlier this week a bulldozer "loaned" by Walter Balmer worked over the two lots 130 feet west of Pacific Ave. on the south side of 119th St. When the building arrives, it was hoped that Frank Gratiot's construction firm would set the building. It was also hoped that a donor of a septic tank could be found. Utilities hook-up must also be completed before the building can be used.

E-P Community church is sponsoring a building kick-off turkey dinner Saturday, Nov. 11, from 5 to 8 p. m., in the school dining room.

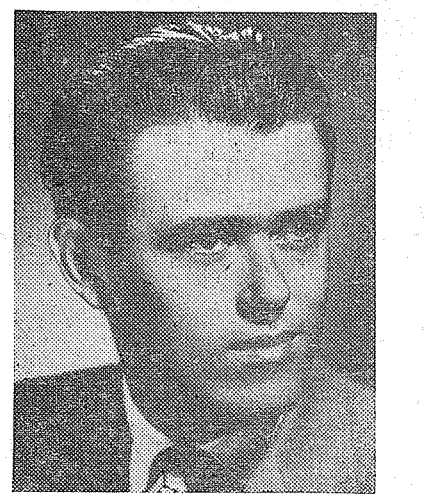

1. Taxes . . . I believe the whole state tax structure must be re-examined in the light of public demand for increased services and the inflated dollar. However, under no condition will I support an increase in the state sales tax.

2. Deficit spending . . . deficit spending can be justified only in times of emergency. In the light of present prosperity we must balance the state budget.

3. Schools and public institutions . . . It is a shame that two years ago the state legislature passed the "buck" to the voters on support for these vital needs; we will pay heavily for delay as construction costs mount. I favor referendum numbers 7, 8 and 9.

4. Pensions . . . I believe in a liberal grant for Senior citizens. One that will meet the cost of living index. I believe our Senior citizens should not be treated as charity cases but under state and national laws, treated as deserving pensioners as a matter of right. I am not satisfied that any existing or proposed law is the solution to this very difficult but very important problem.

5. Public Power . . . Tacoma as well as the entire Pacific Northwest is suffering from a power shortage which has meant a loss of thousands of job opportunities. I will do more than give lip service to the pledge of vigorous work to increase electric output and remedy this alarming situation.

6. Conservation . . . I favor an active reforestation program, using lands good only for the growing of timber on a sustained yield basis. I BELIEVE that in a democracy, if you give the people the facts they will intelligently exercise their franchise. This I have attempted to do. No matter what your political convictions may be, exercise them by voting November 7.
