New PLU Building Gets Okay

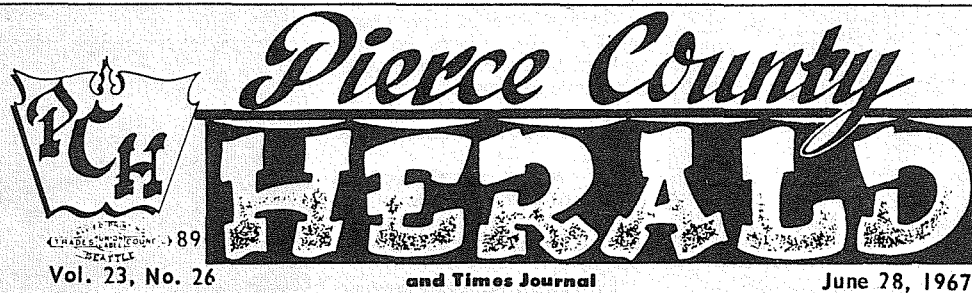
The proposed Clifford O. Olson Physical Education - Auditorium Building to be built this year at Pacific Lutheran University has received the endorsement of two local officials, school administrators announced Monday.

Tacoma Mayor Harold M. Tollefson and Pierce County Commissioner Harry Sprinker both praised the auditorium and stage facilities that will be part of the structure.

"This building will provide an attractive facility for large meetings and will appeal to local people because of its need in Pierce County," said Sprinker.

Tollefson added: "Many groups now by-pass Tacoma because there are not adequate facilities for large meetings. This new auditorium will be one more fine asset towards improving the Tacoma area."

Plans are being presented to the University this summer by the Tacoma architect Robert Billsbrough Price. The bid invitation is set for early in September.

Learn To Swim Program

500 Children A Day Visiting PLU Pool

Over 500 school children are brought by bus to Pacific Lutheran University's swimming pool every weekday morning to participate in one of Pierce County's "Learn to Swim" programs.

Starting at 9 a.m., and continuing through 12:30 p.m., children from Franklin Pierce Bethel, and Lakewood school districts arrive every half hour to take swimming classes.

The children, in shifts of 70, spend three weeks in the program. At PLU, and other pools throughout the county, they are taught how to swim. For the more experienced swimmers, courses are offered in life saving and water safety.

Richard Alseth, director of the county's swimming program and manager of PLU's pool, said nearly 1,500 persons will participate at the University this summer.

The program, he said, is divided into three sessions to accommodate as many people as possible. The present group will finish its training on June 30, and the next class of 500 will start July 5. The last session ends August 15.

But PLU's olympic-size pool is filled by more than the learn-to-swim participants, said Alseth.

"During the month of June alone at least 3,000 persons will use the pool," he said. This includes students at the University, a large number of Parkland-area people, and the swimming-class members.

This year nearly 1,800 more children have registered for the swimming lessons than last summer. But the biggest increase, he said, is in the number of people using the pool during the community-swim periods.

Last year, Alseth said, 28,150 persons -- other than University students -- swam in the pool. Through June 1 of

this year, he noted, already 29,500 have used the facility. Community swim hours are from 1 to 3:30 p.m., all week, and from 6 to 9 p.m., every day except Tuesday and Sunday.

Because the PLU pool is completely enclosed, Alseth said he gets more swimmers on cloudy, wet days than he does when the sun is shining.

"When the sun shines they go to the beach, but when it is raining they come here," he said.

The pool water is heated to 82 degrees, he added, which makes it comfortable the year around. In addition, the glass walls that enclose the pool area open to an outside sundeck for use during suitable weather.

REGISTRATION

Registrations for the second session of swim instruction at the Pacific Lutheran University pool July 5-25 will be taken next week for Franklin Pierce, Parkland, Bethel and Lakewood residents.

Franklin Pierce and Parkland youngsters may register at the PLU pool office through Friday this week from 6:30-8:30 p.m. Bethel registration will be Wednesday and Thursday from 5-7 p.m. in the high school.

Registration for the Lakewood area will be accepted through Wednesday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in the school district office.

The second-session fee is \$4, including \$2 for transportation from the Lakewood area.

The second session of instruction at Surprise Lake will be held July 5-25. Registration will be taken July 5 from 1-2 p.m. at the instruction area. A fee of \$4 is required.

16 Princesses To Sell Buttons In Royal Race

Over 1600 Parkland Roundup buttons will be distributed to 16 princesses Friday to go on sale for one dollar each starting July 1, Business Club President John Guizzetti told club members during the June meeting last week.

Princesses must sell 100 buttons in order to qualify as a candidate for the title of Roundup Queen, Guizzetti said. 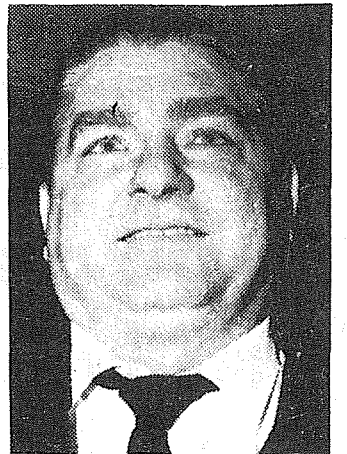

Beard Contest Rules Listed

Grangers Of Month

A couple from Trondheim, Norway, who never met until they came to Washington state, are being honored as "Grangers of the Month" for June.

Mr. and Mrs. P.A. Larsen were nominated for the award by friends at Collins Grange, where they are Silver Star members.

Mrs. Larsen, the former Hannah Balstad, was the eldest of two children born to Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Balstad, who lived near Trondheim. When she was four years old, the family decided to find a new home in the United States and settled in Fertile, Minn.

Following the death of Balstad and one of the children, Mrs. Balstad brought her family to Washington, arriving in Tacoma in October, 1925.

Here Hannah Balstad was employed at Annie Wright Seminary.

While Miss Balstad was working at the Tacoma private school, a young man named Phillip Larsen in Trondheim joined the Norwegian navy and served during World War I.

Following the war, Larsen decided to visit the United States. He arrived in Tacoma in January 1927 and found work at St. Paul Mill, where he continued 38 years. Along with a new job, he acquired land in the Collins area.

The paths from Trondheim finally converged at the home

of mutual friends, where Larsen met Miss Balstad. They were married Oct. 1, 1927.

They built a home on Larsen's land holding in the Collins area, and a daughter, Gudrun, was born.

On May 11, 1952 the Larsen's joined the Collins Grange. Their daughter joined the following month.

They have served as officers and committee members in the Grange, becoming members also of the Pomona, State and National Granges.

In 1960 they participated actively in the Golden Anniversary Pageant of Pierce County Pomona Grange 16. They have yearly helped put up and decorate the Collins Grange booth at the Pierce County Fair.

The Larsens are also active in the Friendly Club at Collins Grange. They have volunteered custodial service when groups rent the hall, guaranteeing the Collins Grange finances to keep the hall in good repair.

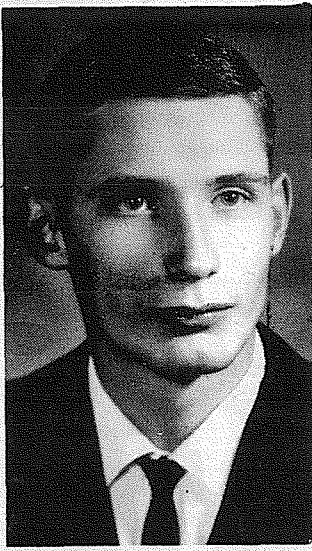

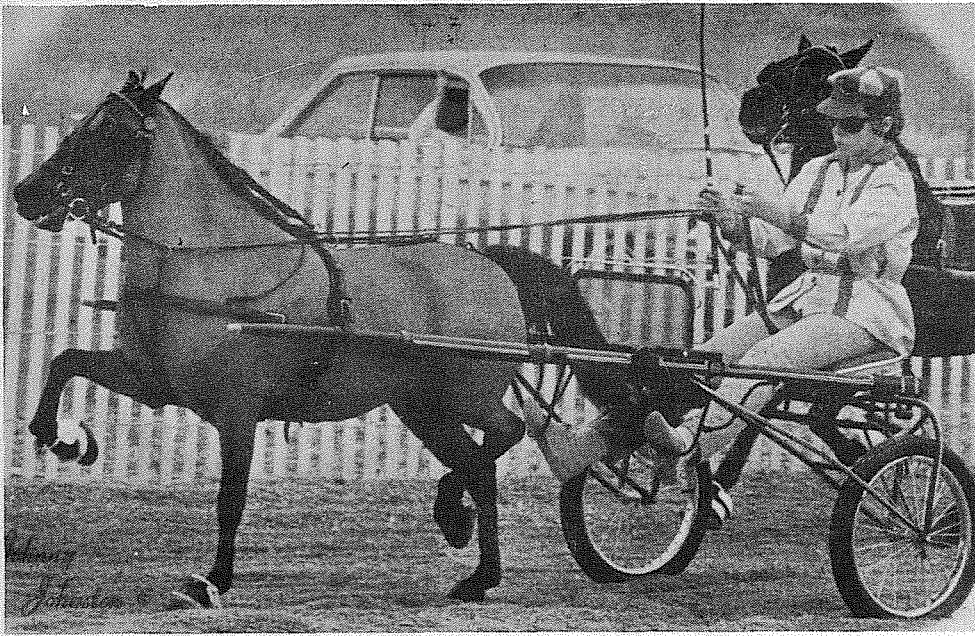

Dairy Tries Cocktail-Mix Forage Crop

The animal equivalent of vegetable cocktail is being grown by conservation-conscious Cloverleaf Dairy. b

The dairy, located on the Sumner-Orting highway, has

planted a trial six acres of alfalfa and orchard grass mixture for forage.

This alternate-row seeding was established through the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service and the Pierce County Soil and Water Conservation District.

They claim that mixtures

of grass and clover or grass and alfalfa have so far proven to be excellent forage for beef as well as for dairy cattle.

The largest problem of the forage experimentation is in keeping the legume from being choked out by the grass, but this is true more for the clover and grass plantings than for those with alfalfa and grass.

The choking problem is due to cool, wet, spring weather favoring grass growth, while clovers and alfalfa prefer warmer weather.

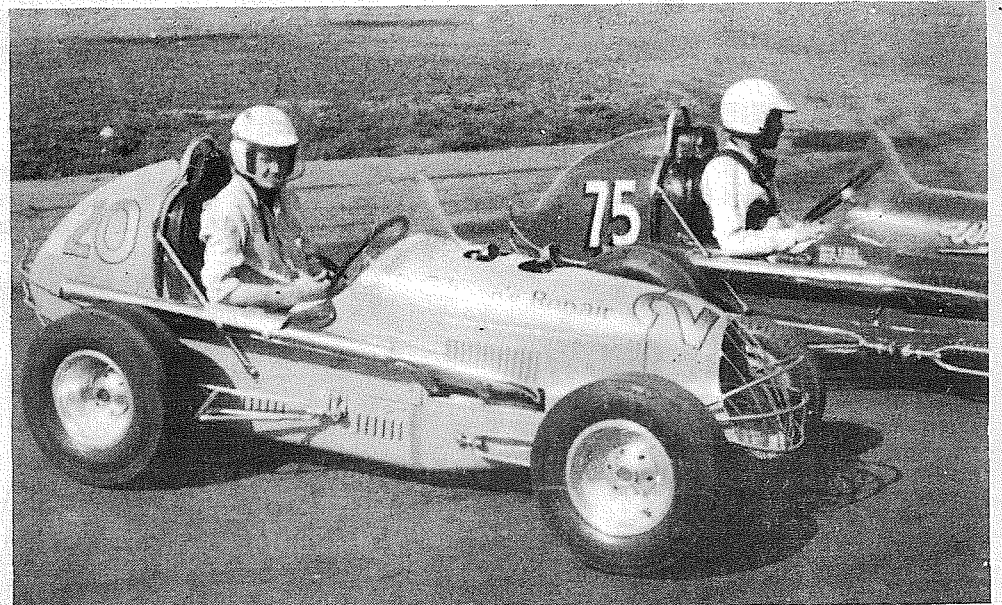
In Cloverleaf's planting, grass seed mixed with rice hulls was seeded through the grain box compartment of the drill, while alfalfa inoculated with proper bacteria was seeded through the grass seeder attachment.

Mountain Snow Pack Heavy Most Back Country Lakes Not Ready To 'Open' July 4

OLYMPIA - With a week to go, prospects are for fewer than normal of Washington's back country lakes to open for the July 4 fishermen.

Although the state's high lakes legally open to angling in April or May, the 4th of July marks the unofficial opening of the mountain lakes for most fishermen, as frozen waters and snow-blocked trails hamper efforts until this time of the year.

Late winter snows and a slow melt offer a discouraging outlook for the many anglers who will attempt to start off from White Pass, Snoqualmie or Stevens passes on the 4th this year, says the State Game Department.

As an aid to the angler, the Game Department annually flies the Cascade range just before the big weekend to survey open waters and general snow conditions. This year's flight, by Department Pilot Clayton Barnes, was made on June 19.

The survey showed nearly all of the country above White Pass still buried in snow. Some of the lakes above Denny Creek Campground are open, but most between Snoqualmie Pass and Stevens Pass are frozen solid.

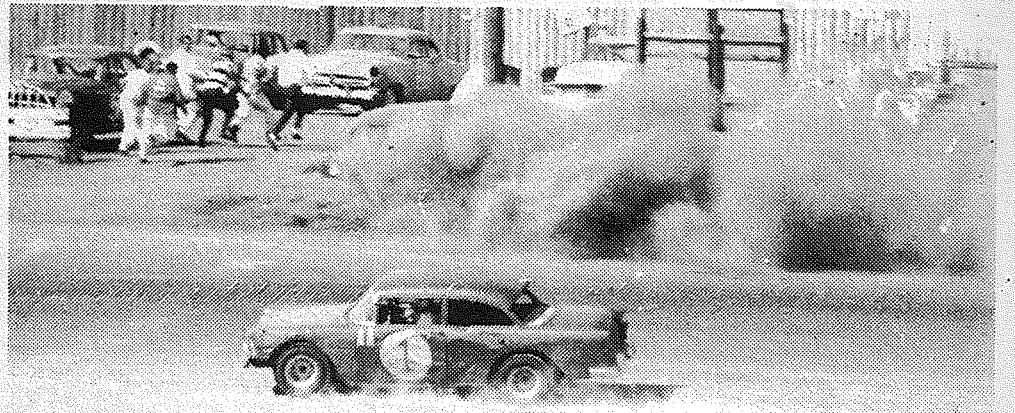
The general snow condition in the Cascade mountains in Washington is similar to that of 1964; a heavy snowpack arriving in late winter, and a cool spring holding back snow melt.

Soil Conservation Service measurements of snow courses as of June 1 indicated a snow cover generally 75 per cent greater than average, and over 100 per cent greater than that which occurred last year.

Sewer Dist. Plan Designed To Serve 39,000 Population

A long-range plan for construction and operation of a sewer system to serve an eventual 39,000 people in the Parkland area has been prepared by the South Suburban Sewer District.

Announcement of the plan, which has been submitted to the Housing and Urban Development Department and the State Pollution Control Commission for consideration for federal grants, was made by Clayton B. Peterson, President of the Sewer District.

The estimated costs of the sewer system are \$2,785,000. Grants totalling \$1,107,900 have been requested. If the total requests are approved and funds are available the cost of the system to the members would be \$1,677,100.

The new plan is based on engineering, population and

community studies prepared by Harstad and Associates, Seattle, consulting engineers to the district. The population projection for the service area of the sewer district is based on the available data and on a formula of 3.5 persons per house and 2.5 houses per acre with occupancy at saturation of 90 percent of the land. At the present time 8,300 people live in the sewer district.

The plan is specifically projected over the next 30 years. Normal procedures call for periodic reviews of the long-range plan to determine the validity of the forecasts and to update them as needed.

In announcing the plans for the future, Peterson said, "The annexation of four additional areas to the sewer district clears the way for new forward steps to achieve a permanent solution to the problems of sewage and future development in the area. It is a great victory for the people of the Parkland area. The fact that this is the first sewer district in Pierce County to have achieved this status is due to the hard work of more than 125 citizens."

For two years many of them have worked with the Commissioners to secure signatures on petitions and fulfill the legal requirements for establishing and expanding a sewer district. We are pleased and proud of this great community interest in permanently solving our problems of soil pollution, growth and development.

"Since its inception the South Suburban Sewer District has followed precisely the steps set forth by the

state legislature. Through the press, special publications and public meetings we have endeavored to keep the public fully informed of the plans, procedures and progress of the sewer district.

"Now we must move ahead and form a Utility Local Improvement District (U.L.I.D.) Then an assessment roll will be prepared and every landowner will be informed of his assessment. A public hearing will then be held so that landowners who wish may appeal their assessment. These steps are required by law before bids can be let and construction begun. We fervently hope this can be completed this summer.

"The Sewer Commissioners have discussed with the County Commissioners the possibilities of a county-wide disposal system being established under the new county facilities law. There was general agreement that the county-wide system is desirable. However, as with all new laws, there are many problems as to how this may be achieved in the most efficient and economical manner. Because building costs continue to rise and growth in this area is effectively stymied, it is important that we get sewers at the earliest possible moment and at the lowest possible cost.

"While the outlook is optimistic a great deal of work remains to be done before sewers can become a reality. We must continue to rely on the interest and cooperation of the people of this area to help insure that we have an operative sewer system."

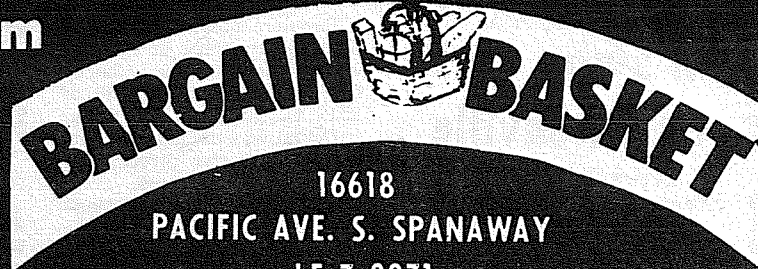
