V. F. W. INTRODUCES "GOLD STAR" MEASURE

The Veterans of Foreign Wars has introduced legislation to authorize naturalization of Japanese "Gold Star" mothers and fathers, Robert A. Yothers, state senior vice commander of the V. F. W., announced today.

Chances for passage of this legislation, HR 3555, have been greatly increased by the favorable report of the house immigration sub-committee, Yothers said.

Originating as a personal recommendation two years ago in V. F. W. Post No. 8 of Los Angeles, Calif., the resolution was drafted into a bill by the legislative section of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and presented to the first session of the 80th congress for early consideration.

The immigration sub-committee has amended the V. F. W. bill to include all alien "Gold Star" parents who would otherwise be ineligible for American citizenship, Commander Yothers said.

"More than 1,200 Japanese 'Gold Star' parents and an undetermined number of other foreign nationals will qualify for American citizenship, if the V. F. W. legislation is enacted," Yothers concluded.

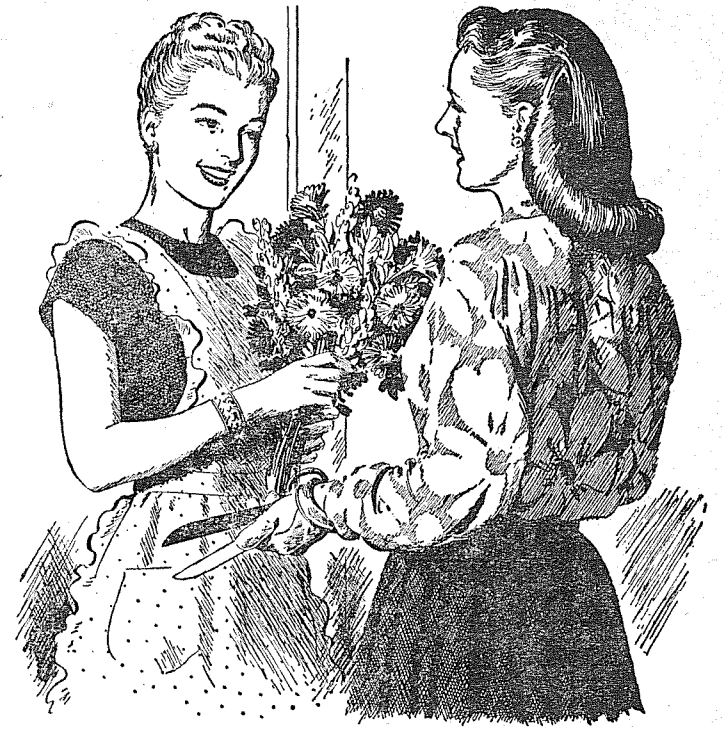

 "Spanaw is going to have to do one of two things. Either get a new sewage system or a water system. This town is becoming so overcrowded with sewage which has been placed too near the water supplies. This will have to be changed soon as it is becoming a potential health hazard and will soon be a health hazard."
 Mr. Parsons further said, "Don't forget, many diseases such as typhoid and polio, result from water supplies."
 Residents are urged to remember that the election to be held on August 16 is to vote for a water district and to elect three water commissioners, not to place them under any obligation.
