

Prof. Magnus Nodtvelt

Professor Magnus Nodtvedt will | join the faculty at Pacific Lutheran College as professor of political science, history, and Church history on September 1.

Mr. Nodtvedt completed the requirements for the A. B. degree at St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, in 1917, being a Nelson-Talla scholarship student in his senior year. He served in the regular United States Army in World War I and as Chaplain in the United States Army in World War II. He received the Master of Arts degree from Columbia University, New York City, in June, 1920, in the field of political science.

He has held teaching positions at the Canton Lutheran Normal School, Canton, South Dakota; instructor in political science at the University of Iowa; interim professor at Luther Theological Seminary, St. Paul, Minnesota; and professor of religion at Concordia College, Moorhead, Minnesota.

During the school year 1927-28 Mr. Nordtvedt continued graduate studies at Princeton University and Princeton Seminary on a fellowship from the latter and with a stipend from Concordia College He received the Master of Theology degree from Princeton Seminary in Church history. 

Representing the Pierce County Health Department, Mr. Tom Wilson of Tacoma explained that Spanaway is becoming overcrowd ed with sewages, especially in the business district, so as to soon become a hazard to the water sup-

Many of the very important questions in regard to the technical matters in a water district, such as voting, elections, bonds, assessment of frontage, etc., were answered by Alan E. Hill of Seattle. Mr. Hill wished to impress upon the voters that the election to be held August 16 was merely to say yes or no on the question of whether Spanaway should have a water district, and to elect three commissioners. This election will in no way whatsoever assess or tax the people. Should the vote be yes, then the water commissioners will be enabled to start forming a tentative plan which will be presented to the public and then voted on again. Burns received as he was showered with flaming gasoline when the gas tank in the truck he was driving exploded after a trailer the vehicle was pulling overturned, proved fatal 24 hours later to Phillip Dunlop, 26, of Rte. 7, Box 556, Spanaway.

The accident, according to the state patrol, occurred Sunday evening at Roy. Dunlop was driving the truck and trailer which failed to negotiate a curve, overturning the trailer.

After the truck stopped, Dunlop and has brother, Charles 32, also of Spanaway, and Charles' wife, Edith, 32, began crawling out of the cab. The driver apparently was the first to alight and was showered with blazing gasoline when the gas tank exploded. Charles also suffered minor burns on one hand, while the woman was uninjured.

The driver was rushed to Pierce County hospital, where he died Monday at 6:10 p.m.

State patrol officers Tuesday were investigating the cause of the accident. They were attempting to determine if the vehicle had defective equipment, or if the trailer was top-heavy with a load of war surplus merchandise being transported to Tacoma.

The truck and trailer was owned by the South End Trading Post of Spanaway.

A native of Salt Lake City, Dunlop had lived in Tacoma the past four months. He was a member of the Latter Day Saints church at Salt Lake City. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Shirley Dunlop of Tacoma; one son, James P. Dunlop; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William N. Dunlop of Salt Lake City; and five brothers, Charles Salt Lake City.

It seems to us that a memorial such as that proposed by the local post is of far more value than just another war monument. With all due respect to monuments, they often seem to fail in their objective. Such a recreational center as that proposed at Spanaway would serve the purpose of reminding all who use it that it was a memorial to the war dead, and at the same time it would be of inestimable value as a meeting place for community organizations, for young people's groups, in other words, for every group which is interested in community betterment.

Without doubt, the people of the community will want to throw all their energy behind this splendid undertaking, which may serve as a model to other communities about us. Surely there is no more fitting memorial to the dead than an endeavor to give larger opportunities to the living.

No one could do that in Pierce County, but we could profitably have some means of controlling unnecessary noise with the toll it takes in useless expenditure of nervous energy.

We note that the county grange has thrown its support behind the measure. We think they're right—we could do with a little quieter county. When the measure is brought up for discussion before the county commissioners, how about a number of us giving it quiet support?

#### V. F. W. INTRODUCES "GOLD STAR" MEASURE

The Veterans of Foreign Wars has introduced legislation to authorize naturalization of Japanese "Gold Star" mothers and fathers Robert A. Yothers, state senior vice commander of the V. F. W. innounced today.

Chances for passage of this legslation, HR 3555, have been greatly increased by the favorable report of the house immigration sub-committee, Yothers said.

Originating as a personal recommendation two years ago in V. F W. Post No. 8 of Los Angeles, Calif., the resolution was drafted into a bill by the legislative section of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and presented to the first session of the 80th congress for early con-

The immigration sub-committee has amended the V. F. W. bill to nclude all alien "Gold Star" parents who would otherwise be ineligible for American citizenship, Commander Yothers said.

"More than 1,200 Japanese 'Gold Star' parents and an undetermined number of other foreign nationals will qualify for American citizenship, if the V. F. W. legislation is enacted," Yothers concluded.
