
Dodsworth to Speak At Parkland Church

When funds for equipment are lacking, the group supplements through its yearly project in order that every child may have the advantage of complete program. The group studies and tries to thoroughly understand the work of the kindergarten and attempts to interpret the need of kindergarten to the community.

> The kindergarten endeavors to give the child of five an education which is appropriate to his stage of development, which will be satisfying to him in the present, and which will prepare him for the years immediately following. By such an education is meant the development of all his powers: physical, emotional, mental and

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
