### Subversive Alien Stand Outlined by Commander Biss

Commander Francis D. Biss of Clover Creek Post No. 118 of the American Legion gave an outline of the stand taken by the American Legion on subversive individuals this week.

Commander Biss stated that the American Legion favor amending the Bill of Rights of the Constitution of the United States by the addition of an article to the following general effect: "No guarantee of freedom of speech, freedom of press, freedom of assembly, or freedom of elections, by this Constitution or by the Constitution of any State, shall constitute a valid defense in court to a charge of promoting the overthrow of the Government of the United States by force."

Biss further stated: "As to subversive aliens, we assert the principle that they are mere guests in this country and have no absolute right to civil privileges. By judicial decision it has become a recognized principle of the constitutional law that civil rights can not lawfully be used to shield those who are seeking, by force, to destroy the same rights on which they themselves rely."

**Get the Address Right**

The giving of a wrong address delayed Parkland firemen in locating a home that was on fire last week.

Those precious minutes of wasted time gave the fire enough head start so that it caused \$1,000 worth of damages to the house before the firemen got it under control. The damages could have been alleviated had the proper address been given or if someone had been watching for the fire truck to direct it to the fire.

This is not the first time a wrong address has been given to the fire department. Another time, the fire was put out before the trucks arrived, but no one told the fire department, and they spent much time trying to track down a non-existent fire before they discovered that it had already been put out.

Parkland firemen are volunteer workers and must leave their jobs and businesses when an alarm is turned in. They are giving generously of their time to help protect the homes in their community. Let's not make them waste their time hunting down fires that don't exist.

If you ever find it necessary to turn in a fire alarm remember first to get the address right, and second to watch for the firemen and help them locate the fire.

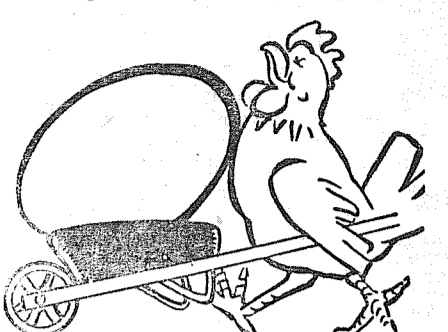
