

Five cases of meningitis were re-ported to the Pierce County Health, Department last week, one of which died. All cases reported reside in the Dupont area.

The onset may be quite rapid, giv-ing symptoms of an infection including fever, sinking spells and sometime red spots. Preventive medication is available and if the disease is suspected, the family physician should be called. Prior to the five cases reported in the Dupont area, one case was re
