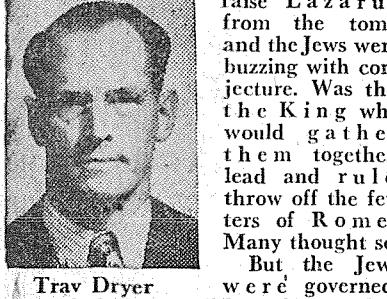

As He approached Jerusalem that day the worshipping throngs did homage to Him as to an earthly king, by cutting palm branches and laying them in the roadway before him.

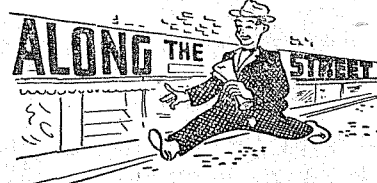

The attractive program includes several surprise skits and other entertaining features.

Parkland and surrounding area residents will don jeans, forks, shovels and other tools of the trade and take to the back yard, front yard and otherwise busy themselves with the chores of Clean-up, Paint-up, Fix-up, starting this weekend in observance of that week in this area.

FIRE, C.D. FORCES WORK AS UNIT IN PARKLAND AREA

Monday night was a busy time for the Parkland Volunteer Fire Department and the new Rescue Squadron from Civil Defense District No. 11 in Brookdale. Together they handled theoretical bombings at 118th & Yakima and at the Trinity Lutheran parish house.

At the same time Mike Wutz was called to get out his engineers to take care of a bombed out Parkland water tower.

Under a plan worked out by Chief Jim Lewis and Coordinator Trav Dryer, the entire community can be alerted by the fire truck sirens in case of a Red alert. When the first, or yellow alert, comes in the three radio equipped trucks will be sent out, one to 102nd and Yakima, one to 121st and A Street, and the last to 134th by the Dryer Mortuary, which is the headquarters and second communications center for the area. Dispersing them gives safety from all being knocked out by one bomb as well as being in a position to blanket the whole district with the warning signal.

In the exercise Monday night, Gus Partridge, the Pierce county director, fired three calls instead of the expected one at the group. On the first call the Squadron responded and were on their way, led by the fire truck in just 9 minutes. The second and third calls required radio dispatching.

In communications, Art Swindland and Lee Corp of this area, and Everett Young of Puyallup, who is county head of that work, took part. Mrs. Al Seaman, Parkland director, worked with Trav Dryer on the problem. Gus Partridge arrived to observe the results of his calls. Some bugs were found in communications and are being ironed out, but the general results were excellent.

Preparations for the state-wide Red alert with sirens and public participation are now under way. It will come as a surprise in about a month.

There will be practice with the sirens before then and the public will be notified of such practice beforehand.

Harvard-Midland P-TA Carnival Set Friday

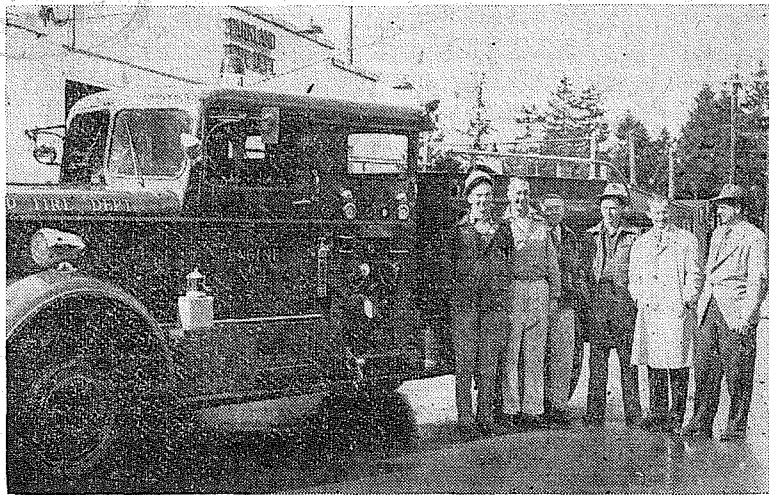

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Baked Chicken Wedges

Broadcast: April 5, 1952

- 4 cups 1/2-in. bread cubes
- 1/2 cup Fat Milk
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 well-seasoned eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon powdered sage
- 1 cup cut-up chicken, cooked or canned
- 1 can condensed cream of chicken soup
- 2 Tablespoons water

Soften bread cubes in milk and 1/2 cup water. Add eggs, salt, pepper, sage and chicken and mix well. Spread in greased, round pan about 8 in. across. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 35 minutes or until brown. Meanwhile, heat soup and 2 tablesp. water until steaming hot. Cut chicken mixture in pie-shaped wedges. Top with sauce. Makes 4 servings.

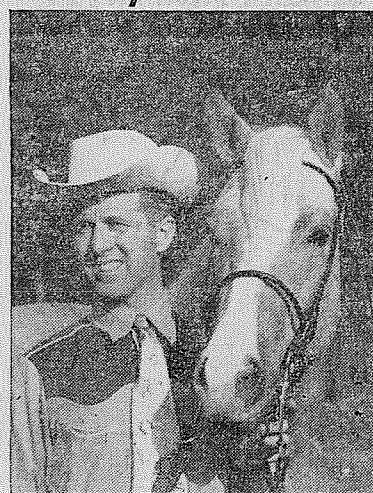

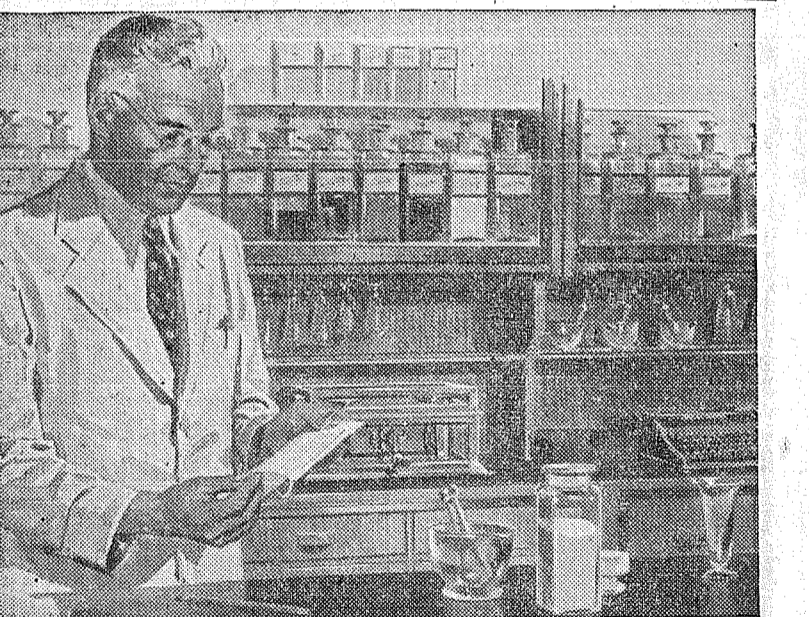
