#### Salmon License Bill To Produce Hot Discussion

CONFUSION over HB 103, the proposed salmon fishing license, is sure to be a subject of hot discussion when the Washington State Sportsmen's Council meets this weekendin Olympia.

The Council has long said that if a salmon fishing license is passed, it should have some strings attached. One is that the license money must be spent for salmon, Another condition the Council went on record officially with last fall, was that a part of any such law should be the formation of a Fisheries Commission, similar to the state's highly successful Game Commission, to give continuity to the management of salmon and other so-called food fish.

So what happened? HB103, a proposal for a \$2 license, with none of these provisions, was entered in the Legislature. Involved in the introduction of the bill were members of the Council's own Salmon Committee.

Three regular resolutions are up for consideration also. They have to do with lake rehabilitation, overlapping of deer and elk seasons, and waterfowl conservation. The meeting is at the Tyee Motor Inn, just south of Olympia, Friday and Saturday.


