New PLC Building Is Progressing Rapidly

Construction of the new chapel-music-speech building of Pacific Lutheran college is progressing rapidly and it is expected that the classroom and music section of the structure will be ready for use when school opens in September. The auditorium, it is believed, will be ready for use in early October.

It had been hoped originally to have the entire building ready for use when school opened in the fall. However, shortages of materials are the reasons for the slight delay.

At this writing the brick laying is just about completed, and the plasterers are working in the music practice rooms and studios.

This \$625,000 building will be one of the finest of its kind among small colleges in the Pacific Northwest and among all Lutheran colleges throughout the nation.

Visitors from all over the nation have been amazed by the wonders of this structure.

A special feature in the new chapel-music-speech building will be the Tower Chapel, or perhaps it might be called The Upper Room. This little chapel will be on the third floor above the foyer and will have the following features: A beautiful art

glass window which is a gift from the Women's Missionary federation of the American Lutheran church. It will have features such as the Trinity designated in an Eye, the Lamb on the Bible, and the Dove. It will also have Luther's coat-of-arms and special designations indicating the Old and the New Testaments. The window is being made by the Harold W. Cummings company, San Francisco, Calif.

The furniture in the room will be made of Philippine mahogany and constructed by the California Church Furniture company, Los Angeles, Calif. It will include an altar under the great window, baptismal font, lectern, altar railing and seating for about 75 people, with room for extra chairs to be carried in. It is expected by the administration that this will be one of the finest places on the College campus and will be used extensively for smaller groups for worship, devotion and religious exercises.

Skillet Meat Loaf with Vegetables
Broadcast: August 4, 1951
1 lb. ground beef 1/2 cups boiling water
1 cup soft bread crumbs 8 small potatoes
1/2 cup Pet Milk 8 small onions
2 teaspoons salt 4 medium carrots
1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 can condensed tomato soup
1 tablespoon flour 2 tablespoons shortening
Mix meat, crumbs, milk, 1 teasp. salt and pepper. Shape into a loaf. Roll in flour. Brown slowly on all sides in hot shortening. Add water; cover and cook slowly 15 min. Turn meat over. Add potatoes, onions and carrots, cut lengthwise; sprinkle with 1 teasp. salt. Cover and cook slowly 30 min., or until vegetables are tender. Put meat and vegetables on warm platter. Stir soup into pan; heat to boiling. Serve with meat and vegetables. Makes 4 servings.

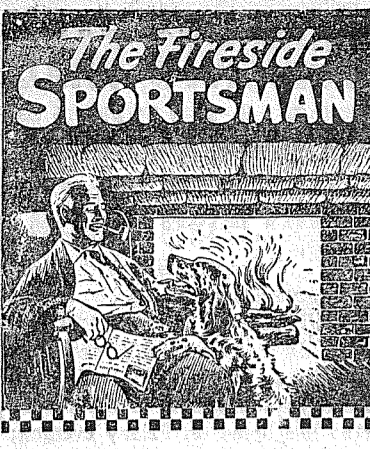


