Editor May Publish - Clean-up Times Journal Edition Of Herald

Publishing the Times Journal edition of the Pierce County Herald, now serving Midland, Parkland, Spanaway, Roy, and Eatonville will be assumed by the present editor if a subscription drive scheduled to start June 5 is successful, Em Matson announced Monday.
"Date for the change in man-

agement has not been definitely set, but is expected to take place within 6 weeks," Mat-son stated. "We have an option-to-buy and will exercise it if response to subscriptions appears favorable." He is financially backed by several residents living in the Parkland-Spanaway area.

Increased distribution costs were cited as the principle reason for the move. "In or-der to continue publication, the Times Journal must be converted to a subscription paper," he said.

Starting June 5, three plans will be available to subscrib-

ers. Residents living in newsboy carrier delivered areas may subscribe on a monthto-month basis by ordering the paper from the carrier. At the end of each month the boy will collect 30 cents.

Those who presently receive the paper by mail may subscribe on an annual basis at \$3.50, or \$1.80 for six months. Residents will be if they mail the coupon pubplaced on the subscription list if they mail the coupon published elsewhere in this pap'er to "Subscriptions", Post Office Box 2116, Parkland,

Washington, Backers of the subscription plan have been making random telephone survey calls to pre-sent recipients of the paper with encouraging results, Matson disclosed. Most people called said they would be willing to subscribe indicat-ing there is a great need for continuation of the paper.

As a subscription paper, the Times Journal will feature wider pictorial coverage of the news in addition to a greater variety of printed

The Journal will also pub-lish documentary coverage giving readers an inside peek into public agencies serving the area, local historical features, local governmental units including school boards, and community-oriented group projects. Present planning calls for the documentary features to be published in a magazine-type supplement to the Journal.

Sports coverage will continue to be an important part of the paper, with even greater emphasis placed on Franklin Pierce, Bethel, and Eatonville School sports programs. Herald Sports Editor Walt Tupper will continue to provide Times Journal readers with his excellent coverage of Spanaway Speedway.

Sheriff's Divers Find Drowning Victim's Body

Sheriff's divers, assisted by the Pierce County Rescue Council, located the body of a 49 year old Roy man late Satlurday afternoon after the victim had drowned in a boating mishap that morning on Span-

away Lake.

Deputy Sherifi Jon Patterson pulled the body of Elmer Allen Seeley from the murky lake bottom about 500 feet beyxnd the park diving platform. He was found by Pat-terson in approximately 35 feet of water.

Seeley was lost when his 14 foot outboard powered runabout capsized as he attempted to execute a sharp turn, witnesses told deputies. Six small children riding with the victim were assisted to a nearby boat by 15 year old George Rother Jr., a lake side resident who was canoeing near the accident scene. Young Rother, a student at Bethel High School, leaped into the water to help the children to the boat of Dr. Robert Schalock, 26, Lakewood.

Five of the six children were wearing life jackets, Rother stated. The victim vas first noticed by Rother holding the propeller shaft of the inverted boat. Possibly fearing one of the youngsters might be trapped under the craft, Seeley appeared to push himself underwater to look under the boat, Rother said.

As the Bethel youth swam near the sterm of the boat supporting a pair of children ages 6 and 10, the victim grasped Rother's leg. When Rother struggled free, Seeley sank from sight, the youth reported.

Seeley was father of three of the survivors, Arthur, 13, Larry 6, and Ronald 8. The balance of the children are the youngsters of Mrs. Seeley's sister, who is visiting from Fall City, Oregon.


sters of the community. A new project of the Association is under way at the Roy Park, the building of a community kitchen, so that more friends and neighbors may enjoy the use of the Town's small park.

Kidd has spent 65 of his 71 years with all kinds of horses including farm horses which he worked on his farm in Tennessee and learned to love good horse flesh.

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




