Editor May Publish Times Journal Edition Of Herald

Publishing the Times Journal edition of the Pierce County Herald, now serving Midland, Parkland, Spanaway, Roy, and Eatonville will be assumed by the present editor if a subscription drive scheduled to start June 5 is successful, Em Matson announced Monday.

"Date for the change in management has not been definitely set, but is expected to take place within 6 weeks," Matson stated. "We have an option-to-buy and will exercise it if response to subscriptions appears favorable." He is financially backed by several residents living in the Parkland-Spanaway area.

Increased distribution costs were cited as the principle reason for the move. "In order to continue publication, the Times Journal must be converted to a subscription paper," he said.

Starting June 5, three plans will be available to subscribers. Residents living in newsboy carrier delivered areas may subscribe on a month-to-month basis by ordering the paper from the carrier. At the end of each month the boy will collect 30 cents.

Those who presently receive the paper by mail may subscribe on an annual basis at \$3.50, or \$1.80 for six months. Residents will be if they mail the coupon published on the subscription list if they mail the coupon published elsewhere in this paper to "Subscriptions", Post Office Box 2116, Parkland, Washington.

Backers of the subscription plan have been making random telephone survey calls to present recipients of the paper with encouraging results, Matson disclosed. Most people called said they would be willing to subscribe indicating there is a great need for continuation of the paper.

As a subscription paper, the Times Journal will feature wider pictorial coverage of the news in addition to a greater variety of printed news. The Journal will also publish documentary coverage giving readers an inside peek into public agencies serving the area, local historical features, local governmental units including school boards, and community-oriented group projects. Present planning calls for the documentary features to be published in a magazine-type supplement to the Journal.

Sports coverage will continue to be an important part of the paper, with even greater emphasis placed on Franklin Pierce, Bethel, and Eatonville School sports programs. Herald Sports Editor Walt Tupper will continue to provide Times Journal readers with his excellent coverage of Spanaway Speedway.

The present publishers of the paper, the Puyallup Publishing Company, will continue to distribute the Times Journal edition during the subscription drive. The Pierce County Herald and Puyallup Valley Tribune edition is not affected by the Times Journal sale and will continue to be distributed on a free delivery basis in the Browns Point, Dash Point, Fife, Milton, Puyallup, Sumner, Orting, Bonney Lake, Kapowsin, and Summit areas.

PARKLAND - The success of Parkland's Clean-Up Day was discussed at a recent meeting of the clean-up committee in the home of Al McManus.

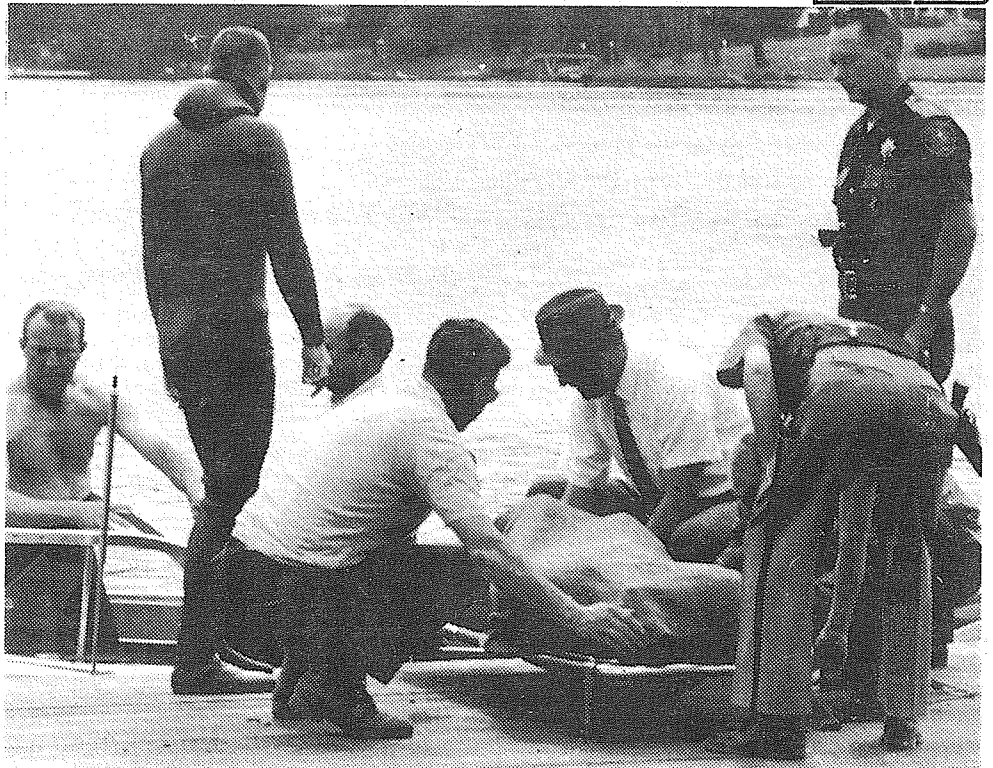

Sheriff's Divers Find Drowning Victim's Body

Sheriff's divers, assisted by the Pierce County Rescue Council, located the body of a 49 year old Roy man late Saturday afternoon after the victim had drowned in a boating mishap that morning on Spanaway Lake.

Deputy Sheriff Jon Patterson pulled the body of Elmer Allen Seeley from the murky lake bottom about 500 feet beyond the park diving platform. He was found by Patterson in approximately 35 feet of water. Seeley was lost when his 14 foot outboard powered runabout capsized as he attempted to execute a sharp turn, witnesses told deputies. Six small children riding with the victim were assisted to a nearby boat by 15 year old George Rother Jr., a lake side resident who was canoeing near the accident scene. Young Rother, a student at Bethel High School, leaped into the water to help the children to the boat of Dr. Robert Schallack, 26, Lakewood.

Five of the six children were wearing life jackets, Rother stated. The victim was first noticed by Rother holding the propeller shaft of the inverted boat. Possibly fearing one of the youngsters might be trapped under the craft, Seeley appeared to push himself underwater to look under the boat, Rother said. As the Bethel youth swam near the stern of the boat supporting a pair of children ages 6 and 10, the victim grasped Rother's leg. When Rother struggled free, Seeley sank from sight, the youth reported.

Seeley was father of three of the survivors, Arthur, 13, Larry 6, and Ronald 8. The balance of the children are the youngsters of Mrs. Seeley's sister, who is visiting from Fall City, Oregon.

TACOMA - A 19 year old youth taken into custody by deputies last week near the McMillan Water Reservoir is suspected of being involved in over 14 area burglaries during the past year, Sheriff's Detective Russ Harford disclosed last week.

The suspect was captured at gun point as he was camping in the woods with a cache of stolen property. He has been linked with the burglaries of Jeff's Tavern, Parkland, Bargain Basket Market, Spanaway, Thomas Oldegaard residence in Milton, Evergreen Cleaners 72d and Portland, Kirk's Barber Shop 72d and Portland, Summit Garden Center, Lloyd's Barber Shop, the Virgil residence in Edgewood, Edgewood Square Barber Shop;

the Edgewood area residence of David Pitzer, Park-in-Mobill, Sumner, Tony's Tavern, Puyallup, and Mooney's Tavern, Puyallup. The 19 year old is also suspected of being involved in the spree of burglaries that rocked the Summit View area last summer, Harford said.

Object of the thefts were money, candy, and cigarettes, Harford stated.

8th Annual Roy Rodeo This Week

The 8th Annual Roy Rodeo will be presented 1:30 p.m. June 3-4 at the Roy Rodeo Arena.

A top purse of \$5,500 will be offered cowboys for each show. Competing cowboys will challenge their abilities in a full round of scheduled events including saddle bronc, bareback riding, bull riding, wild cow milking, team roping, steer wrestling, wild horse races, and girl's barrel racing events.

The Roy Rodeo Association is offering a silver buckle to the champion cowboy in each event over the two shows in June and Labor Day, which will be presented at the September show. About 200 entries are expected to sign up, according to secretary Liz Rediske.

Gates will open at noon each day. The arena has excellent seating with covered stands and plenty of free parking.

Saturday, June 3rd at 9:30 p.m., there will be a Rodeo Dance with western music by the Country Boys plus Dot, headed by Lucky Pruitt.

The Rodeo Assoc., an active group in the small town of Roy, has the betterment of the community as their main aim, and are now sponsoring dances every Saturday night. They share profits with the Roy Volunteer Fire Dept., and sponsor "Teen Club" dances on Friday night for the youngsters of the community.

A new project of the Association is under way at the Roy Park, the building of a community kitchen, so that more friends and neighbors may enjoy the use of the Town's small park.

Vis-Rey Celebrates Grand Opening

Vis-Rey Inc will celebrate the completion of its new building at 12702 Pacific Avenue in a grand opening sale starting noon Friday.

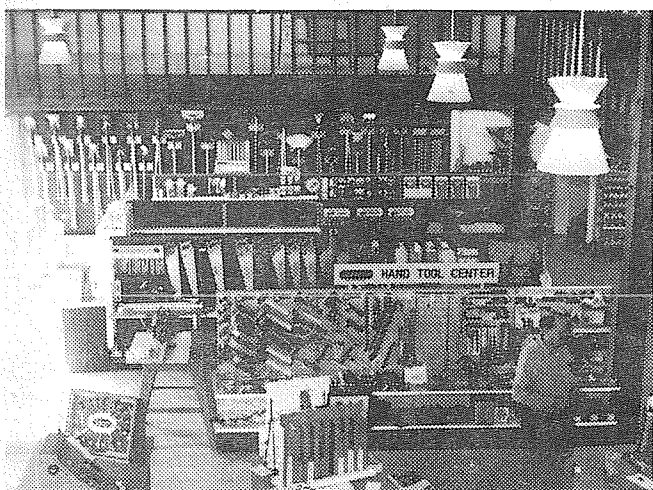
The new 10,000 square foot building was designed in contemporary styling by the Parkland architectural firm of Johnson-Austin Associates. Contractors were Fitzpatrick-McIntyre. The structure was designed so it could be used for any type of retail business, and contains the most modern thinking on store design, owner Hal Reynolds pointed out.

A U-shaped 2700 square foot mezzanine floor will merchandize building materials, small bathroom cabinets, and bath vanities, Reynolds stated. Bookkeeping offices will also be located on the balcony.

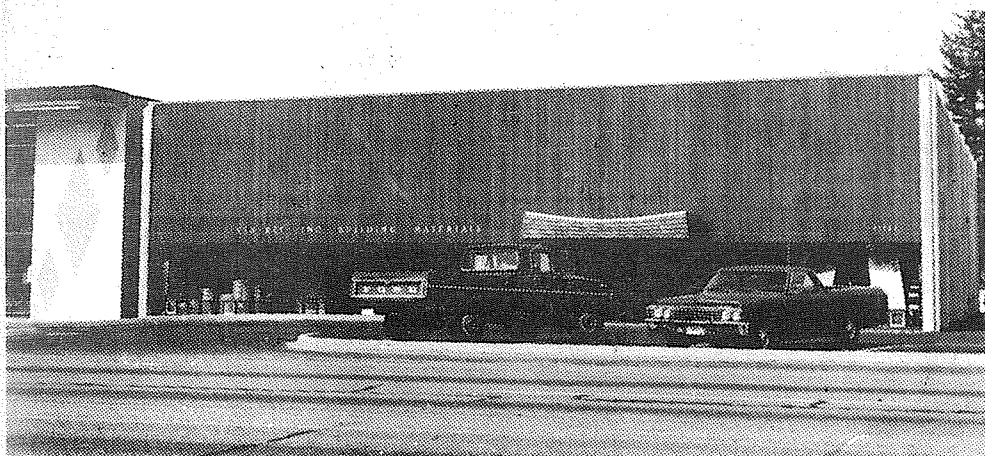
Main floor merchandize will include wallpaper, furniture, finished lumber, roofing, an expanded paint department, builder's hardware, hand tools, and plumbing supplies. The rear of the new building provides for both inside and outside lumber storage.

The facilities will boast a coffee lounge off the well-lighted main floor displays. Other store features include an automatic fire alarm, fire sprinklers, forced air heating, and a large black-topped parking lot.

The new structure replaces one lost in a searing fire that first destroyed neighboring Tomhoff's Furniture and eventually leaped across to consume the old store and lumber yard.

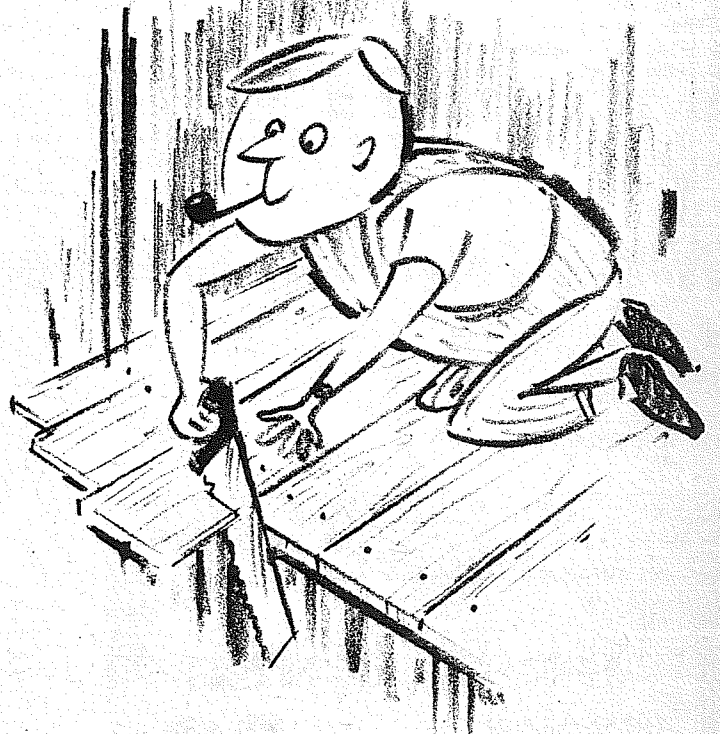
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Baccalaureates, Commencement

Augustana Choir To Appear Thurs. At Trin. Lutheran

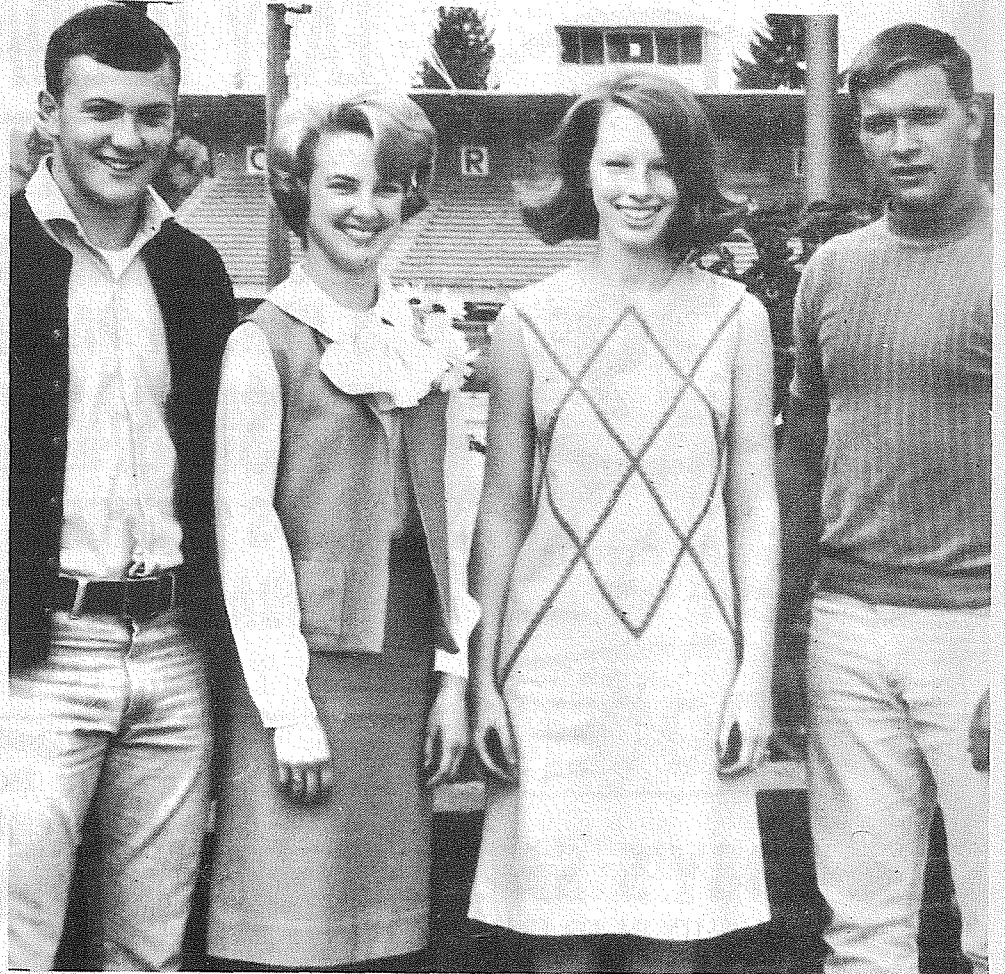
The Augustana Academy Choir of Canton, South Dakota, will appear in concert at Trinity Lutheran Church Thursday at 8 p.m.

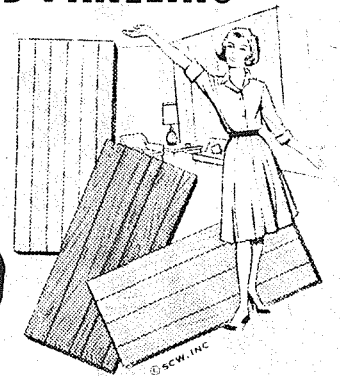

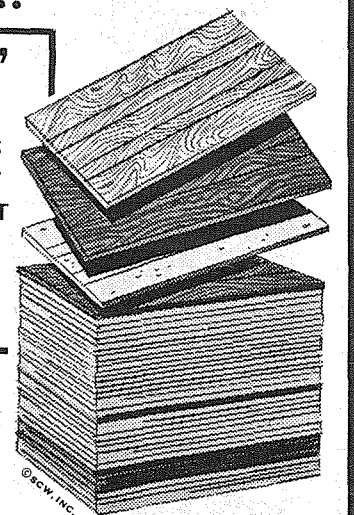

Strawberry Price Outlook Improving

SALEM, Ore. - Reduction in cold storage holdings and in Mexican imports has improved the price outlook for Northwest strawberries it was learned last week.

The Strawberry Committee of the Oregon-Washington Vegetable and Fruit Growers Association heard the report last Thursday from association manager Walter R. Collett.

Collett just returned from leading a study hour of growers to the Salinas and Stockton growing areas of California, where strawberry picking is now under way. He reported that only 1.5 million pounds had been delivered to processors in California thru May 13. Last year at this time 6 million pounds had been processed.

The fresh market is strong and berries going to processors now are of juice stock, which is bringing 6 to 7¢ per pound, delivered to processors. No price for processing berries has been posted.

The movement of strawberries out of freezers during the month of April totaled over 16 1/2 million pounds. This reduces the May 1 holdings in cold storage to 95,928,000 pounds, which is only 4% more than a year ago. With Mexican imports being drastically reduced, to approximately 24% less than last year, growers can be more optimistic about the price of northwest grown strawberries than was earlier considered.

Collett said, "at this time we can only announce that the floor price has been established at 13¢ per pound, and that a market price has not been established. A price offer to processors will be made in a few days."

He went on to say that because of the late growing season the entire picking process has been delayed. The delay is going to cause real problems and increase the number of pickers needed. The harvest season will be short, with the peak coming about the 4th of July, when the harvest is normally completed.

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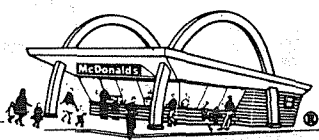

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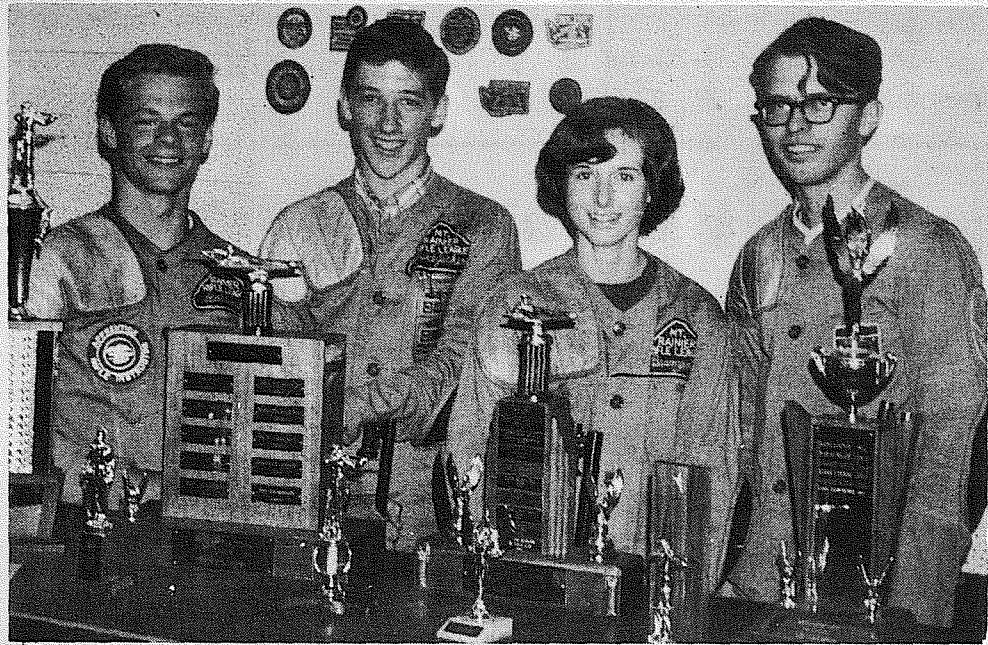

This year I just made up my mind to come back and here I am. I've always liked this track and its management."

Larry always comes to a track with a new apprentice jockey every year and this time is no exception. This racing season he has one and only one -- Roy Hyder, as his contract jockey. Roy comes from Los Angeles and is very rapidly learning his trade under the watchful eye of Kidd. Asked why he brought only one jockey, he said: "I think one is enough to work with during a season. With two there is too much foolishness and things don't get done and done right."

Other jockeys he has developed here at Longacres and at

other racing strips include Alan Gray of some 30 years ago. Otto Grohs was a Kidd protege and he went on to fame and fortune. Others included Marvin Durand and Longacres own film analyst, Basil James. He continued, "I like to take an apprentice without any bad habits and teach him my way of riding. He has to learn to rate horses on their ability for any one given and particular race." This takes some doing.

Kidd has spent 65 of his 71 years with all kinds of horses including farm horses which he worked on his farm in Tennessee and learned to love good horse flesh.

Co. Library To Serve Suburban Nursing Homes

Pierce County Library has been granted \$18,968.60 for a first year of service to licensed nursing homes outside the city limits of Tacoma and Puyallup.

The Washington State Department of Public Assistance notified the library last week that an application to the Administration on Aging for funds from the Older Americans Act had been approved. Additional amounts were granted for the second and third years of service.

According to plans described in the application, three kinds of library service will be available to nursing homes. Special services will include reading to individuals or groups, providing films and phonograph records, book discussions and storytelling.

Some homes will house a library collection, to be attended and refreshed by a volunteer staff. Those individuals in nursing homes not maintaining a collection will receive library materials bi-monthly from the volunteer staff. Friendly visiting will be a feature of the three types of service.

The three-year project period will begin July 1. It will be necessary for the library to hire an administrator for the project. Volunteers will be sought, to be instructed by

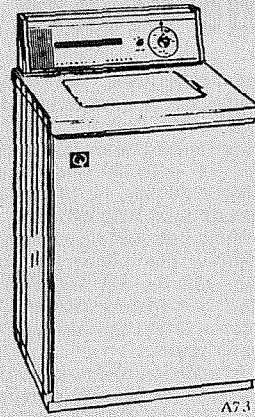

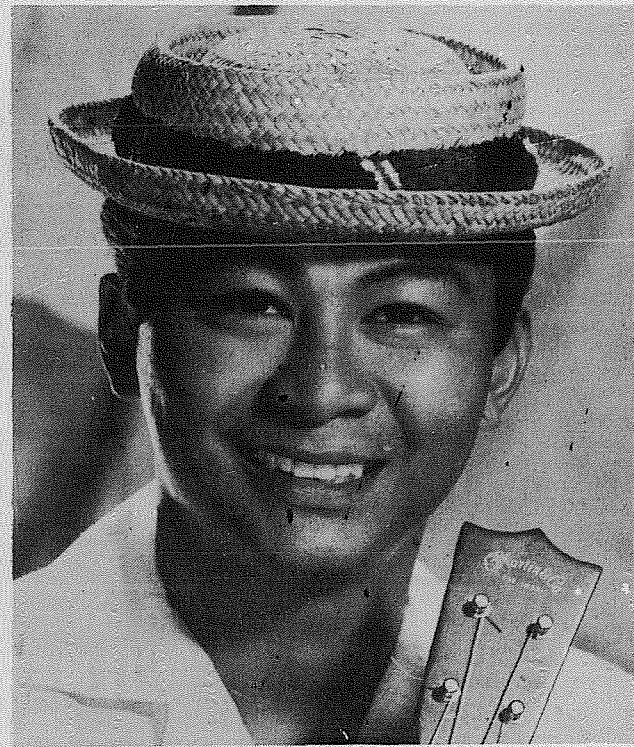
