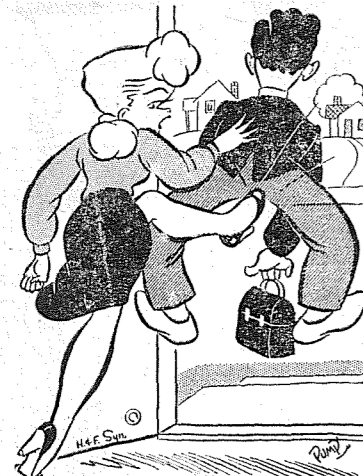

Dawson Field May Get New Tennis Court

Construction of a tennis court at Dawson Field is being considered by the Metropolitan park board. A tennis court fence was erected several years ago but the court was never completed.

Representatives of the Harvard and Midland Improvement Clubs met Monday afternoon with the park board concerning their request that they be completed soon. It was learned that the grounds laid out and fenced for the court are not of standard size and it will be necessary to move the fences out and put in a new sub-grade.

The clubs have offered to give financial assistance in getting the courts ready for use next year. As the total cost will be about \$2,800 and the clubs have only \$360 in their treasury, the Improvement Clubs suggested that they take over the moving of the fences and the sub-grading to ready the courts for the asphalt as part payment. The plan seemed favorable to the board.

The board also told the delegations that if they could build their fund a little higher and get the money into the park office by March 1949 the tennis court would be the first project on the list for next spring.

Bank Rumors Flying

Possibility that a branch bank may be established in Parkland loomed this week when it was rumored that a bank had purchased property on Mountain Highway.

However, a letter received by Herschel Mobley, chairman of the committee working for a bank for the Parkland Business Club, revealed that a charter for a bank had not been granted.

The letter, written by Walter Johnson, state supervisor of banking, said, "I have no application for establishment of a bank to serve your community. It is my understanding that an application has been made to establish a branch of a national bank on South Tacoma Way. This might make banking service a little more available to you should they not see fit to establish facilities on Pacific Ave."

However, Johnson in a previous letter, said he believed a charter had been granted for a branch in the Parkland district.

If a branch is not established in this area, the Parkland Business Club will continue its efforts to establish an independent bank here, according to Mobley.

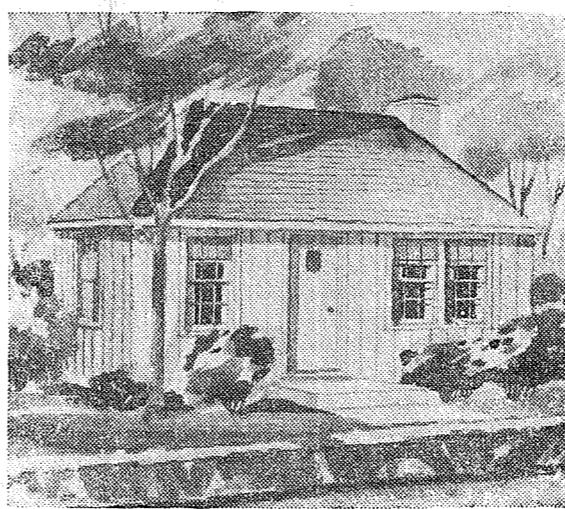

State Will Match School Funds For New Addition

Reassurance that funds will be forthcoming for the Midland School District from the State if the 1948 legislature, which convenes in January, appropriates the needed funds, was given by Elmer Breckner, assistant superintendent of schools in charge of finance.

The money is to be used to help complete the new Midland school.

A special school election will be held in the Midland and Harvard district September 11 for a 20-mill tax levy. The tax levy, if voted for, is expected to net around \$12,500 and will give them a total of \$25,000 in addition to the money they expect to get from the state.

Mrs. Clarence Johann and Floyd Jensen, delegates sent by the Midland Improvement Club to investigate the availability of state aid for the proposed additional classrooms, met with Breckner in Olympia on Monday.

Breckner also stated that even though the consolidation of Parkland, Midland, Collins and Central Avenue be declared before the election, any funds voted by the community would be matched only for the Harvard and Midland district.

A statement from his office will be mailed to the clerk of the Midland School District, reaffirming this information, according to the representatives.

'Horse and Buggy Days' and Registration

In the presidential election of 1900, when many people had to travel by horse and buggy and when communications were much more difficult than nowadays, 75 per cent of the eligible voters cast ballots in the general elections. By contrast, in the presidential election of 1944, only 55 per cent of the total number of eligibles voted.

It is a sad, but perfectly true fact, that many of us just do not take the trouble to exercise our fundamental democratic right to vote. In this respect, the United States ranks very poorly compared with other nations in the election-day turnout. Our voting rates fall far behind those of Australia, France, England, Canada, Italy and others.

It would seem that it is plain unadulterated apathy which keeps an enormous number of Americans from the polling places each year. Yet voting, and its necessary first step, registration, is one of the simplest processes imaginable. Certainly

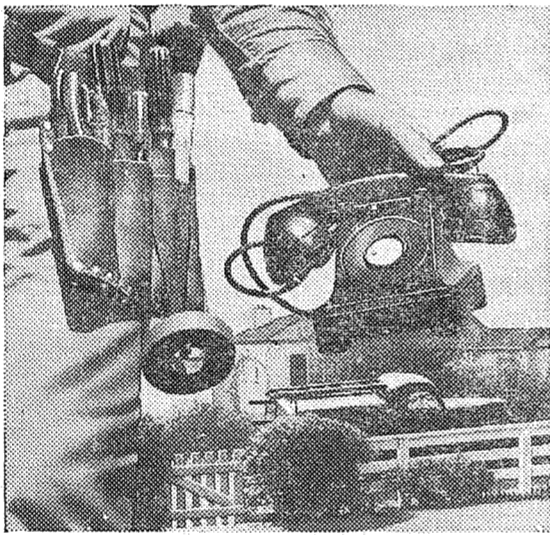

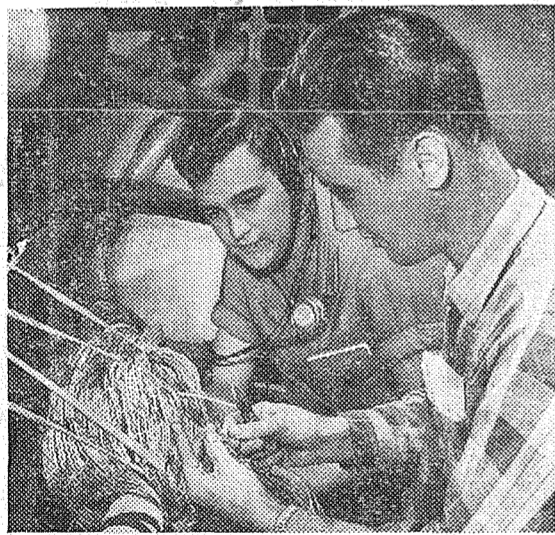

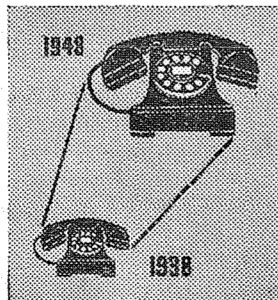
