Sewer Meet At Parkland School

However, lip service alone will not construct a sewer system; it will require the concerted effort of everyone interested and to this end the commissioners of the sewer district are holding another meeting in the lunchroom of the Parkland school on Monday evening, Feb. 18, at 8:00 o'clock for further discussion of the project.




