Highlights Of The McNary Dam Dedication

Lenzman Views McNary Dam Dedication

What does it mean to "cover" in official capacity a really big function, in which are participating some of the most important men of the state and the nation? Wes McKewen found out last week when, as staff photographer for the Times-Journal, he spent a day right in the middle of events culminating in the dedication of the great McNary dam.

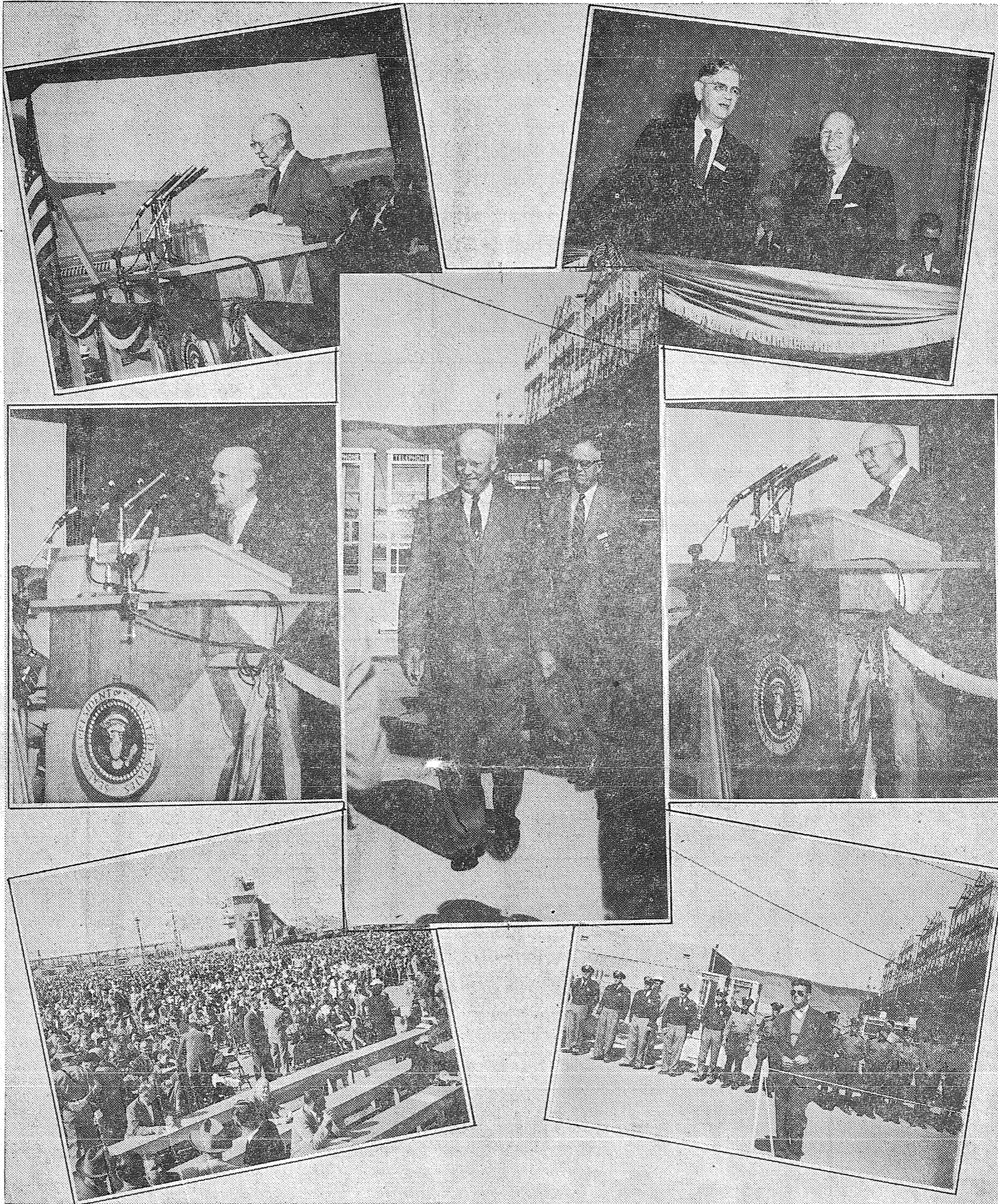
Driving first to Walla Walla, where he spent the night before the dedication, he had the rare opportunity of sitting in at the informal interview granted by President Dwight Eisenhower for the many journalists and photographers assigned to the big event. The next day was spent at the dam, a day rewarded by scores of exceptionally fine exclusive photographs of what went on there.

Mr. McKewen feels that, as a news feature, the dam dedication has been so thoroughly covered by the daily newspapers that the story now has little interest for Times-Journal readers. Instead, he believes that they would prefer to learn something of the "mechanics" of planning such a gigantic function with all arrangements so carefully scheduled that everything runs like clockwork.

To the general public, the dedication appeared to be carried on without effort or the slightest delay or mishap; those in charge know it to be the result of many weeks of work and preparation. In fact, the safeguards set up for the protection of high officials of the government have been standard for many years, yet so casually and unobtrusively carried out that they are not visible to the ordinary onlooker. Secret service men are everywhere, practically unnoticed.

While the FBI and federal secret service had over-all charge of security measures guarding the President and other national and state officials, the actual details were in the hands of local authorities. The State Highway Patrol of Oregon and Washington cooperated in insuring safety on the

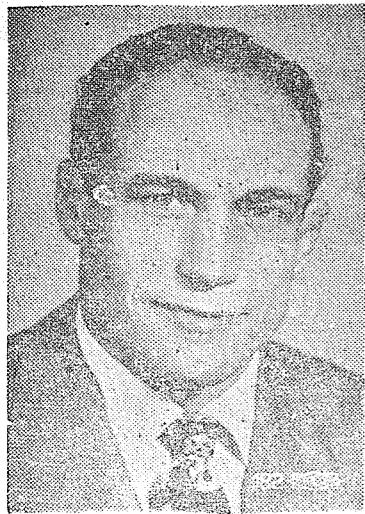

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Date and Apple Muffins

- 3 Tablespoons shortening
- 1 cup Fat Evaporated Milk
- 1/2 cup finely cut, pitted dates
- 1 cup finely cut, pared apples
- 2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
- 1 Tablespoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 2 unseasoned eggs

Melt shortening in a saucepan. Remove from heat and stir in milk, dates and apples. Sift together into a 2-quart bowl the flour, baking powder, salt and nutmeg. Add, all at once, the milk mixture and the eggs. Mix quickly but thoroughly. Divide batter evenly among 12 well greased, 2 1/2-in. muffin cups. Fill cups only 2/3 full. Bake on oven rack slightly above center in 400 oven (hot) 20 min. or until light brown. Serve hot.

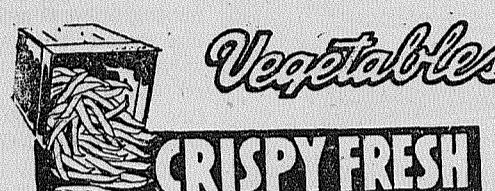

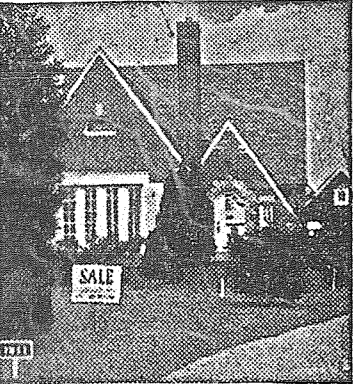

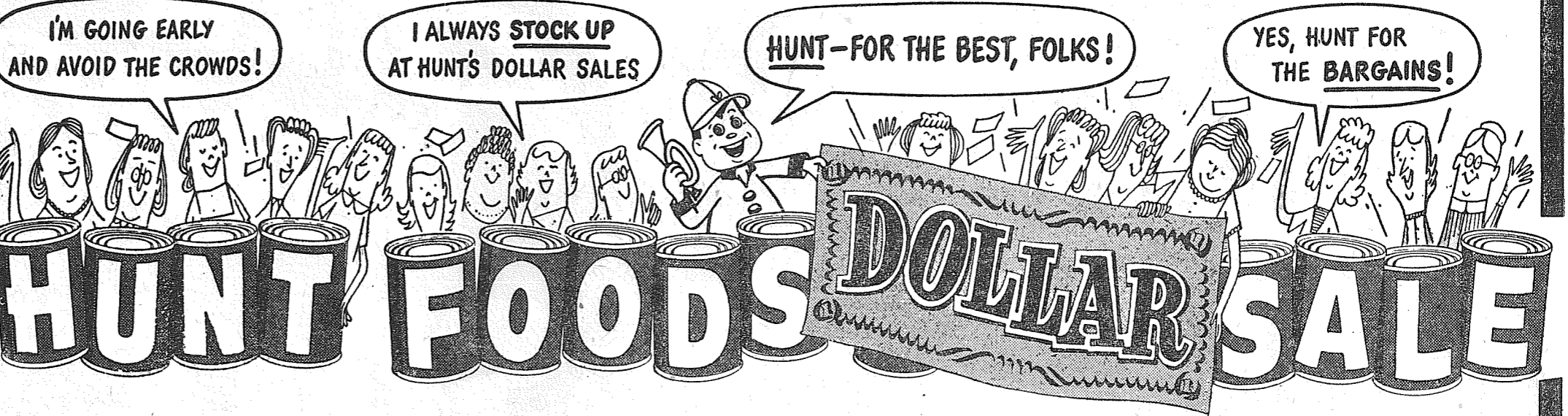

In July 1941 he commanded the 33rd Pursuit Squadron during its deployment to Iceland via the USS Wasp.

After serving there as Operations and Executive Officer of the Air Task Force, Iceland Base Command, he returned to the United States for a year's duty with Headquarters AAF. From August 1943 to July 1946, he was assigned successively as Commander, Los Angeles Fighter Wing, Commander, 36th Fighter Wing, New Guinea and Chief of Staff, Third Fighter Command, Drew Field, Florida.

After serving a year with Headquarters of the Air University at Maxwell Field, Alabama, he was assigned overseas to Guam as Chief of Staff, 20th Air Force and later as Commander, 23rd Fighter Wing. Returning to the States in March 1949, he served on the staff at Headquarters USAF, until June 1952 when he assumed command of the 33rd Air Division, (Defense), Tinker AFB, Oklahoma.

General Puryear has been awarded the American Defense Service Medal, Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal with Battle Star, EAME Campaign Medal, American Theater Ribbon with Battle Star, World War II Victory Medal, Legion of Merit and the National Defense Service Medal.

General and Mrs. Puryear, their son Teddy, 8, and daughter Susan, 5, have moved into their quarters on McChord. Another son, Romulus Jr., 20, is presently attending Vanderbilt University.

reservists Robinson and Johnson were available for both officers and airmen. Vacancies exist in practically all military specialties for flying and non-flying personnel.

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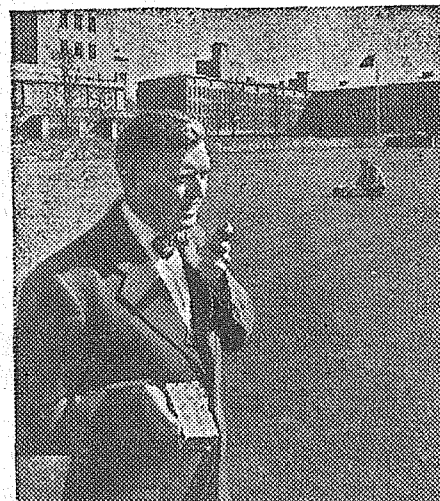

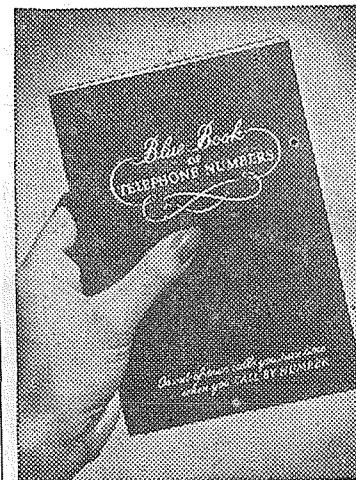

During the first five days after landing on Iwa Jima, Marine Corps communication crews laid more than 700 miles of telephone wire, although operating under heavy artillery fire and harassed by snipers.

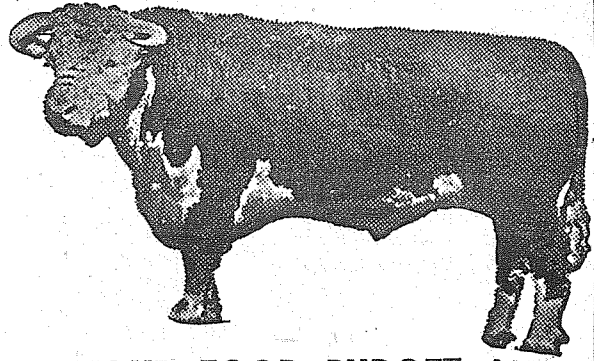

highways. The night before the dedication, the highway from Walla Walla to the dam was carefully inspected and an armed guard placed at every bridge and culvert, to remain on duty until the President's party had passed. The same procedure was carried out next morning for the highway between the dam and Pendleton, Ore., where the presidential group left the area by plane.

At the dam, the official party was guarded every minute. One rather amusing incident was noticed by McKewen. A State Highway Patrol officer, in uniform, appeared to replace one who had been on duty all night. As the second man did not expect to be released for some time, he brought along his lunch in a paper bag and put it under the official platform, concealed by a bit of bunting. The secret servicemen were on it in a minute, handling it rather nervously at first, the Patrol officer meanwhile protesting that it was only his lunch!

The matter of the President's car was another interesting detail. When the President arrived at the dam and left his car, attended by secret

servicemen, the chauffeur and one officer remained in the car the entire time the President was absent. But, when he returned, the officer got out of the car, came around to the rear, opened the door and entered the car, carefully examining the interior, then left the car by the opposite door before the President got in.

Such infinite attention to details, which appears quite unnecessary to most Americans, is only a small part of the intricate security measures perfected in the past, rigidly enforced at all times. Presidents, cabinet officers, members of the Congress, governors, etc., have no option in the matter—they take orders like good soldiers and do as they are told, thus making the work of those detailed to protect them much easier.


One of the most pleasant events of his trip, McKewen says, was the news conference with the President in Walla Walla the evening before the dedication. He especially liked the attitude of Eisenhower who asked the newsmen and photographers not to stress the dam as a government project. Rather, he reminded them, it belongs to the people and was made possible by the planning and co-operation of the citizens of three states, Washington, Oregon and Idaho. The federal government merely sponsored the project, helping the people to build this great dam for themselves and their children.

He called attention to the fine cooperation between one state and another—governors, legislators and members of the Congress all working together for the common good. That is the American way.
