Summit Scouts Get Gun Drill

If the boys of Summit Scout Troop 76 needed a shot in the arm to pep up interest in scouting, they had it Monday evening in expert rifle instruction at the Central Avenue scout hall.

The 24 boys, including a half dozen explorer scouts, who turned out for troop meeting, listened pop-eyed while Lyle Catt explained the fine points of handling fire arms.

"There are a good many 'don'ts' in the use of guns," Lyle said, "and one of the most important is: DON'T point your gun at any one while cleaning or trying it. Too many people have been killed by unloaded guns."

There was no target practice but the boys were allowed to examine a Winchester, 1 1/2 gauge shotgun, 30/30 and several army pieces, including an M-1 and a 410 in order better to understand

the operation of the mechanism. On Monday, Dec. 31, the troop will get its chance at target practice. Troop Committee Chairman has arranged for the use of Midland's indoor firing range in Midland hall, where the boys will be taught to trigger .22 caliber rifles.

The third meeting, which completes the six-hour course will consist of a written examination of 25 questions and possibly another chance at the bullseye. When satisfactorily completed, this course qualifies boys under 18 for hunting licenses.

Accompanying Mr. Catt were Dan Mulholland and Clarence Göttertreu, all firearms instructors for the Paul Bunyan Rifle & Shooting club.

The club does not share the fears of many parents who would keep guns out of reach of boys, said Catt.

"Too many accidents are caused by inexperience. Our purpose is to teach boys the safe and proper use of firearms."

Interested spectator was Ed Hansen, Central Avenue representative of the Franklin Pierce school board.

Scoutmaster George Lind and assistant, Jack Houtz, were in charge of the meeting.

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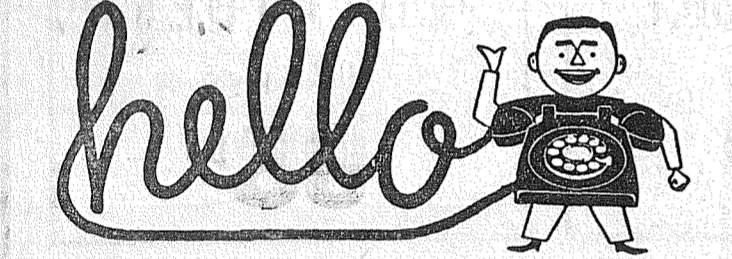
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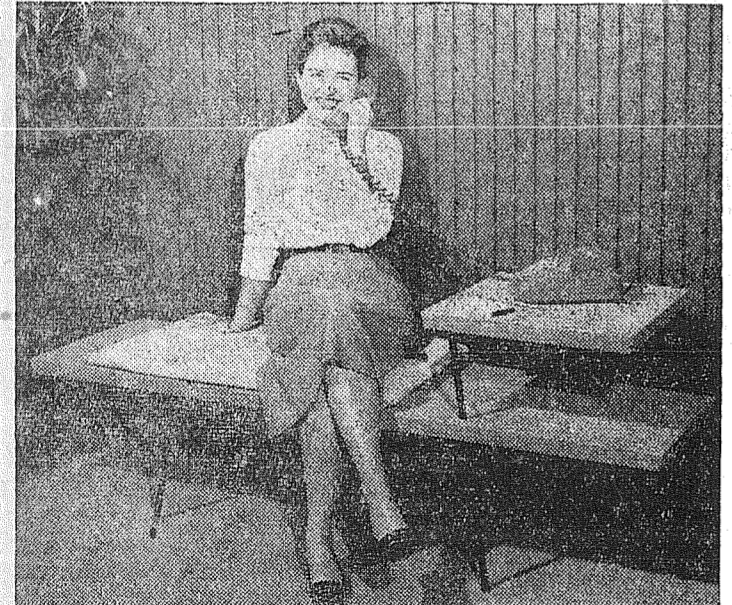

Manned Earth Satellite Is Goal of U. S. Research

An earth satellite capable of carrying a human passenger is one of the prime goals of U.S. space research, space medicine authority Dr. Hubertus Strughold announced in early November at Randolph AFB, Texas.

Dr. Strughold is an advisor to the AF's School of Aviation Medicine on problems in space flight. Dr. Strughold also revealed that Uaika, Sputnik II's dog passenger, is not the first animal to venture into space.

"The U.S. Air Force several years ago fired rockets containing monkeys and mice to considerable altitudes in order to test the effects of space flight on living creatures," he said. He added that the animals were brought back to the ground and some of the monkeys are alive today and so are descendants of the mice.

"The basic research that made it possible for a dog to live in an air conditioned satellite for a number of days or weeks was first performed at the School of Aviation Medicine's Department of Space Medicine, founded in 1949 by Major General Harry G. Armstrong, now Surgeon of USAF."

Animals, Dr. Strughold pointed out, cannot tell all that needs to be known about reactions of mind and body in space, no matter how encumbered with remote-control devices and recording instruments. "Only an intelligent human being can do that," he said.

Strughold said that the school has been experimenting for some time with a laboratory version of a sealed space cabin that will supply all the necessities of life on Earth.

"Our studies are directed solely toward the support of a human flyer in a satellite or other space vehicle," he said. "Our aim is not only to keep him alive, but to make him both comfortable and efficient while he collects the data that will enable us some day to make space operations routine."

The School of Aviation Medicine's research in space medicine has already been used to good effect in exploratory flights by AF pilots and physicians above the effective limits of the Earth's atmosphere, Strughold said.

He cited the recent balloon ascension by Maj. David G. Simons in a space-type gondola to altitudes beyond 19 miles and last year's flight by Capt. Ivan C. Kincheloe to a record height of nearly 24 miles in a rocket-powered X-2.

While such flights may not be as dramatic as that of a dog-carrying satellite, Dr. Strughold believes that they ultimately will prove to be of greater value. He said that the first satellite carrying a human passenger will have to be a kind of aircraft, capable of reentering the atmosphere so that it can bring the space flyer home alive and in good health.

"We have known for some time that an artificial satellite can be established," he said, "but we want to make sure that it will descend after a time with its living occupants, and not simply disintegrate as it comes down. Hence, our research concentrates on a step-by-step conquest of the upper reaches of the sky, in space craft flown by human pilots."

The German-born physician said that he believes such a satellite will be possible within a very few years.

"Whenever the manufacturers give us the vehicle, we in space medicine are ready with techniques to protect the flyer," Strughold concluded. "The dog in Sputnik No. Two only confirms that knowledge which we had already."

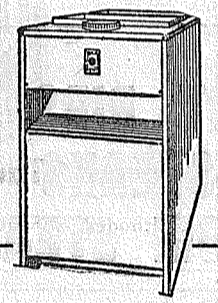

It is easy to figure why Andrew Chopic of Lacamas, Otto Erickson of Buckley, Al Glenn of Thrift and some other Pierce County cattlemen, have no problems in selling their beef cattle for premium prices. They produce the kind of cattle they figure buyers will, and do, want. They weigh their cattle periodically, we grade them and records are maintained on each animal. So when buyers come around, they have records of birth dates and if the buyer wishes, the animal is again

weighed. It "just makes good business sense", as many of our cattlemen say, to have bulls to sell that have weight gains of 2 1/2 to 3 pounds gain a day.

The other day in helping Erickson grade his calves, I noted he had two eight months old bull calves that have a 3-pond weight gain a day record. Chopic, and several other local cattlemen have cattle with similar records.

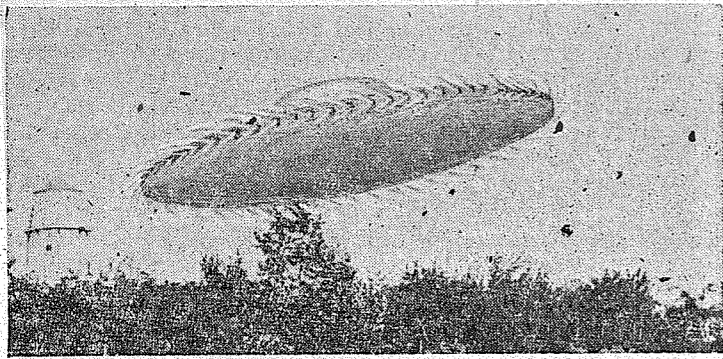

"FLYING SAUCER REPORTS"

Southington, Conn. — 7/13/57 — A strange object in the sky, "brighter than the sun," was reported by a Southington family. "It hung in the sky, then descended slowly, bobbed up and down some more, and then shot upwards at a terrific speed and disappeared," said Mrs. Arthur Gallette. She said she and her husband and their twin ten year old daughters and a neighbor's boy watched the mysterious object for about three minutes. It was 6:55 p.m. when the object was sighted, and the sun was setting. "It was very bright, brighter than the sun," said Mrs. Gallette. "I asked my husband to stop the car so that I could watch it." The mysterious object "bobbed up and down, then dropped down like a spider dropping from its web," the woman reported. "Then it shot up and seemed to disintegrate," she added. She thought it had some sort of tail hanging down underneath it.

Covina, Calif. — 4/24/56 — A Covina, California man said he is convinced that he saw a spacecraft while driving his automobile on lower Azusa road in the El Monte area. "It looked like half an egg. No sound came from it and it was a brilliant white," R. M. Grace said.

Grace said he was driving home from the Belvista Hospital in Monterey Park at 8:30 p.m. when he first noticed the craft. He said it appeared to be hovering about 1,000 feet above him. "It had no riding lights and that fact dismissed my first thought that it was a plane," he related. The Covina man said he continued driving on Lower Azusa and while approaching Baldwin Avenue the craft made an arc, headed over Peck road and then turned back and continued eastward once more.

When asked if it might possibly have been a jet plane, Grace emphatically replied no. He stated the egg-shaped craft gave off no sound or flame.

Wellington, New Zealand — 10/9/57 — Something queer is going on in space 70 miles above the southern end of New Zealand's South Island. Puzzled scientists ruled out the Soviet earth satellite. Dr. Michaels Gadsen, an authority on auroral activity, said mysterious objects have been observed on International Geophysical Year radar screens near Ivercargill since June 20. He said the objects have been running about, first traveling north, then doubling back on their path. Gadsen said he believed the objects "could be a little man steering around up there or ionized particles rushing about. The fact is, we don't know what is going on up there, it's something new."

Pullman, Washington — 1/25/56 — On the basis of numerous substantial reports from Military and Sunnyside Hills and GOC sky-watchers, a rapidly moving luminous object buzzed down over College Hill and the Airport just before 9:00 p.m. "The object seemed to whip into town, was brilliantly white," says one observer. "Then it turned green, reddish, then disappeared in a trail of what looked like smoke." At first sight the object was thought to be an airplane but was too large. "It looked like a big moon," said Mrs. T. A. Merrill.

Mrs. Ed Wagner, who was at the Gardner Stacy home, was another of the many who saw the object. "It was bright blue-green, looked a little bigger than the Bryan Hall clock from the Stacy home," says Mrs. Wagner, "and seemed to have a red fire or substance dropping away from it. It lasted about a minute, long enough for other women at the meeting to see it."

The Ground Observer Corps who also observed the phenomenon, reports there were no aircraft in the area at the time.

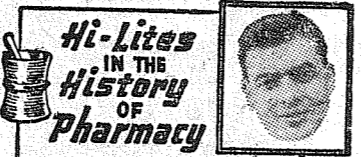

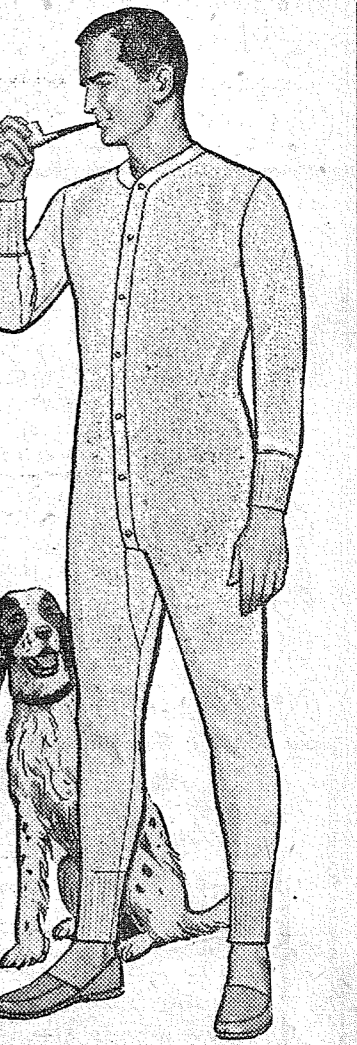

Washington residents buy their share of cars and other merchandise on time. They usually use one of two legal documents—a conditional sales contract or a chattel mortgage. A conditional sales contract keeps title in the seller until all of the installments of the purchase price are paid. A chattel mortgage is used where the title to the goods is given to the buyer and the seller retains only a lien or "security interest" in the goods.

If the buyer fails to make the payments he promised to pay under a conditional sale contract, the seller either may repossess the goods sold or sue for the balance of the sales price. The seller cannot retake the goods, sell them for less than the balance due, and sue the buyer for the remainder in this state, though such procedure is allowed in some

other states. If the buyer under a chattel mortgage fails to make his installment payments, the seller may repossess the property with the permission of the buyer or without his permission and by court action. If the chattel mortgage is valid and is properly foreclosed, the seller may collect the remainder of the amount due on the chattel mortgage from the buyer if the repossessed goods do not sell for enough to pay the balance due. 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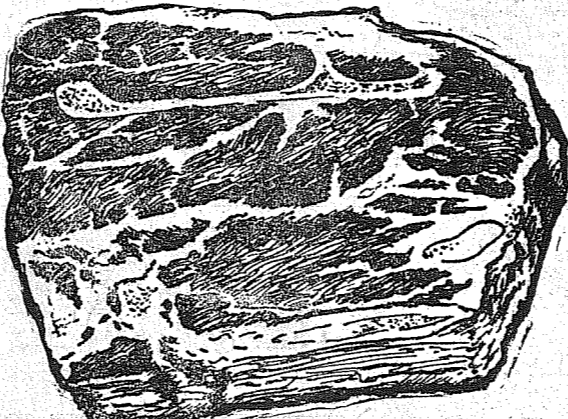

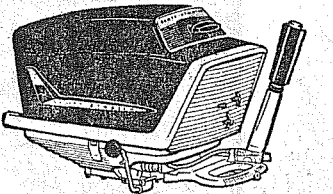

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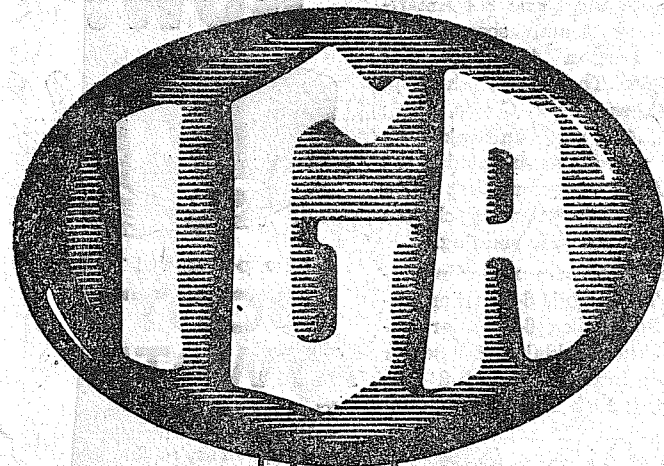
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Wool Dress Wins Sewing Award For Teenager in Singer Contest
