Don't Confuse the Issue

What with petitions being circulated to dissolve the Union High School District and consolidate, and doubt being cast on the legality of the millage election, the issue coming before voters in the Union High District No. 205 may seem a bit

The saying, "Something's rotten in Denmark," seems to apply aptly to the situation but just what that something department gave a Valentine is is hard to say.

It is important to the welfare of the children in this district which comprises Spanaway, Elk Plain, Clover Creek, and Lacamas, that this issue is cleared up so that a high school may be obtained for them.

The Prairie Pointer once advised residents in that district to vote for the millage and bond issue when it appeared on the ballots. In view of the recent developments we wish to reverse our request and ask that they vote it down.

The irregularities in the school election program which have come to light during a recent investigation make this action desirable. It will be better to start with a clean slate and be sure the election will be held legal.

Moreover, a movement to dissolve the union district and form a consolidated one is in progress. It would be better to pass the millage and bond issue when the matter is settled.

The election of directors should also be considered carefully as the directors of a district will determine whether the school district is run smoothly or not. Don't go to the poles muddled as to who you want for director. Know that the man you vote for stands for what you want.




