The emotional part? Well, it says, 'If you have any doubts about your health and are middle aged, don't shovel under any circumstances. Get someone else to do it.". So, while I'm leaning here doing nothing, I'm trying to worry about my health. It was slow at first, but I'm just about at the point where I could stumble to the front porch after I hand my wife the shovel.
No particular credit to ME, Angina. Just the sort of conditioning and regimen a man owes himsel and his family for a long and fruitful life. I think that with a little tailoring we can suit this sort of defensive training to the problems of lawn mowing and garden spading as well.
To golf? Don't be ridiculous. A golf club is neither long enough nor sturdy enough for rigorous leaning. No, I'm afraid that's a hazard I'll have to endure. What the heck. Nobody lives forever.

Public Law 167，the Multiple Use Mining Act，was passed July 23,1955 ．It states，in shall not a mining claim＂－ Hance of pased，plore any purpose other than pros pecting，mining or processing operations and uses reason－ ably incident thereto．＂
＂This not only applies to claims located atter July 23， 1955，＂said Barrett，＂but also to all older claims on which verified statements were not filed during the ensuing ad－ vertising periods that follow－ ed passage of the act．＂ ives the on a mining claim minerals located thereon．In order for the claim tobe valid the claimant must show that he has located minerals of suffi－ cient quantity and value that a prudent man would be justified in expending his time and mon－
to mine them commer－ cially．Claims may be bought and sold，but unless the claim is valid there is nothing of Any persons who have pur－ chased or located mining claims with intention of doing other than mining are urged to contact the District Ranger for the area of their claim if it it is on the National Forest，to obtain additional information on the mining laws．They are also cautioned that roads or ditches constructed in con－ nection with a claim require a specialuse permitif theyex－
tend outside of the area of a valid mining claim．
Claimants are also advised that since the surface resour－ ces remain under Government control until patent is issued， it is not permissible to fence or post＂No Trespassing＂ signs on mining claims．The only exception is the immed－ iate area where mining work is in progress or mining struc－ claims．Permits for roador ditch construction off of a valid claim may be applied for at the nearest District Ranger＇s of－ fice．Additional information on the mining laws may also be obtained at these officesor the Forest Supervisor＇s office in Seattle．
