Mrs. Olden has headed many money making projects for her home Grange. One of these is the annual smorgasbord given by Ohop to which folks numbering over 600 have come from all over Pierce County.

The Granger of the Month was assisted with the recent remodeling program in which a newly planned kitchen was built. She helped with the painting and fashioned drapes and curtains.

She is a lady of many talents and the Grangers are most appreciative of each one. Her flair for decorating has placed her in charge of same, for the Silver Lake Club's Christmas party given for rural children for the past 30 years. This has been held in the Ohop Grange Hall. She is president of the Club.

Mrs. Olden is a valued member of the Dogwood Garden Club and noted for her floral arrangements and corsages. She won the sweepstakes award at last fall's Garden Club show at the

Pierce County Junior Fair in arrangements.

Hundreds of decorated cakes have been made by Mrs. Olden who learned the art during a cake decorating demonstration many years ago at a Grange Hall. These beautiful cakes have graced the tables at wedding receptions and anniversary parties on many occasions. She makes special cakes for the Eatonville area graduating classes and the alumni banquet and for Grange events.

Honors have been brought to Ohop Grange through Mrs. Olden's entries in the State Grange sewing contests throughout the years. John Gibson To Direct Dimes Drive

John Gibson was named recently to direct the January campaign of the March of Dimes in Parkland.

Gibson cited the development by March of Dimes-supported scientists of ways to detect and control several conditions which can cause permanent mental damage. He pointed to the advanced methods of care and rehabilitation employed by the national network of 77 Birth Defects Centers financed by the March of Dimes.

"The March of Dimes," said Gibson, "is also helping to promote the birth of healthy babies through an expanding program aimed at educating prospective mothers in the importance of prenatal care."

The roaring \$250,000 blaze that consumed two Parkland businesses followed one day later by a fatal house fire swept a field of newsmaking events to top Herald headlines during 1966.

January 5
Members of the Parkland Development Association and Parkland Business Club met with State Representative Ted Bottiger this week to plan a campaign to build a fifth left turn lane on Pacific Avenue.

January 21
Pennsylvania Governor William Scranton faced a panel of students at Pacific Lutheran University's Eastvold Chapel, giving the area a first hand look at potential presidential timber for the 1968 Republican nomination.

Becky Harlow, Lori McDowell, and Julie Joyner were named 1966 Daffodil Princesses representing Bethel, Franklin Pierce, and Mount Tahoma High Schools respectively.

January 26
Commissioners of the South Suburban Sewer District announced they will receive petitions for annexation from nearby areas that desire sewer service.

March 2
Franklin Pierce defeated the Puyallup Viks 56-42 to win their second straight Puget Sound League Southern Division basketball title.

March 23
Franklin Pierce voters turned out in force to validate and approve two district millage propositions allowing the District \$462,000 to meet operating expenses and purchase additional school busses.

March 30
Gov. Dan Evans crowned Wilson High senior Susan Bona, making her queen of the 33rd annual Puyallup Valley Daffodil Festival.

April 27
Delores DeNune, Spanaway, reduced from a size 48 to a size 16 to be named 1966 Washington State TOPS Queen. TOPS is a national organization dedicated to Taking Off Pounds Sensibly.

May 1
Franklin Pierce School Directors named Dr. Edward E. Hill, Santa Cruz, to replace Edwin Nelson as superintendent of schools.

The 1966 Parkland Development Association Annual Clean-up Drive took place May 11-13 with an all-out war declared on junk and debris.

May 10
A drive to secure signatures petitioning for a Pacific Avenue 5th left turn lane opened with the distribution of petition forms to Pacific Avenue businesses.

June 15
The Eatonville Eagles ritual team won the Washington

State championship and a trip to Cleveland, Ohio to compete for the National Eagles Ritual title.

July 6
Two major fires rocked the Parkland area one day apart to claim the life of a 7 year old girl and consume two Pacific Avenue businesses.

Parkland firefighters pulled Helen Louise Greer from her burning residence at 404 East 131st, but the girl was pronounced dead on arrival at Lakeland General Hospital.

One day earlier, Midland and Spanaway-Elk Plain Fire Departments joined Parkland firemen to fight a spectacular four hour fire that roared out of control through Tomhoff Furniture and VisRey Lumber causing \$250,000 damage.

July 27
Pat Almaas was named 1966 Roundup Queen from a field of 14 candidates at James Sales Grange Hall last week. More than 57 entries marched in the 1966 Roundup parade.

August 3
A delegation of Parkland and Spanaway businessmen presented petitions bearing more than 2500 signatures in support of a Pacific Avenue 5th left turn lane proposition to the State Legislature.

August 10
The biggest rodeo gate in Roundup history climaxed the 16th annual event Saturday and Sunday.

August 24
Pacific Lutheran University awarded \$3 million in dormitory contracts to three area firms last week.

September 7
Mrs. A.L. Rasmussen announced Wednesday she will seek the Democratic nomination for the 29th District State Senate seat as a write-in candidate.

October 5
Vice President Hubert Humphrey took a healthy swipe at peace demonstrations during a student-press question and answer conference held at Pacific Lutheran University's Memorial Gym last week.

November 16
Eatonville Supt. Hans C. Olson announced his decision to retire to close out 40 years of service as a teacher and school administrator.

Bethel Supt. John Milroy disclosed he will leave the district January 1 to assume a position with Tacoma Public Schools. Fred M. Gramann, Enumclaw High School principal has been named to replace Milroy.

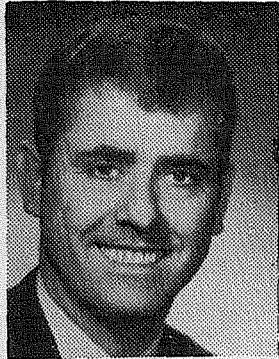
The wishes of a Pacific Lutheran University benefactor came true last week when KPLU-FM, the University's new radio station went on the air.

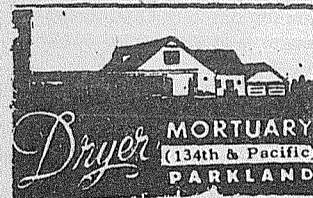

The campaign to secure petitions for annexations to the South Suburban Sewer District is moving ahead on schedule, according to Clayton B. Peterson, president, and more than 80 people are carrying petitions.

"We have annexed Area I



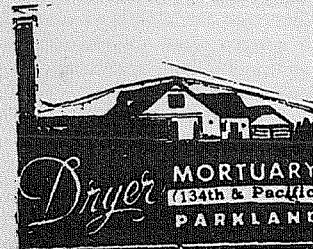

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and submitted the petitions to the County Commissioners who will hold a public hearing in the near future," Peterson stated. "We have signatures of 204 land owners in Area II, which covers the area between Park and Sheridan and 112th and Tule Lake Road; 216 signatures in Area III, which includes the area from Park to Portland between the Freeway and 123rd Street, Area IV, which runs from Croft to A Streets between the freeway and 100th Street is rapidly approaching the necessary 60 per cent of the land ownership needed for annexation. A few additional petition carriers are still needed in Area VI, which runs from 123rd to 131st Streets from Pacific to F Streets.

"We are greatly pleased by the response of the people of Parkland. One group of housewives has organized a program to annex the area between Spanaway Loop Road and Sheridan along 121st and Wheeler Streets. Three other groups of citizens have asked that their areas be included in future petitions.

"The Commissioners of the sewer district invite all areas in the Parkland area that are interested to contact them for instructions as to how to establish an area for annexation. The South Suburban Sewer District has been formed to serve all citizens of this area, but annexation petitions are only prepared when residents of an area indicate an interest in helping to secure sewers for their homes."

A temporary office for the sewer district has been established at 317A Garfield Street. It is open from 9-5, Monday through Friday. Telephone LE. 7-3166 or LE. 7-4812.

Co. Planners To Meet Next Tuesday 28th District Reps. Named To High Posts

Pierce County Planning Commission will meet at 1 p.m. Tuesday to hear petitions for zoning changes and special permits.

Among the cases will be: No. Z1-67 Dayle Collison, zone change from SR-9 Suburban Residential to C-3 Heavy Commercial, property with a depth of 200 ft. along the west side of Pacific Avenue between 116th Street and 118th Street in Parkland.

No. Z2-67, Carl F. Millar, Jr., zone change from SR-12 Suburban Residential to RMH & RMMulti-Family Residence property at the SW corner of 138th and Jay St. in Brookdale, described as follows: RMH: Property extending 300' west of Jay St. with a depth of 179' along the south side of 138th St. RM: Property extending 300' west of Jay St. beginning 179' south of 138th St. & extending south 333' except for a 133'x142' tract of land at the SE corner of said property.

UP1-67 Lige Dickson Com-

pany, an unclassified use permit for gravel mining, rock crusher and an asphalt plant in an SR-9 Suburban Residential District approximately 4 acres of land with a width of 135 ft. lying between Interstate Highway 5 and Sales Road beginning at 104th Street and extending north 1240 ft.

In National Forests

Cabins Prohibited On Unpatented Claims

Unpatented mining claims on national forest land cannot be used for recreation residences, L.O. Barrett, Snoqualmie National Forest Supervisor, cautioned today. b

Each year people purchase unpatented mining claims with the intent of establishing a summer home or hunting cabin. But the Multiple Use Mining Act specifically prohibits such use.

Public Law 167, the Multiple Use Mining Act, was passed July 23, 1955. It states, in part, that a mining claim "shall not be used, prior to issuance of patent therefor, for any purpose other than prospecting, mining or processing operations and uses reasonably incident thereto."

"This not only applies to claims located after July 23, 1955," said Barrett, "but also to all older claims on which verified statements were not filed during the ensuing advertising periods that followed passage of the act."

Filing on a mining claim gives the claimant the right to minerals located thereon. In order for the claim to be valid the claimant must show that he has located minerals of sufficient quantity and value that a prudent man would be justified in expending his time and mon-

ey to mine them commercially. Claims may be bought and sold, but unless the claim is valid there is nothing of value passed to the purchaser.

Any persons who have purchased or located mining claims with intention of doing other than mining are urged to contact the District Ranger for the area of their claim if it is on the National Forest, to obtain additional information on the mining laws. They are also cautioned that roads or ditches constructed in connection with a claim require a special use permit if they extend outside of the area of a valid mining claim.

Claimants are also advised that since the surface resources remain under Government control until patent is issued, it is not permissible to fence or post "No Trespassing" signs on mining claims. The only exception is the immediate area where mining work is in progress or mining structures constructed on the claims. Permits for road or ditch construction off of a valid claim may be applied for at the nearest District Ranger's office. Additional information on the mining laws may also be obtained at these offices or the Forest Supervisor's office in Seattle.

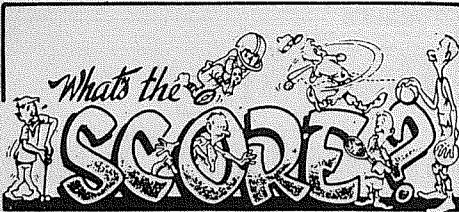

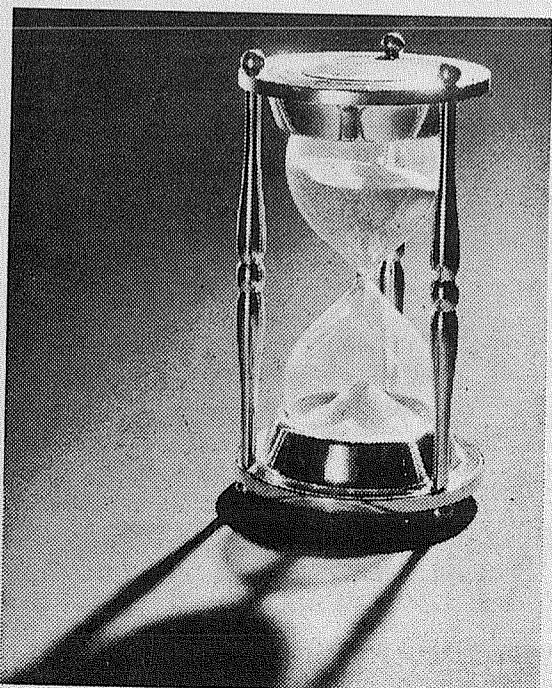
Hammond, who played center at the University of Washington under John Cherberg and Darrel Royal, organized the Tyees in 1961 and won the championship in 1962 and 63.
