Doubling the joyous occasion was the celebration of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Guinn's 24th anniversary.

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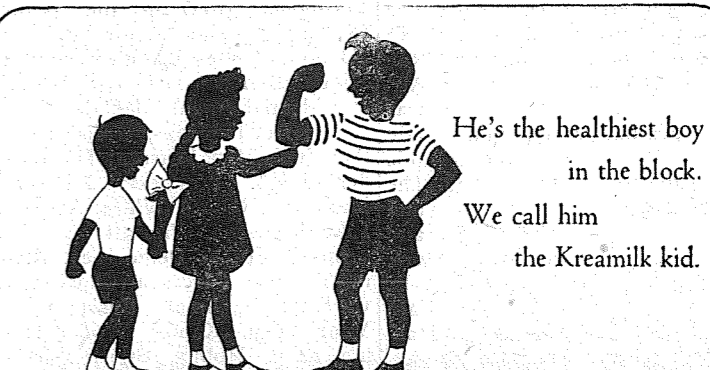
