
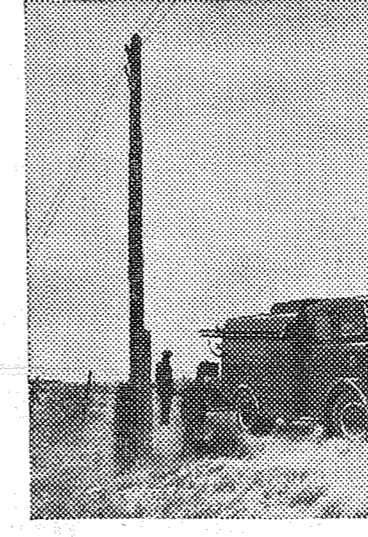

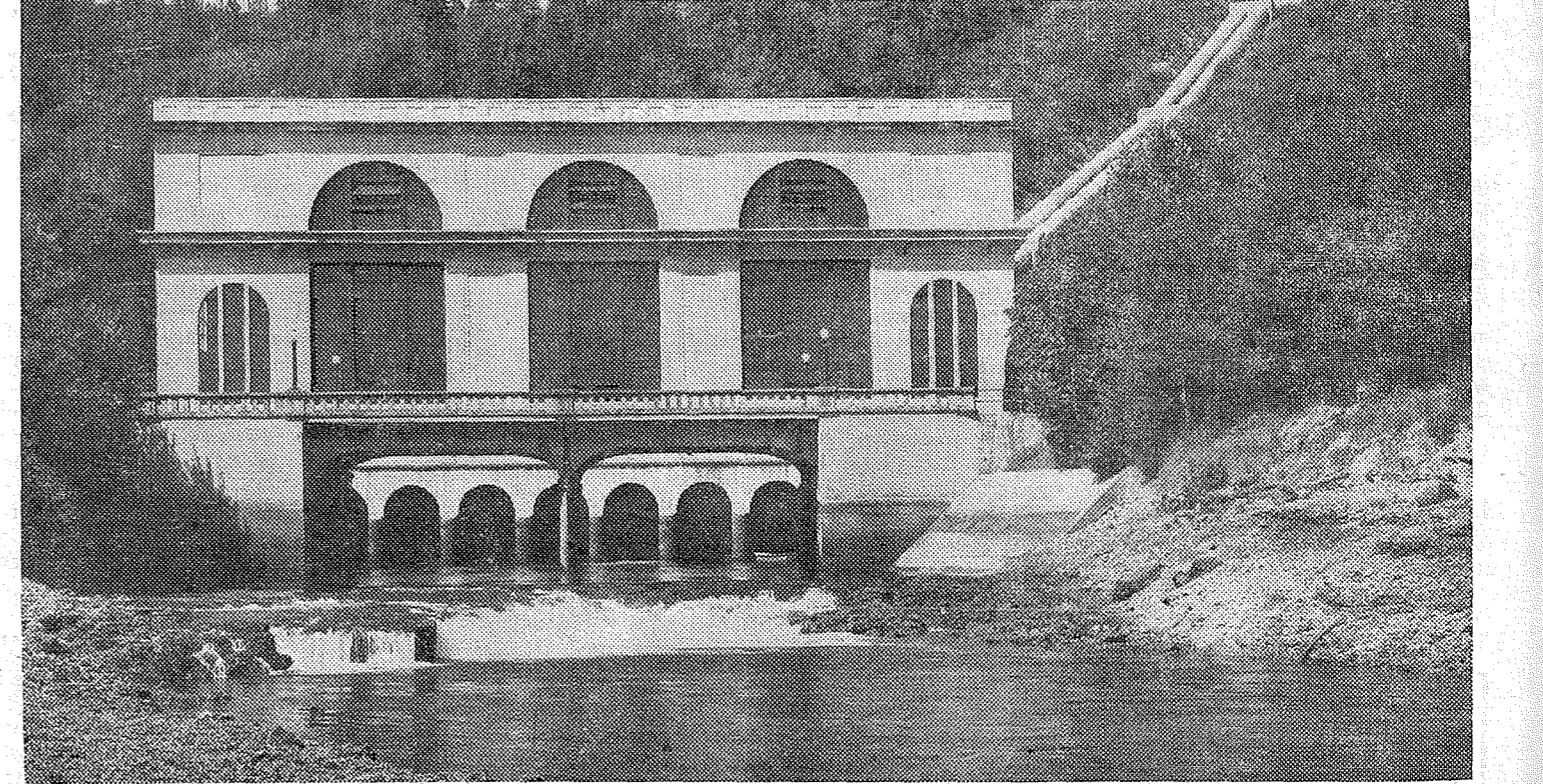

**KNOW YOUR TACOMA CITY LIGHT**



**YOU** see this structure from the Olympic Highway—Cushman Power Plant No. 2. This plant, placed in service in 1930, completed the second step in the development of the North Fork of the Skokomish River and has provisions for accommodating waters of the South Fork—which, when diverted through the plant, will complete Tacoma City Light's program in the Olympics. Housed here are two vertical-type units consisting of a 37,500 h.p. turbine and a 30,000 KVA generator. Here also are the necessary auxiliary operating equipment, the control equipment and shops. Energy is generated at 13,200 volts and stepped up for transmission to 110,000 volts in the transformer and switching station located in the plant. Combined with energy from Cushman Plant No. 1 at this station, it is transmitted over 43 miles of land and water to the Cushman Substation in Tacoma where the voltage is stepped down for further distribution to industry and homes. It crosses the treacherous Narrows by way of a 6244.5 foot overhead transmission span of 6 1/4" galvanized plow steel stranded conductors, the longest electrical transmission span known.

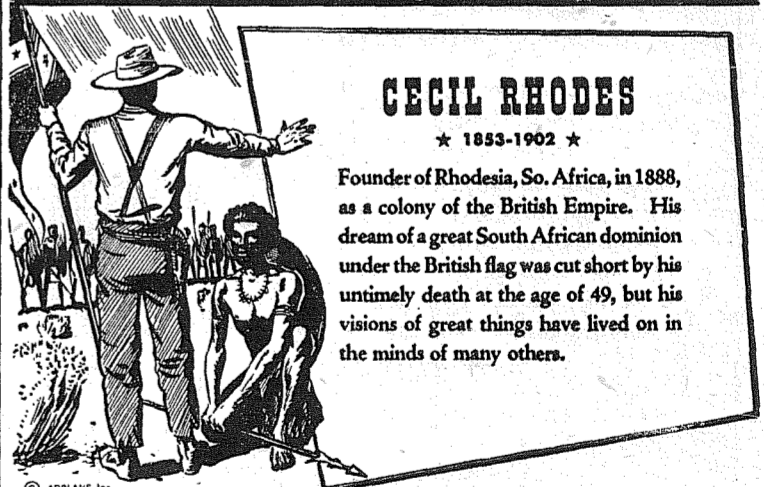
