

PETITIONS WILL BE CIR-CULATED TO CREATE BUILDING RESTRICTIONS

The residents of certain districts in Parkland, through their Community Club, have demonstrated desire to make their section primarily residential. They have further voiced a strong opposition to the policy of allowing undesirable construction in the area. If 65 per cent of the property owners in the prescribed district sign the petitions for the etablishment of a residential zone, these community objectives will be accomplished.

The zoning committee of the Parkland Community Club, which includes Mrs. Jennie Palmer, Mrs. E. M. Akre, Dr. Philip E. Hauge, Mel Pedersen, E. N. Cook and Dr. O. M. Jordahl, has made certain recommendations. These were unanimously approved by the club members.

PROPOSED ZONING REGULATIONS

A. Area

The aproximate area which will be affected by the zoning regulations will be bordered on the north by Harrison street, on the south by Tule Lake Road, on the the west by Yakima avenue. The area will extend beyond Harrison street along Park avenue to within one block of Airport Road. Garfield street will be excluded.

Existing buildings will not be affected by the proposed zoning regulations. They will apply only to new construction.

Good Friday

On April 19th millions of Christians in all parts of the world will pause, put aside their daily tasks and reverently worship their Lord and Saviour who was crucified on the Hill of the Skull over 1900 years ago. We have come to call this sacred day Good Friday.

For those who profess the Christian faith this day is of greater importance than Christmas or Easter, for it was on this day that the purpose of Christ's life on earth was accomplished. It was on this day that he voluntarily took upon himself the sins of the world and offered himself as the human sacrifice that would atone for those sins for all time. Without this death upon the cross Christ's life on earth would be meaning-

Throughout our land churches of every denomination will hold services from 12 noon until 3 in the afternoon. These hours represent the time that Christ suffered on the cross before death. Many states have rightfully declared Good Friday a legal holiday, making it possible for all Christians to attend these very important services. Most cities and states at least set aside these three hours as a time when business ceases and schools close.

The policy of the Parkland school can be held up as a good example to all of the schools of Tacoma and its outlying districts. On Good Friday the Parkland school will be dismissed at 1:30 p. m. so that all of its students will be able to attend services of their choice. With great emphasis being placed upon the elimination of juvenile delinquency, we cannot afford to pass by the greatest day in human history without calling to the attention of our children its great significance.

Stricter Divorce Code

Edward Riley, state representative to the Washington Legislature from Seattle, is one of the congressmen who are by business and devotional meetpushing for action to amend the state's divorce code. The ing. reasons for this lawmaker's action are well grounded. It is too easy in our state to try out marriage and if either party does not like the bargain to walk into a court of law and have the marriage set aside. This point is established by a comparison between Washington's divorce law and the notoriously loose regulations of the state of Nevada. There are only nine grounds for divorce action in Reno, the world's divorce capital, while in our state there are eleven.

Commenting on this situation, Mr. Riley says, "Washington is the greatest state in the union. It has never been adequately advertised. 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

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
