QUESTIONNAIRE SHOWS 65 PER CENT WANT MORE PROTECTION

The majority of residents in Parkland seem to favor added police protection according to a report at the Parkland Community Club last Thursday by Robert Haner, chairman of the committee on police protection.

Statistics compiled from the 136 questionnaires returned so far out Keep Brownies Busy of the 600 distributed are as fol-

Sixty five percent believe we need more protection, while twenty three per cent say we don't need it. Twelve per cent

Forty eight per cent are willing to pay 75 cents a month for police protection, while forty one per cent believe that figure is too high. Eleven per cent didn't know if the figure was too high or not. More complete records will be available when the rest of the questionnaires are returned.

HOPE IS SEEN FOR ESTABLISHING HIGH SCHOOL IN SPANAWAY

Spanaway residents voted 4 to 1 in favor of a consolidated over a union high school in a straw vote taken at the meeting of the Spanaway Progressive Community Club, Dec. 16.

The meeting, based entirely on the establishing of a high school, is the second sponsored by the Community Club in an effort to determine which kind of a school would be most desirable.

In view of the vote, the club will support a plan for consolidation, according to Mrs. Dorothy Smith, secretary of the club.

Crowd of 125 Attends

The vote was taken after the crowd of 125 persons heard a talk by Mrs. Ruby Graham of Gig Harbor on the success of consolidation in the Peninsula district.

The possibility of getting a high school was given a boost when Olai Hageness, county superintendent of schools, stated that a high school is needed in the district south of Tacoma more than in any other area of the state. It would have had a high school before this if a site could have been agreed upon, he said.

Explain Difference

Both Hageness and his assistant, Mrs. Ruth Bethel, were at the meeting to answer questions on consolidated and union high schools and explained the differ-

The high school plan may materialize into two high schools, one in Parkland and one in Spanaway, or one centrally located high school for the entire South End, Hageness said.

Two wash bowls and six toilets for the girls and two and a new member, Mrs. Harry wash bowls and six toilets for the boys! These are the limited facilities which must accommodate over 800 pupils at the Parkland school.

And that's not the only reason you should help get a 7-room addition to the school by voting for a 25 mill tax levy for one year at the special school election being held Dec. 20. Here are some other conditions at the school as released by Suprintendent Morris E. Ford.

The school, built to house 300 to 400 pupils, is now so overcrowded that the children have lost their playshed and even part of the basement to classrooms.

The children's lunch period has been cut 15 minutes as there isn't enough recreation space for all of them to play.

Classrooms are filled to overflowing so that there is not even enough room for each student to have a desk and some must use chairs.

Present trends indicate that the school will have even a larger attendance next year.

The school has only two recourses to follow if it is not granted the money for a new building, according to Ford. One is to divide the auditorium into four classrooms, and the other to split the school hours into two shifts with each student going only half a day. Neither solutions are satisfactory. In the first, the students must sacrifice a much needed auditorium, in the second their rights to a full time educational program.

The state has offered to furnish 72 per cent of the cost if we can raise the other 28 per cent. We cannot ask for a better opportunity to get the addition.

Be sure to turn out for the election and vote for the 25 mill tax levy for one year. Remember that the measure will fail to pass unless at least 40 per cent of those who voted in the last general election turn in their ballots.

The polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Dec. 20, in the Parkland school basement. Be there and ensure a full time school program with the proper facilities for your children.
