Also included are all the lighting fixtures and outlets. The house is finished in clear fir flooring or oak flooring throughout, and one-half inch wallboard on the ceilings. The total price of \$2,475 provides for the house being built on the property. For \$2,650, Orville Torgeson, manager, stated the house will be built with double outside walls.

The down payment required ranges from approximately \$400 to \$600, depending on the location and value of the property, which must be free and clear. Payments can be made as low as \$35 a month. The house pictured is one on display at the Brookdale Lumber Co.




A special school election for a 20-mill tax levy will be held in Midland and Harvard, Sept. 11.

Books Close August 11

Registration books in Harvard and Midland will close August 11. They are closing because a special school election will be held September 11 and the books must be closed 30 days before the election.

The special school election is not being held with the general election this year because of conflicting boundaries of school districts and the regular voting districts—a confusion which invalidated a school election previously.

Because of this, proponents of the school election are facing a big problem—that of getting voters to the polls. Voters are generally reluctant to go to the polls for any other than route. a general election, but with the presidential election coming up three days later, the task of getting them to vote will be even greater. And by law, 40 per cent of those who voted in the last general election must vote in a school election or it will be invalidated. Thus the 20 mill levy which will be used to complete the new Midland school can be defeated simply by the unwillingness of Midland and Harvard residents to take the time and energy to vote in two elections.

Don't let this happen. Give Midland her new school. Vote in the special election September 11—and be sure to register before August 11.

In 1930, Steve Baskett Sr. and his sons, who were then working in Tacoma, started by part time and evening work to build a lumber mill


During the depression they cut lumber on shares. They tell of one family who took advantage of this and by using split cedar shakes for roofing were able to build a home for \$1.35, the cost of the nails used.

In 1933 and 1934 the mill cut only cedar, supplying many of Tacoma's retail yards. During the war years the Baskett family did all of their own logging to supply war materials and at this time Leona Baskett, now Mrs. Paul Turosik won for herself the name Miss Pauline Bunyan by driving the logging trucks.

After the war they added the hardware department where they carry a full line of hardware.

Way back in the early 1900's a group of Harvard and Midland residents started the Midland Improvement Club. Among these founders were L. L. Asher, William Whitfield, Lou Bixby, Charles Taylor, E. E. Lockwood, J. O. Howell and J. H. Moos.

At this time the community was in danger of losing the mail route out through Midland if the roads were not improved, so through the Improvement Club they were able to secure help under the Donahue System whereby the county supplied part of the cost and the property owners paid the rest. In this way the Midland-Summit highway was reconditioned. Part of the meetings were held at Harvard and some at Summit depending on what project the club was currently working on. of Mr. and Mrs. Burt Vaughan.

In 1926 a committee was appointed by the president of the Improvement Club to investigate the possibility of city water for Midland and shortly after this the Southeast Tacoma Mutual Water Co. was formed. The Improvement Club was also incorporated in 1926 and subscriptions were then taken to enable the group to start work on a community hall which was built at the present location of the Midland Hall. The original building was completed and the first dance held in 1927. The debt against the building was paid off by giving Saturday night dances and in 1928 the hall was enlarged to its

present size. The Improvement Club has been instrumental in gaining the many mprovements we have enjoyed through the years. They are still working for the benefit of the community and welcome all persons interested in the welfare of home, children and community to come out and join and take part in the work of a club that can well be proud of
