

Fire Calls Roundup Seeks

Deputy Saves 2-Year-Old In Spanaway Home Fire

A 2-year old girl was saved from possible suffication last week when a sheriff's deputy entered her smokefilled Spanaway home and car-

ried the tot to safety. The deputy, Roy Durham, received a letter of commendation from Sheriff Jack Berry for his courage.

Durham was directed to the scene by Francis Olsen, assistant superintendent of Bethel Schools , who reported seeing smoke pouring from a nearby house. After radioing for the Spanaway - Elk Plain Fire Department, the deputy drove to the house and found Mrs. Patricia Ann Rice, Rt. 1, Box 117, Spanaway in the yard.

She advised Durham that her daughter, Patricia Lynn, was still inside. Making several rescue attempts, the deputy located the youngster in an upstairs bedroom and carried her to safety. Fire units arrived as he emerged from the building, and applied oxygen. She was taken to the Parkland Clinic for treatment, and released.

Heat from burning grease in a deep-fat fryer started wall paper to burn, and the fire quickly spread to nearby garbage by the kitchen door, firemen reported. Flames were quickly snuffed out by a fireman using a 2 1/2 pound dry

chemical hand extinguisher. Chief John Ferran saidevidence indicated the fire had burned for sometime before it was detected, and his department was conducting an investigation of the blaze.

Damage was estimated at at \$800. The house is owned by Thorn Tibbitts, Rt. 1, Box 1165, Spanaway.



Maybe the early resignation of County Treasurer L. R. Johnson will permit him to do a little fishing, but you can bet your gold watch that the timing was designed more to permit someone else to make haybefore the bloom is off the timothy.

The 89-year-old Democrat is too late for the late openings and too early for the ocean fishing. He might have retired last year on his wife's passing or at the end of this year when he completed 22 years in office. Infirmity could have excused his quitting months ago, seeing that he virtually had been replaced in office by his staff. So, why oh why, the first of July?

When it first became known that Johnson wouldn't seek reelection, declarations of candidacy followed from his chief deputy Charles Hoerauf and from Maurice Raymond. Johnson gave his public blessing to Hoerauf, who already had become a virtual "incumbent" and looked like the man to beat.

But Johnson's early resignation changed two things. It meant that Hoerauf would once again be only "number two" in the office and that there once again would be an incumbent who might run to succeed him-

Such an appointment to either of the declared candidates would have been worth 10 pounds of baggage at the weigh-in. But Commissioner Harry Sprinker announced with the reading of the resignation that the appointment would NOT go to a "declared" candidate.

The chances are then, that the appointment will go to the only OTHER kind of candidate there is ... an ''undeclared' candidate. If the move were only to take a little lustre away from Hoerauf (in the interest of Raymond, for instance) the move would have been more effective AFTER the close of filing. As it is, the situation is known to other potential candidates as

If Johnson's resignation was accepted Tuesday (yesterday when you read this), the commissioners have 30 days from July 1 to name his successor The filings for the primary election are open July 25 through 29. That gives the interim appointee a good month to make up his mind to run. We'd like to just predict that he WILL, and that his appointment, followed by his filing, will provide enough press exposure in late June and July to give him the rail as they come off the turn.

The treasurer's post, much like that of assessor, auditor or clerk, is highly valued among politicians. Short of a

major scandal, a move to greener pastures or to "the" green pastures, one is seldom removed from office. In short, it is almost a political appointment. And, since practically no rules or policies are set by these administrators, the public votes heavily for name familiarity even to crossing party lines for an incumbent.

In November 1966, the Democratic nominee is heavy favorite to win the office of Pierce County treasurer. In September 1966, the incumbent Pierce County treasurer would be the favorite for the nomination. In July 1966, the hay is ready for the making.

is necessary for a league. Each boy that wants to play in the Colt League signs up at the Recreation Office. The coaches get together and draw the names out of a hat to determine on which team the boys will play. After the season is over, the boys that are still eligible for the next year will automatically stay on the same roster the next year. This gives each team a nucleus for each year. Only eight sixteen year olds can be on any one roster for league play. Other methods of drawing teams are employed in different districts. At tournament time, an all star roster is picked, disregarding the number of sixteen year olds

for tournament play. The winning teams coach will pick an all star team to play in the area tournament. From there the winning team goes to the District, to the Sectional, to the Divisional to the Regional and finally to the world series. Only at the world series play is the entire fináncial burden reimbursed. In the Section, Divisional and Retional Tournament play. some or all of the financial burden is paid by gate receipts of host teams.

Colt League Baseball was first organized in Martins Ferry, Ohio, in 1953. It was the first program organized for this age bracket on a national scale. The president of the league was then and is still Joe E. Brown. Joe E. Brown spreads good will wherever he goes. The commissioner, or real active participant with a full time job, is Lew Hays, who has been at the helm since the inception of such a program.

Rules and regulations of the Colt League are largely those of professional baseball with the exception of the wearing of protective gear and protection for the participants, such as pitching regulations.

Since this is for the boys and also on a National level, each coach that wants to go out on the playing field must wear a team uniform. This includes going out to coach at first or coach may be used on the baseline, either at first or






