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\$2000 Down, \$4500 To Go for Park. Library

In spite of the soaking drizzle which didn't let up all day, another thousand dollars was added to the thousand dollar fund for the new Parkland library last Saturday.

This sum, added to the \$600 previously pledged by six persons and the nearly \$400 netted from three Community Club events, brings the total in the fund to approximately \$2,000, according to Clinton Williams, chairman of the library finance committee. The proposed building will cost an estimated \$6,500.

Due to the adverse weather, only a couple dozen people turned out last Saturday to launch the house-to-house campaign, and vast areas of Parkland remained untouched. However, people in these areas may expect to be called upon within the next few days, now that the dewdrops seem to have subsided. Volunteers will continue the canvass until every family has been contacted.

Every family that donates receives a card to place in a front window of their home. They are urged to keep them there until the campaign is completed so that they will not be unnecessarily called upon again.

In analyzing the returns from last

Saturday's canvass, Williams said that the thousand dollars was raised only because some individuals gave amounts of \$25, \$15 and \$10. He expressed alarm at the fact that a couple hundred contributed only a dollar.

Since it will take over \$6,000 to erect the building, it will require an average of six dollars from each of 1,000 families to reach the goal. The campaign cannot succeed if most of the contributors give only a dollar. Of course the committee realizes that there are some who can afford no more than a dollar.

The solicitors will accept pledges. Persons may pay 50 per cent now, and 50 per cent when construction starts.

The library committee of the Parkland Community Club will meet again this week at the home of the Ray Renwicks.

The building will be located on 119th Street, across Pacific Ave. from the Parkland XXXX. Tentative plans have been drawn up by Mel Pedersen but are subject to modification. The building will have a capacity of 5,000 volumes. It will be built with the idea that it may be added onto according to the needs.

Bus Accident Fatal To Parkland Child

A tragic accident on the Mountain Highway suddenly snuffed out the life of a 5½ year old Parkland boy Saturday. Victim was Robert Alvin Swanson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin J. Swanson of Route 3.

The accident occurred at 127th and Pacific, one block north of Barrett's Market, as Bobby, his mother and his younger sister was getting off the south-bound Spanaway bus a few minutes before 7 in the evening.

Before anyone knew what was going on, Bobby had apparently wandered in front of the bus, the bus had started up, he had been knocked down, and both the front and back wheel had passed over his body. Driver was Claire B. Carmel of Tacoma.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at Trinity Lutheran Church, with Dr. E. B. Steen officiating.

The voters by a huge majority of 231 to 5 indicated their approval of the district's formation, and selected as their commissioners George Dorfner,

William Righetti and Harry Randall. Harold Baker was appointed first fire chief.

In June of 1946, 31 property owners in the south end of the Clover Creek area, adjoining the Elk Plain section, petitioned to join the district and were accepted. The volunteers answered their first alarm on Aug. 22, 1946.

In the recent election, Harold Baker was elected to succeed George Dorfner. Chet McAttee is the fire chief, leading an organization of 40 members, including two assistant chiefs, two first aid captains and two (Continued to Page Three)

Fireman Urge Cleanup Week

The four fire chiefs of the South End have issued a plea to all citizens to cooperate in Spring Clean-up Week to safeguard the community against fire, accidents, disease, and to improve its appearance.

Leading the campaign are Chief Lewis Duffey of Parkland, Chief Dave McPherson of Harvard-Midland-Larchmont, Chief Chet McAttee of Spanaway-Elk Plain and Chief Andy Ramsay of Summit-Woodland-Collins. For the home check-up they suggest that householders:

Get rid of all rubbish and papers in the attic, closets, basement, yard and garage. Tie them into bundles for salvage. Check stoves, furnaces and heaters. Have all repair work done now. See that floors under stoves are protected by metal, bricks or cement. Insulate all burnable material subject to heat radiated from stoves, furnaces, and pipes. Empty hot ashes into metal containers. Clear chimney and check for cracks, loose bricks and mortar. Place metal screens in front of fireplace. Place portable heaters so they can't be knocked over.

Distribute enough ash trays in convenient places for smokers. See that matches are out of reach of young children and placed in safe containers. Check gas connections on portable heaters. Shut-off valves should be located on pipe before rubber tubing.

Never use gasoline, benzine or naphtha for cleaning. Don't quicken a sluggish fire by pouring on kerosene. It may easily flame out of control. Destroy paint rags and oily cleaning cloths or put them in a metal container with a cover. Hang up oily mops so that air can circulate through them.

Spring Clean-Up will be observed during the week of April 23rd to 29th inclusive.
