Postmaster Gives Advice on Mailing Christmas Gifts

Cooperation of the public in preparing Christmas mail was asked this week by Elmer J. Beard, acting postmaster of Parkland.

"Careful preparation of the mail by the sender will greatly facilitate the handling of Christmas mail," Beard said.

He gave the following information for the guidance of mailers.

Addresses—Address all matter plainly and completely in ink, with the senders return card in the upper left corner of the address side. Tags should not be used unless necessary, in which case a

The Parkland post office will remain open until 5:30 p. m. Saturdays during December instead of closing at noon, according to Elmer J. Beard, acting postmaster. It will stay open until 8 p. m. week nights if the Christmas mailing rush is heavy enough to demand such action, he said.

copy of the address and return card should be placed inside the parcel for identification if tag is lost.

Postage—Prepay postage fully on all mail matter.

Packing and Wrapping—Pack articles carefully in strong durable containers. Wrap parcels securely.

Seals—Christmas seals or stickers should not be placed on the address side of the mail.

Stamps—Mailers may save time by buying postage stamps in advance.

Insurance—Parcels should be insured. The fees are: For parcels valued not over \$5, 3 cents; over \$5 but not over \$25, 10 cents; over \$25 but not over \$50, 15 cents; over \$50 but not over \$200, 25 cents. Return receipt 4 cents extra. All in addition to regular postage.

Christmas Cards—A three cent postage stamp together with the return address of sender on the upper left hand corner of the envelope will insure forwarding if misdirected, or the return to sender if the forwarding address is unknown.

GRANGERS ASK FULL BUDGET

POWER APPROPRIATION CUT OPPOSED AT JAMES SALES MEETING

A resolution demanding that the full amount of money asked by the Bonneyville Administration be restored to the budget in the interest of farmers and the Northwest in general, was passed by the James Sales Grange at their meeting Dec. 4.

The last Congress, in its attempt to slash the budget, made no distinction between national expense and national investment, with the result that the Northwest is faced with an imminent power shortage and a restriction on new industries, according to a press release by the Kellogg Marsh Power Committee.

Charges Power Lobby
The release charged that the appropriation cut is the direct result of pressure from the Power Lobby. It said that the Bonneyville act states specifically that the power is to go to the PUD's and REA's with only the surplus to go to the private power companies, but that the appropriation bill was so worded that the money can be used for major transmission lines and sub-stations only. This makes the power available only to the big power companies and preventing the PUD's and REA's from getting any because of the cost of connecting to this high voltage.

The resolution, part of a state-wide campaign, has already been passed by the 22 other granges, according to the release.

"The resolution emphasizes the fact that the Grangers are incensed over the situation in which power from dams, built with public funds, distributed over wires and through sub-stations built with public funds will now be sold back to us by private companies at a profit that will come out of the very public which built these facilities in the first place," the release said.

St. John of the Woods Church in Midland will be officially opened with the dedication ceremony at 10:30 a. m., Dec. 14. Msgr. W. J. Noonan of St. Patrick's Church in Tacoma will officiate at the program.

The Mission will be conducted throughout the week by Father Suver, the first priest to say mass on Iwo Jima after soldiers raised the American flag. His topics will be "The Purpose of Life," "The Obstacles of Life," "Life's Failure," "The Beginning of Life," "The Renewal of Life," "The Eternal Life" and "The Mass" in that order.

The old St. John of the Woods Church was destroyed by fire in 1940. Parishoners have been holding mass in the Midland Improvement hall each Sunday. They have been diligently working to get a new church under the direction of their pastor Rev. Robert Logan.

Construction of the building was started last July after a corner stone laying ceremony with the Most Rev. Gerald Shaughnessy, bishop of Seattle, officiating.

Complete furnishings for the church were supplied by the Kauer Co. All pews, railings and benches are in jawn natural wood. Drapes at the back of the stone altar are of green mohair.

Contractors for the church was Jim Parvis while John McGuire was the architect.

Fire Proof Tree

With Christmas almost here, Fire Warden Eldon Cook has come up with a suggestion for fireproofing Christmas trees.

Says Cook, "Your Christmas Tree is a fire hazard unless it is fireproofed. You can do this by mixing 4 ounces of boric acid powder and 4 ounces of 20 mule team borax soap powder. Dissolve in 1 quart of water. That will make the average tree for homes fire resistant. Just spray it on and let it dry. If you wish a different color you can mix kalsomine with the formula. For the last three years we have been called out on Christmas for tree fires so let us make this a fireless Christmas by fireproofing the tree."

This means they must spend over an hour daily on buses and in most cases must sacrifice after-school activities for the travel time.

Whether the South End is to get two high schools or one, or whether it votes for a consolidated high school or a union high, its residents will have to get out and actively support these movements if they are not to die from lack of interest. So add your support to these measures and urge your friends to do the same.

South End residents will get a high school only if they are willing to work for one.


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
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
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
