Spanaway, Elk Plain, Clover Creek, and Lacamas to Vote on Millage Levy, Bond Issue, Name and Site of Proposed School

A special proposition calling for a 28-mill tax levy and a maximum bond issue will be presented to voters in Spanaway, Elk Plain, Lacamas, and Clover Creek at the regular school election March 6.

The millage and bond issue, if voted in, will yield about \$100,000 to be used to build a high school for the district


