

School Board Sets Millage Election For March 6

High School Planned If Proposition Passes

Spanaway, Elk Plain, Clover Creek, and Lacamas to Vote on Millage Levy, Bond Issue, Name and Site of Proposed School

A special proposition calling for a 28-mill tax levy and a maximum bond issue will be presented to voters in Spanaway, Elk Plain, Lacamas, and Clover Creek at the regular school election March 6.

The millage and bond issue, if voted in, will yield about \$100,000 to be used to build a high school for the district named. The state will then be asked for a matching fund.

The attorney expressed the opinion that the aid to Europe is the only way to bring about a stable world. He said there were four ways to view the aid, these being as charity, good business, imperialism, or keeping the peace.

Binns' statement, "There is too much loose talk of war," was reminiscent of the speech given several months ago by Dr. Wavven Tomlinson to members of the Community Club. Tomlinson also believed the world could not survive another war.

POST SUPPORTS UNION SCHOOL

WILL ATTEMPT TO GET SURPLUS SUPPLIES, ADJUTANT DECLARES

Clover Creek American Legion Post 118 passed a resolution Jan. 9 to support the program of the Union High School District No. 205 and their request to secure surplus buildings of the old Spanaway CCC camp, according to John Lee, adjutant of the post and chairman of the educational committee.

The post's educational committee has been researching into the problem of obtaining government surplus buildings for the high school district. These buildings had to be so constructed that they could be disassembled into workable sections, Lee said. Then with competent architectural plans they could be made into standard type brick veneer high school buildings.

Financial Boost

"Due to the extremely high building costs at this time and the pressing need for high school facilities in this area, the post feels it will be a tremendous financial boost to the Union High School District," he continued.

"The surplus buildings plus the millage now being sought by the district will make a high school possible in the very near future."

The post is aware that plans for the Union high school call for reinforced concrete construction but believes that the plans mentioned will be supplemental to whatever financial aid is forthcoming from the state board of education for a fireproof structure, he said.

The post has contacted Senators Harry P. Cain, Warren Magnuson and Representative Thor Tollefson and is now getting further facts for them at their request.

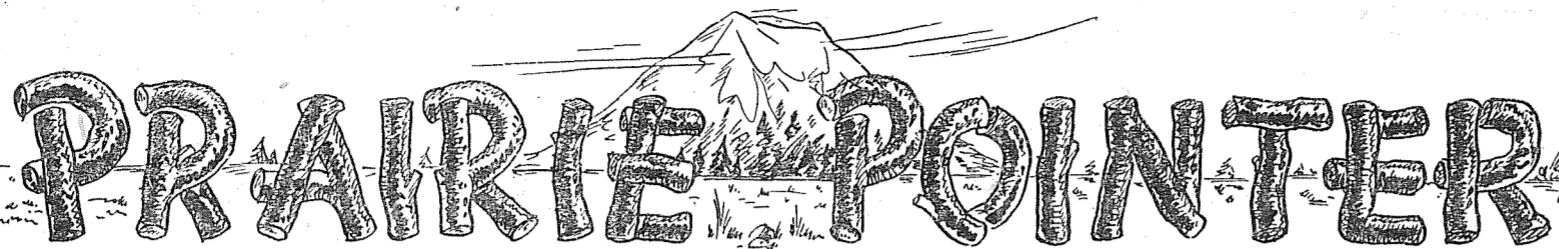
Parkland Water Pump Fuse Burns Out; Resident Can't Shave—Takes Holiday

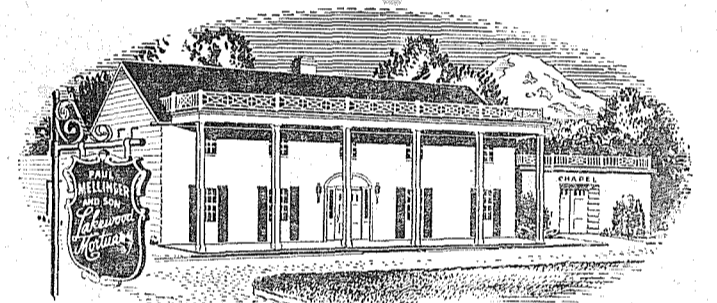
Parkland Postmaster Examination Slated
