

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS GIVE APPROVAL TO VOTE ON WATER AREA

A step, sought by many Spanaway residents since 1942, was realized Monday when the County Commissioners okayed the calling of an election for a water district. Commissioner Harvey O. Scofield made the motion for approval of the petition signed by more than 225 Spanaway residents, whose spokesman was Hubert Guinn. Commissioner Les A. Hudson seconded the motion. The date to decide whether a district will be organized and the election of will be set in the near future by elected, the water district commissioners would establish the area to be included in the district, and the cost of erecting a steel tower, which would be similar to the one now in operation at Park-

land. The approval of the petition limaxed a move begun more than five years ago by a small group of Spanaway men, Hubert Guinn, Ernie Senff, Pete Nygard, and George King. Petitions for a water district were circulated at that time, but because of lack of support, the effort was abandoned. Les Glidden worked the hardest on those petitions," Hubert Guinn stated, "and though we didn't succeed then, we haven't forgotten his work."

Public Pressure

Three months ago, responding o pressure from a large number of Spanaway people, Guinn, Martin Gibbons, John Rohr, Chet Modahl and L. Jones again began their drive to secure sufficient signatures to make the election possible. This time their efforts met with an enthusiastic response, and more than 225 signatures were secured. This did not include many whom the petitioners were unable to reach. Most of the people living west of the lake were not con-




