



TRADING STAMPS—Something For Nothing?

Here is the real truth about trading stamps, and it is confirmed by 4200 Washington grocers, Washington Chambers of Commerce, Retail Trade Bureaus, Department, Variety and Dry Goods stores, Druggists, Florists, Fuel and Ice dealers, Furniture stores, Furriers, Hardware and Sporting Goods stores, Jewelers, Ladies' and Men's Clothing stores, Music stores, Office Supplies and Equipment stores, Restaurants, Shoe stores, and Tailor

TRADING STAMPS MISUNDERSTOOD

Trading stamps are the most misunderstood and misrepresented form of advertising in use today. You have heard, no doubt, that trading stamps cost the merchant nothing because they increase his business and cost the consumer nothing, and with them she gets lots of valuable merchandise prizes. Because trading stamps have been misrepresented, we would like to tell you the truth about them.

METHOD OF OPERATION

They have been in use for many years and issued by hundreds of companies. The principle is the same for all, with slight variations. The stamp company prints sheets of stamps and sells them in pads to merchants who give them to customers — one with each 10c purchase. The customer pastes them in books. When a book is full it represents \$120 in purchases and has iums and prizes which are greatly

trading stamp company redemption stores for merchandise premiums, most of which are grossly overpriced.

WASH. STATE LAW

That is the way stamp companies operate in most states, but not so in Washington. Here we have a Washington State Trading Stamp law passed in 1939. If one store takes business away from its competitors because of stamps, then the competitors take on other brands of stamps. Who wins? Only the stamp companies. Who pays the bill? The citizens pay the bill — 3% to 4% in increased cost of their regular purchases.

Stamp companies have flourished in some states for many years, but the fad is waning. Now they want to get into our state for their own selfish benefit.

We believe that the present Washington Trading Stamp law is better for the public and the retail industry alike, and therefore urae you to keep the Washington Trading Stamp law intact. It should not be amended in any way.

Most stamp companies are not

local people, and they are not interested in Washington consumers' welfare - only in their own profit.



Help protect the economy of our state. Let your legislators know that you too feel that our present trading stamp law should remain as is.

I will emphasize that I am not in favor of names and addresses, too. opening up the State for all forms of gambling, but I do think that our constitution should be amended to permit this form of lottery. It should be taken into consideration in connection with any tax raise, and acted upon by the legislature, and be put on the ballot for the people to decide as money matters always concern us, the

I do not think that because a few individuals and groups oppose a lottery, that is enough reason to withhold this matter from the public's decision. A lottery, of course, would not do away with taxes but it sure would help pay the bills. Even if the State did not net more than 15-20 million dolars a year, it would be well worth the effort. But I do think the revenue could be greater yet.

To be a success, a lottery has to be run right, from the very beginning. I have made some study of a lottery which was operated very successfully for more than 20 years in Sweden. A few people mention graft and corruption in connection with a lottery but this can be avoided if we apply the laws regarding counterfeit of U.S. money, and sell the tickets through established dealers, such as banks, supermarkets, real estate offices and so forth, and have a monthly public statement by the lottery agency.

Baja California, the 800-mile-long peninsula pointing southward like a great finger, has never had an official census. The northern half became Mexico's newest state in 1953. Of the estimated 160,000 population nearly all live on or near the California border. Tijuana has about 125,000; Mexicali, the state capital, 15,000; and Ensenada, Pacific port 60 miles south of the border, 10,000.

Mexicali Valley agriculture and Ensenada fishing give employment to the few hundred, but most of the border population depends upon the American tourist dollars.
