Many dreams and material considerations this past year have gone into the plans and construction of a new building for the Economy Furniture Store, 10228 Pacific Ave.

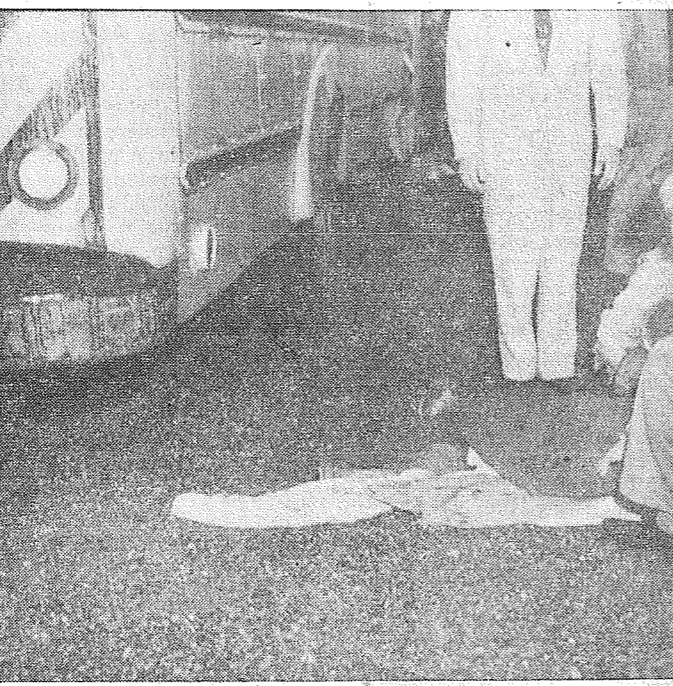

Franklin Pierce District Needs More School Funds

A March special election has been called by Franklin Pierce School Board Directors with two propositions to be placed on the ballot by school officials. The Pierce schools will be asking for the right to issue \$250,000 in bonds and for a 20-mill excess tax levy. The action came as a result of the resolutions passed at the board's monthly meeting last week. Board members in calling for a bond issue pointed out the fact of the need for the district to bond itself to 10 percent of assessed valuation in order to qualify for state matching funds. Superintendent Ed Nelson said the District will fall below the 10 percent requirement July 1. With enrollment still on the increase, Pierce schools will need another new elementary school shortly.

In building new schools, the need for meeting state requirements on indebtedness is pointed out by the fact that 76 percent of the cost of six additions and five new buildings have been financed by state and federal aid. The state's large share in financing the new buildings and additions would not have been possible, however, without local people authorizing the district to issue bonds.

The 20-mill levy is needed to meet rising operational costs and staff the new Andrew Christensen Elementary next fall. The costs of textbooks is one prime factor for the levy request. The increase growth of the district, along with the rising prices of all operational and instructional costs has created a large drain on the General Fund.

A Monday night Education Council meeting to make plans for the campaign was held. The Council is composed of representatives from the school connected organizations throughout the district. A steering committee was appointed for the task of "getting out the vote" and bringing the issues to the voters.

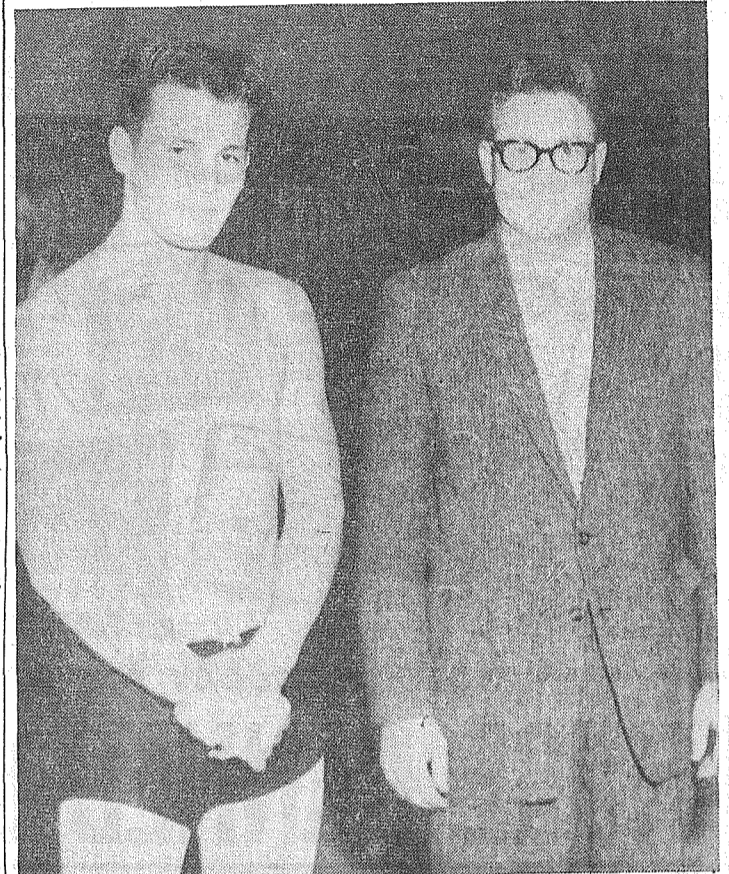

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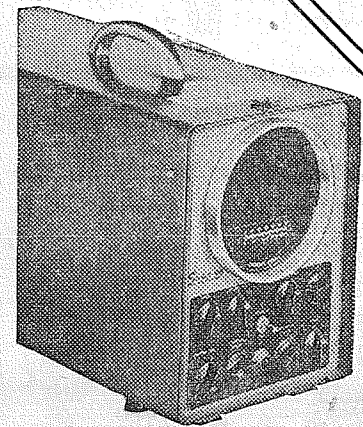
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Letter To Editor

As we all know, there is a shortage in State funds, and the Legislature seems to be of the opinion that the only way to bring in funds is to keep on raising taxes. And as our State grows bigger, as the years go by, we will need more and more revenue to run our government. Instead of raising the taxes time after time we should look for unusual sources of revenue. In many countries of the world for many years, money has been provided thru lotteries, a fair, voluntary and efficient form of bringing in funds.

I have talked to a great number of people during the last few months about a "State Lottery" and found very few objecting. A lottery run by a state agency, under the right setup, is an excellent resource because most people do like to gamble in one form or another. And, if the gambling, in this form, could be performed in the open and legal, people would buy the tickets to satisfy their gambling urge and, at the same time, provide funds for the State without having to partake in games and such run by private operators, from which the State gets little or nothing.

Some people feel that a lottery would encourage the desire to get something for nothing and that it would be in some form immoral. I do disagree. Australia, Ireland, Sweden and many other countries have permitted lotteries in various forms and I do not think the people's morals worse than others because of lotteries.

We collect revenue from liquor and other sources and a lottery revenue would be far superior, morally speaking. I will emphasize that I am not in favor of opening up the State for all forms of gambling, but I do think that our constitution should be amended to permit this form of lottery. It should be taken into consideration in connection with any tax raise, and acted upon by the legislature, and be put on the ballot for the people to decide as money matters always concern us, the people.

I do not think that because a few individuals and groups oppose a lottery, that is enough reason to withhold this matter from the public's decision. A lottery, of course, would not do away with taxes but it sure would help pay the bills. Even if the State did not net more than 15-20 million dollars a year, it would be well worth the effort. But I do think the revenue could be greater yet.

To be a success, a lottery has to be run right, from the very beginning. I have made some study of a lottery which was operated very successfully for more than 20 years in Sweden. A few people mention graft and corruption in connection with a lottery but this can be avoided if we apply the laws regarding counterfeit of U. S. money, and sell the tickets through established dealers, such as banks, supermarkets, real estate offices and so forth, and have a monthly public statement by the lottery agency.

I have written to a number of legislators in this matter and I do recommend that if the reader of this article finds the lottery an acceptable suggestion, do write your legislators. I am not looking for any personal gain in connection with a lottery. I am only suggesting it as a form of revenue.

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**County Agent's
Corner**

Demand for most forest products will rise in the coming year. This is the conclusion reached by Carl Hobson, Extension Marketing Price Specialist, and several forest economists who attended the recent annual Agricultural Outlook Conference held in Washington, D.C.

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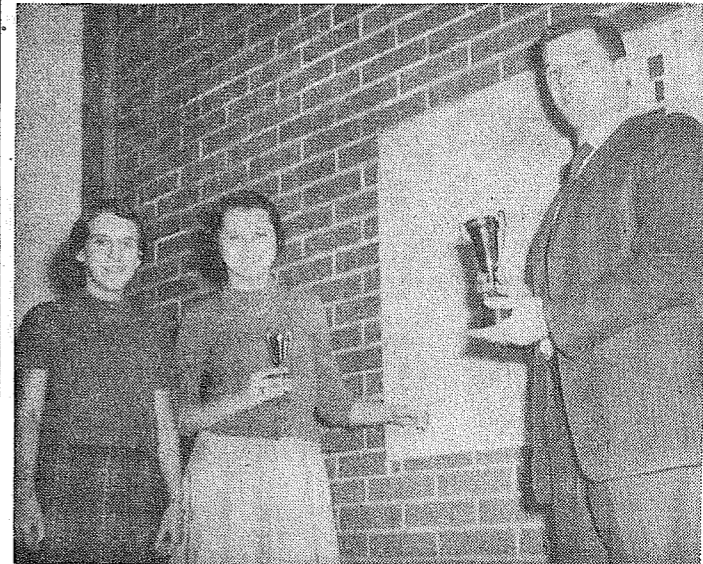
Other conclusions reached by the group are as follows:
Saw logs—The demand for saw logs should be stronger in the coming year. This is particularly true of the Pacific Northwest. That is because our lumber is so dependent upon the housing demand which has recently been increasing sharply. Looking ahead to the 1960's, they expect the demand for saw logs to be very strong at that time because the economist believe that we will be in the middle of a new housing boom by then.

Pulpwood—The recent decline in demand for pulpwood is probably only a temporary reversal of a trend which has been almost steadily upward since 1900. Pulpwood demand is likely to increase next year and most years immediately ahead are likely to see a continuation of the rapid upward trend in the use of pulpwood.

Veneer logs—Total veneer log production in the U. S. has shown little change since 1956. If we go along with the general assumptions for prosperity during the next few years, the demand for veneer logs will improve substantially and prices will advance again.

Fortunately the forest crop does not have to be harvested annually like other farm crops. A forest owner anticipating a better market has the option of deferring a planned cut a few years. A few dollars difference in the price of logs can make a big difference in the net return from several acres of cutting.

San Diego meets the Mexican State of Baja California at its border, and there are those in this city who insist the border gate is a gate to hell. For beyond lies Tijuana, whose most important business is sin. Its gaudy night clubs and half-hidden dives attract Americans in droves. Tourist dollars spent on lurid pastimes—and on bullfights and horse and dog racing—provide the border population with just about its only income. There have been attempts at reform. Two years ago crusading newspaper publisher Manuel Acosta Mesa was slain because he was threatening to publish the names of those he charged were making Tijuana synonymous with vice and corruption. Mesa said there were then 8,000 prostitutes in the border city of 100,000, and that their customers were Americans—"who come here every time they need drugs, easy women or to satisfy whatever insane desire they may have." The city police chief resigned under fire in the investigation of Mesa's death. Gov. Braulio Maldonado of Baja California appointed a new chief and ordered an immediate cleanup of vice in Tijuana. But it is flourishing today as lustily as when Mesa was shot. In San Diego, prominent churchmen, educators and some public officials have long demanded, thus far unsuccessfully, that the border gate be closed, at least, to American juveniles not escorted by adults. Officials in Washington have replied that such action would amount to an insult to a friendly country, and that the border gate is more than a gateway to Tijuana. It is one of three—the others are at Tocado and Mexicali—leading to Baja (lower) California. Baja California, the 800-mile-long peninsula pointing southward like a great finger, has never had an official census. The northern half became Mexico's newest state in 1953. Of the estimated 160,000 population nearly all live on or near the California border. Tijuana has about 125,000; Mexicali, the state capital, 15,000; and Ensenada, Pacific port 60 miles south of the border, 10,000. Mexicali Valley agriculture and Ensenada fishing give employment to the few hundred, but most of the border population depends upon the American tourist dollars.
