I had visions of whirling around in that thing or maybe getting upside down and coming out of it on top of the Parkland water tank. However, I swung that Taylorcraft around and down towards Mother Earth and managed to get clear before I was completely swallowed up in the thick of it. Norm Hondle, my instructor, had warned me to stay away from clouds, but I didn't realize how quickly those things can come upon one. Anyway found out, and also that plenty of altitude comes in very handy at

times such as this.

Although there are some days when flying conditions for light planes are not too good during the winter months, the cold clear days are certainly wonderful. Visibility is exceptionally clear and the air is as smooth as a salesman's conversation. One such Sunday, recently, at 3,500 feet I could see snow-capped mountains in Canada and on down the coast range into Oregon, and the rugged beauty of Rainier was awe-inspiring at has been stricken with a heart atsuch close range. Hard Freeze



When Should We Get a High School?

At that time, too, quite a few people were saying as how pretty soon there would have to be a high school built to take care of all the "kids" wanting to go to high school and how something would have to be done as soon as we could see our way clear to do it.

Today, people and industries and homes and stores and bus lines and fire trucks and restaurants have arrived-but, as yet, no high school. Most people are agreed we need one though, and (shades of the past!) lots of them are still saying as how something ought to be done just as soon as we can see our way clear to do it.

Well, the way should be clear enough on Saturday, January 18, for residents of Central Avenue, Midland, Collins and Parkland. On that day they will go to the polls to decide whether to tackle the problem of getting a high school now or whether to put it off for another few years.

The proposition is plain: "Shall Parkland, Midland, Collins and Central Avenue school districts consolidate for the purpose of providing high school factilities in this area?'

If carried, it means the four districts will unite to form one large district. This one district, under a school board of five members elected by the people and each representing a portion of the new district, will direct the operations of the schools within the district and will take steps necessary to construct a high school.

Of course a yes vote doesn't automatically provide the high school. But a yes vote is the big hurdle. If the four districts can get together on that proposition, there's no question but they'll build the high school, just like they're building the rest of this South End community, a high school which will right away be pressing Puyallup and Cover Park for size.

The proposition is fair: Each district must approve it or the plan is entirely rejected. There can be no coercion in any district. If the proposition is approved the location of the high school must be voted on by the people.

The proposition is sound: The four districts together have a valuation of over two million dollars and an immediate prospective enrollment of 500 to 600 high school students exclusive powsin and George of Crestline, of students from non-high districts who may attend. It will take money, lots of it. How much will depend on what the people will want in special facilities such as shops, gymnasiums, cafeterias, athletic fields. It will also depend on what funds the State can furnish. The proposition is timely: It has been said that this is not

a good time in which to build. That is true. It is equally true that it is a good time in which to raise the money with which to build later. A high school the size of the one needed is not built overnight. It will take time to raise the money, time to plan, time to build. Waiting to begin will serve no useful purpose—it will only make starting that much more difficult.

The proposition is yours: Hearings have been held or are scheduled before election day in all the districts concerned. Efforts have been made to get the facts to everyone. On the pros and cons of those facts you as a voter should decide the issue. The proposition is yours. Make your decision carefully on the basis of all the information you can possibly gather. 


